Paul Anderson, the 350-pound world's weight-lifting champion, night-club muscle showman and professional wrestler, would like a bout with boxing champion Floyd Patterson.

Or so says Anderson's manager, Howard (The Hangman) Cantowine.

Although Paul has had only 20 bouts as a wrestler, Cantowine already is proclaiming his boy is champion in that department.

"We'll defend our title against anyone," says Cantowine, an ex-wrestler himself. "None of the men he has met—and he has met the best—can put a hold on him that he can't break."

"And can you imagine a teeny 195-pound boxing champion like Patterson having a chance against him? With one blow, Paul would break the bone in Floyd's arm."
