

Polio Vaccine Clinic

Through the efforts of Klamath County Council Parent Teacher Association, Salk poliomyelitis vaccine is soon to be available to all adults over 20 years of age who wish immunization against polio and have not received full protection. The age group from 20 to 21 must have written consent of their parents or guardians.

First and second shots are given one month apart. The booster is given seven to 12 months following the second shot. All three are needed for maximum protection.

Forms are being sent home with children, from all the schools in Klamath County, for their parents to fill out. For the benefit of adults who have no children in school, the form below may be used.

Please fill out the form below if you will be able to come to a clinic in your area to receive vaccine at a charge of \$1 per shot to cover the cost of the vaccine and supplies. Locations of the clinics will be published as soon as the survey forms are returned and evaluated.
