

Scotty's Barks 'N' Bites

There are times when a sports writer's assignment can be mighty tough; no activity, no winners, no stars, no standouts—nothing! Fortunately, such is not the case in Klamath County. Not this year! Not the basketball season, especially! The only trouble now is that there isn't enough time or space to talk about all the high points.

One might dwell upon the dazzling 6-8 KU center, Glenn Moore, whose 1055 total points in his high school career represent an all-time scoring record in the history of Klamath Union. . . . One might, but one can't, since there are players like Bob Niles, Dave Robinson, Tom Ankeny, Bob Peterson and Smiley Herrera, all stick-outs in their own right, without whom, perhaps, the Pelicans might never have become conference champions. . . . Unsung, yes; unappreciated, no. Reams of copy could be written on each—and probably will be before they finish their respective careers.

Persons easy to write about are not necessarily restricted to KU. PICK A SCHOOL.

Pick a county school—run down a lineup . . . you'll find a star on any one of seven rosters. Men like Ron Roberts of Bonanza, Walt Lee from Little Bly, Merrill's scrappy Bud Maupin, Bill Rajanus of Malin, Bruce Parazoo from Chiloquin or SHA's George Hurley, keep popping up with enough material to fill a page. Distance and a time element have temporarily kept them out of the limelight. . . . Only temporarily, tho. Any one of them might, and sooner than you think, crash the news barrier as another Elgin Baylor, a Dave Gambee or a Johnny O'Brien.

For instance, let's look at Bonanza's 5-6, 140 pound package of TNT, Ron Roberts. This spectacular, quiet "bomb," who stands in awe of a crowd, made the Antler varsity as a freshman. He got off to a slow start; played in nine games and only made 38 points the first year. As a sophomore he did a little better—scrapped together 279 as he kind of felt his way along. By his junior year he began to get into the swing as he hit the twine for a miserly 387 point season. As a senior he had been "held" to 333 as of a week ago; of course there is the County B tourney yet to be considered.

A handy adding machine will divulge that the boy has collected 1037 points during his tenure at a guard slot for the Antler cagers. Spread over 76 games, this comes out something like 13.8 markers per contest; pretty fair for a lad that has averaged "only" .400 for field goal attempts and "only" .773 from the free throw line over the distance.

In addition, Ron, who speaks only when spoken to and then only sparingly, carries football gear in a sprightly manner. There are quarterbacks a half foot taller that may be able to move faster, straight-line-wise, in full re-

galia but there aren't many who get caught from behind as few times as little Roberts.

His speed isn't restricted to just football or basketball as he trips a neat 100-yard dash and sprang to a third in county and district broad jumps.

Mention hunting or fishing to Ronny and you get a fleeting im-

The fish and game possibilities of the Basin are the sole reason that Ron's dad, Charlie Roberts, a logger, moved his family from Flagstaff, Arizona to Bonanza when Ron was in the second grade. They don't plan to leave in the immediate future, either.

There are three more Roberts boys and one girl at home. And someone asks "Why is that Bonanza coach, Erv Ellis always grinning?" Hah!

Meanwhile, back in the city limits . . . the thought occurs that the appreciative fans who may or may not have had the chance to participate in the ovation accorded the graduating Pel cagers in their final home series could do much worse than move "en masse" to Crater High this weekend to watch Moore & Co. bring down the curtain on a fabulous season.

Pancho Talks Of Retirement

DALLAS, Tex. (UP)—Pancho Gonzales, who says he's thinking of retiring, attempts to whistle a little off Lew Hoad's wide lead today in their 100-match cross-country tennis series.

Gonzales, defending champion of pro tennis, said Sunday night after losing 6-4, 7-5 to Hoad in Fort Worth that he may retire after this series, but emphasized he hasn't yet made up his mind.

The win gave the Australian a 16-8 lead in the series. He broke through Gonzales' service in the ninth game of the first set and in the 11th game of the second. A crowd of 2,800, the largest ever to see a pro tennis match in Fort Worth, was on hand.

Gonzales said he's "playing much better tennis now" than he was last year against Ken Rosewall. He said Hoad is "head and shoulders" above anyone he's played previously.

In the preliminary singles match Sunday, Pancho Segura and Tony Trabert tied 9-9. In doubles, Trabert and Gonzales beat Hoad and Segura 8-4.

Gonzales denied reports that his trouble is psychological. "I don't think about anything but winning the next point," he said.

California's Golden Bears bid for a three-game sweep of their current Pacific Northwest tour Monday and a stronger hand in their drive for a second consecutive Pacific Coast Conference basketball championship.

The Bears lead the conference with a 10-2 record despite pre-season predictions giving them little chance this season. They meet Oregon Monday night at Eugene.

Coach Pete Newell's Cal cagers built up their conference leadership Saturday when they downed Washington State 59-48 on the heels of a Friday night 70-62 victory over Idaho.

The Bears were supported by Oregon State's 77-61 triumph over UCLA, which dropped the Bruins (9-4) to third and raised the Beavers (9-3) to second.

Idaho borrowed the full court press Cal had used on them Friday and applied it Saturday to surprise Washington 85-63. Stanford's Paul Neumann sank four straight baskets in the closing minutes to give the Indians a 69-61 come-from-behind victory over Southern California.

Oregon was idle Saturday. Washington travels to Washington State for Monday night's only other game. This and the Cal-Oregon game open the next to last week of conference play.

Games slated Friday put UCLA at Cal, Southern Cal at Oregon, Idaho at Stanford and Washington State at Washington. Saturday it's Southern Cal at Oregon State, UCLA at Stanford, Idaho at Cal and Washington at Oregon.

The Bears displayed a rounded offense and balanced floor play to drop the Cougars. The Cougars shot a bit more accurately but

were tied up by Cal's full-court press much of the time.

The Idaho-Washington clash provided a scoring duel between Capt. Gary Simmons of the Vandals and Big Doug Smart of the Huskies. The two, who rank one for conference individual scoring honors, ranked the same way in the game. Simmons hit 30 and Smart 28.

Idaho — the conference offensive leader — sank 45 per cent of its free throw attempts while Washington hit 38 per cent. This and solid defensive work led by Jerry Jorgenson, who had been out part of the season with a leg

injury, spelled victory for Idaho.

Slats Gill's Beavers dominated UCLA about all the way as Dave Gambee threw in 30 points. This brought his three-year PCC mark to 1,358 points—a new conference record. He has three games left to pad his total.

The Trojans seemed to have a victory in hand until Stanford's Neumann started sinking his jump shots, which turned the tide in the rough, foul-scattered contest. The Trojans contributed to their own downfall by fouling repeatedly as they sought to steal the ball, but this gave the Indians added free throw attempts.

Joe Brown Featured On Cuban TV Card

Lightweight champion Joe Brown is the only world boxing titleholder active this week, and he boxes out of the country in Havana, Cuba where a new sports palace is to be dedicated Wednesday.

The non-title bout, headliner of a card that includes defenses by three Latin American champions, will be the first sports event beamed "live" from a foreign nation to the United States.

Brown will fight Orlando Echevarria, the Cuban titleholder who owns a 47-19-4 record for 70 pro fights dating back to 1947. The New Orleans boxer who holds the world crown has a 68-15-9 record, plus two no decision contests, for 94 bouts.

The television people (ABC) will use an "over the horizon" system to beam the picture from Cuba to Florida and eventually into the network.

Carlos Ortiz, one of the few unbeaten fighters in the main event class, will try for his 25th victory Friday at Madison Square Garden. His opponent will be Boston's Tommy Tibbs, recent winner over Willie Pep.

Ore Tech Coach To Review Year

Basketball coach Wally Palmberg is expected to review the Oregon Tech season with members of the Owl Hoots, OTI booster club, Monday night at the group's weekly dinner meeting to be held at The Broiler at 6:30.

Palmberg's club closed their basketball schedule Friday and Saturday night with a sweep over Oregon College to clinch the second straight Oregon Collegiate Conference championship for the Techmen.

All local sports fans are invited to attend the dinner meetings.

Although Tibbs is barely over the 500 mark with 44-43-3, he came on strong last year in the lightweight division. He has been boxing regularly while the flashy Ortiz, who cuts easily, has been idle since September.

The 10-rounder will be carried on NBC radio-TV.

Two busy New York winterweights start the week off Monday night at St. Nicholas Arena with a rematch of a rousing Jan. 26 bout. Jimmy Archer punched out a split decision over Danny Russo in their first meeting but it was so close one round could have swung it to Russo.

Archer, 23, has a 16-2 record while Russo, 20, is 13-4 for 17 starts in a pro career that started in 1956.

Belt Defended In AAU Meet

SEATTLE (AP)—Jim McCarter of Seattle successfully defended his Northwest Golden Gloves heavyweight boxing championship here Saturday night with a third-round TKO over Vic Vieberg of Vancouver, B.C. McCarter was the only defending champion in this year's meet.

Last year McCarter won the AAU heavyweight title at Boston, Vieberg put up a game battle, but was outclassed.

Delany Captures Fast Mile

NEW YORK (AP)—Ron (The Unbeatable) Delany predicted today that the world indoor mile record of 4:03.6 was about to be broken.

By Delany? Of course not. By Istvan Rozsavolgyi, the Hungarian who has run second in Ron in his two races here since arriving less than two weeks ago.

"Rozsavolgyi definitely can break the record," said Delany, "and if I were running against him in the IC4A special mile this week, one or both of us probably would break it."

Delany will be taken up with defense of his 1,000-yard and two-mile titles in the IC4A meet, where team points count more than individual championships. His Villanova outfit is defending champion and will need every point Ron can muster.

Rozsavolgyi will go in a special mile against Velis Mugosa of Yugoslavia, who has been doing right well in longer races, plus a couple of Americans, probably George King and Phil Coleman, two of Delany's regular sparring mates.

So if Rozsavolgyi is going to lower Gunnar Nielsen's record, he'll have to do it this week and alone. He leaves for home after his next effort to begin training for the European championships this summer.

Saturday night in the National AAU championships, he ran the mile in 4:05.5 in pushing Delany to a 4:03.7 effort.

Jim Grelle of the University of Oregon was third in 4:06.8.

The meet produced only one world record. That was in the 35-pound weight throw in which Bob Backus of the New York Athletic Club, who won the team title, got off a heave of 65 feet 4 1/2 inches, eclipsing his own mark of 64-2 1/2.

Ed Colymore of Villanova sprung an upset winning the 60-yard dash in 6.2, after Dave Sims withdrew because of a pulled muscle. Hayes Jones of Eastern Michigan soundly trounced Elias Gilber of Winston Salem (N.C.) Teachers in the 60-yard high hurdles in 7.1.

Otherwise the winners were as expected, including: Parry O'Brien of Palm Springs, Calif., in the shotput (61-1 1/2), Greg Bell of Indiana in the broad jump (25-5 1/2), Mugosa in the three-mile (13:54.2), Zbigniew Orzylow of Poland in the 1,000 (2:14.1), Charlie Jenkins of Philadelphia in the 600 (1:11.3), John Hunke of the New York A.C. in the mile walk (6:55.5), Herman Wyatt of Santa Clara, Calif., in the high jump (6-7 1/2), and Bob Gutowski of Occidental and Don Bragg of Villanova in the pole vault (15 feet).
