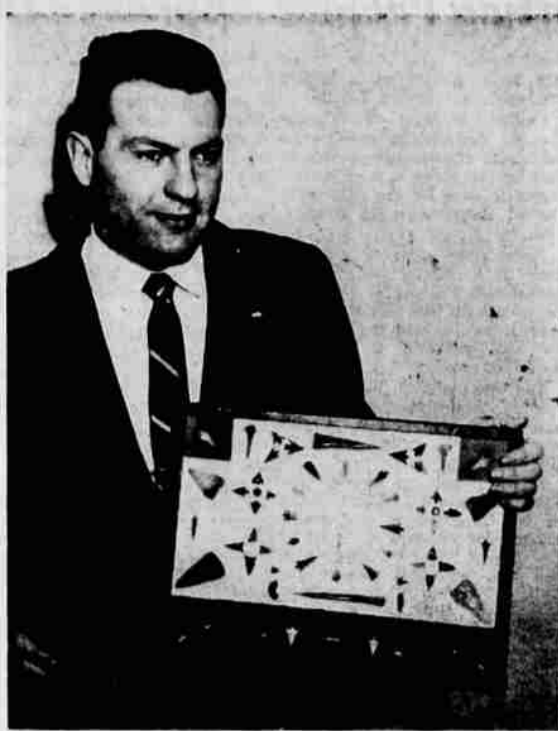


Church Plans To Enlarge

CHILOQUIN — The Chilouquin Methodist Church is planning to build an addition to the present structure during the current year. It is estimated that the cost will be in the neighborhood of \$14,000.

The financial committee for the building campaign announced recently that although slightly over one half the time has passed since pledges for the 1958-1959 building activities were taken, money received has not reached the 50 per cent mark. A total of \$8,500 is to be raised by the local church, with additional assistance from other sources to bring the total to the desired \$14,000.

Last fall the Eugene district church extension society, represented by Glenn Fundenburger of Klamath Falls, gave a check for \$540 to the local church. The area has promised additional help later.

House Number Plan Okayed

MALIN — The Malin City Council passed a resolution at its February meeting to put into effect a house numbering system in Malin to be carried out by the Malin Boy Scouts who will sell the numbers and put them up. Council Member Joe Halousek is working out the numbering system, the details of which will be announced soon, according to Mayor Leonard Petrik.

The city of Malin has purchased, with assistance from the state and federal government, a walkie-talkie radio system to be used by the city marshal, fire department and in case of emergency by George Pappé, Malin area Civil Defense director.

Artifactors Hold Elections On Group's Third Birthday

Roy Mattson of Merrill was elected as president of The Artifacts at the group's annual meeting held on February 17 at the fairgrounds exhibit building. Mrs. Mattson is new secretary-treasurer and Sam Merriman, also of Merrill, was named as vice president. Outgoing president is Bob Anderson.

The group observed its third birthday with a potluck dinner. Gene Favell was guest speaker, taking the Columbia River Culture as his topic.

"The Columbia River Indians are known to have had one of the most civilized cultures," Favell told the 40 members and guests present. "The findings at the Five Mile Locks camp are known to date back 10,000 years and the Wake-map camp dates back 1,000 years," he said.

Because of favorable climatic conditions and the abundance of fish and game for food, they had leisure for artistic work and their items of personal adornment employed the use of feathers, furs, painted sticks, wood and stone carvings, Favell said. Many of the artifacts are effigy pieces, such as a carved buffalo he displayed, and most of the mortars, pestles and paint pots found are handcarved, he said.

"They wore quantities of beads and bangles," the speaker said. "As trade goods they used Phoenix buttons, Northwest tokens and copper goods. Their arrowheads are among the finest in the world."

Favell said that the arrowhead or "pot" hunters date back to 1890. During depressions, some hunters sold artifacts for a living. He confessed to catching the artifact fever in 1953 and has been an avid collector since that time. He has one of the finest collections in the state consisting of artifacts from the Columbia, Warner Valley, Klamath Basin points and from farther afield.

At the close of the program, it was announced that the next meeting will be on March 17 in the Klamath County Library.

Morse Wants Probe Of ICC

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Morse (D-Ore) Friday suggested an investigation be made of two former Interstate Commerce Commission officials he said had exhibited "questionable conduct."

One of the former ICC officials denied any questionable conduct. The other refused immediate comment on the remarks Morse made on the Senate floor.

In a speech to the Senate, Morse also said a special committee should be created to inquire into the actions of federal regulatory agencies.

One of the cases Morse cited was that of Owen Clarke, a former ICC chairman.

Morse said Clarke's resignation late last year to become a vice president of the C&O Railroad indicated Clarke tried for the position while still serving on the ICC. Reached at his home here, Clarke declined immediate comment.

The other case mentioned by Morse was that of Edward M. Reidy, a former general counsel for the ICC who later became general attorney for the Southern Pacific.

Morse said that Reidy represented the ICC in proceedings in which a box company brought a complaint against the Southern Pacific.

Morse asked in his speech: "Is this not a strange occurrence to have an attorney for one party become the attorney for another party in the midst of litigation?"

Asked for comment on Morse's remarks, Reidy said: "I did not have anything to do with the box case after I left the commission, except to request an extension of time to file a reply to a petition for a writ of certiorari in the Supreme Court to which the other side had consented in advance."

"Furthermore, the Interstate Commerce Commission and the Southern Pacific were both on the same side of the case."

Reidy, who has lived here for 40 years, said he is a Democrat.

Local Man Held In County Jail

Bob Redkey, 29, of 2255 Vine Street, was in the county jail Saturday night, booked on a charge of assault and battery and held in lieu of \$350 bail.

The complaint was filed against the former Klamath Union High School and Oregon State College griddler by another football player, Frank Wilson of Oregon Tech, who said that Redkey burst into his room on campus late Friday night and began calling him names.

Witnesses said the altercation began downtown and then moved out to OTI.

USBR Land Leased After Bid Opening

MILAN, Italy (UP) — A young university student was killed and another was seriously injured Friday night when a carnival rocket they were making exploded in their hands. Police said Tiziano Gambini, 20, died en route to a hospital. Mario Premoli, whose bedroom was virtually destroyed by the blast, suffered serious arm and leg injuries and was hospitalized.

Chairman of the sponsoring organization, the Family Observance Committee, Al LeRoyce, said that if businesses were to close, it would be on "strictly a volunteer basis; a gentleman's agreement."

He stated that the program is backed by industry, religion, labor and the community and added that the committee's possible target date for enforcing the closing would be Easter Sunday.

LeRoyce said that the one exception to the closing would be stores that should stay open for the welfare of the community.

Cafe Owner Dies From Rifle Shot

YREKA — George Stack, 52-year-old owner of the Buckhorn tavern and cafe here, died instantly early Friday afternoon from gunshot wounds which were apparently self-inflicted.

Officials with the Siskiyou County Sheriff's Office said Stack apparently went to the deep freeze storage unit in the basement below the tavern and shot himself through the head with a rifle slug.

The incident is believed to have happened about 2 p.m., and Stack was found a short time later by one of his employees.

He had lived in Yreka for many years except for a short time ago when he lived in the Bay Area where he operated a business.

Funeral arrangements are pending with the Girdner Funeral Chapel.

Klamath Cow Belles Plan Official Bracelet Emblem

The idea of an official emblem of some sort for the Cow Belles has been under discussion since the formation of Klamath County Cow Belles some five years ago, so it seemed fitting that the first Cow Belle bracelet would originate in Klamath Falls.

Mrs. Oscar Kittredge, beef promotion chairman for the state Cow Belle organization, designed the basic idea which has been carried out by Arthur Rickbeil of Rickys Jewelers. The idea met with enthusiastic approval of the state officers and the national president has indicated to Mrs. Kittredge that the idea will be presented at the national level.

Cowmen Hear State Leaders

An organized protest against lower east-west freight rates was made by cattlemen from 11 western states during the January convention of the American Cattlemen's Association, George Russell, president of the Oregon Cattlemen's Association told 100 members of the Klamath Cattlemen's Association annual meeting Saturday in the Willard Hotel.

Russell stated that the lower rates on dressed meat is detrimental to western livestock producers, packers and labor, because it gives an unfair advantage to their eastern counterparts.

Meanwhile, Ed Coles, secretary of the state association, pointed out that the lower rates upset the "historical balance" between east and west when the western industry was forced recently to pay a higher freight tariff on live animals.

In other action, the local association reelected their present officers for another year. They are W. F. Marshall, Poe Valley, president; Ted Hyde, vice president and Ray Petersen, secretary.

Earlier, in the home of Mrs. Irwin Campbell on the Lakeview Highway, the Klamath Cow Belles, the cattlemen's auxiliary, elected 1958 officers.

They are Mrs. Verne Howard, president; Mrs. Homer DeLamar, vice president, and Mrs. William B. Decker, secretary-treasurer. The trio succeeds Mrs. William Marshall, president; Mrs. Oscar Kittredge, vice president, and Mrs. James Hammond, Merrill, secretary-treasurer.

Approximately 50 members attended the business meeting and tea.

Water Control Project Filed

LAKEVIEW — Mike Hill, soil conservationist with the Lakeview Soil Conservation District reports that the application for assistance in making a survey of watershed control on the Thomas Creek-Cottonwood Creek watershed has been completed and submitted to the state engineer and the state conservationist.

Next step in the procedure is a preliminary field examination by technicians from the SCS and other agencies concerned. Approval by these parties would result in the submission of the application to the SCS administrator in Washington, D.C. for approval.
