MT. LAKE GARDEN CLUB

Mrs. Eva Cook, guest speaker from Klamath Falls, gave an interesting and very worthwhile talk on the cleanup campaign, which is a national movement.

Mrs. Oscar Rylander, litterbug chairman for the club, reported that progress is being made in the cleanup campaign with the cooperation of the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, posters being made in the schools, and with the willing help of many other organizations.

Mrs. Scott McKendree, Klamath Falls, who was appointed chairman of the plant depot at the dis-

trict board meeting, advised the club members on packaging of plants, naming them, and their growth and heights, so the plants can be planted in proper locations. The club chose April 26 as the date to have charge of the plant booth where surplus plants will be given to those needing more plants for their gardening and landscaping. This work will be carried on with many of the clubs participating, each Saturday, beginning in early spring so that gardeners can make use of these surplus plants.

A letter was read from the district horticulture chairman, giving plans for the horticulture essays on the variety of plants each

club has selected and grown over a two-year period. The deadline for having the essays in the mail is April 15.

Mrs. I. W. White, flower show chairman, reported on plans underway for the spring flower show to be held in June.

A letter was read from Mrs. Daniel Mooney, president of the National Council of Garden Clubs, telling of the new postage stamps honoring gardening and horticulture, this being the first time in history in any country that such a postage stamp has been made honoring gardening and horticulture. Envelopes are being

issued bearing the seal of the national council, to be used with the stamps, which will become a collector's item. The club voted to purchase 500 of the envelopes, to be distributed to club members.

Mrs. Jay Fairclough, bird chairman for the club, read an interesting account of birds in the Klamath Basin and Tulelake region, written for the National Geographic Magazine by two wild life enthusiasts who toured this region in 1908 and gathered much knowledge of bird and other wild life here. In 1908 the bird refuge was established by President Theodore Roosevelt. Club members also

named birds and told of their beneficial value to agriculture and horticulture.

At the close of the meeting delicious refreshments were served by the hostesses.

The next regular meeting will be March 17 at the home of Mrs. Paul Fairclough, with Mrs. Jay Fairclough assisting. The program will be on day lilies by Mrs. L. Brandt of Sheridan, Oregon.

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Police Plan New System

A new public relations move for members of the Klamath Falls Police Department was outlined Monday by Inspector Richard Young, Berkeley, California, officer conducting the current evaluation of the department.

A complete card file is being arranged which will give the names of the manager and assistant of each of the commercial establishments within the city limits and talking to the owner or manager.

The cards will be contained in a special file in the record bureau by a member of the department assigned to the bureau. Purpose of the file is to give the police ready reference to information about the business in the event it is found necessary to contact someone about that particular store. This would be in the event of a door being open, an attempted burglary or incidents of this type.

This information will be compiled by each of the policemen on their assigned beat. The cards will be filled out after actual visits to all commercial establishments within the city limits and talking to the owner or manager.

Income Tax Service Set

Wherever possible, the Internal Revenue Service will incorporate the most advanced developments in telephone service in providing tax information to Oregon taxpayers during the 1958 filing period, District Director Ralph C. Granquist of the Portland office, said recently.

Most federal income taxpayers, he said, can successfully complete a form, even where complicated tax problems are involved, with help obtained over the telephone. The revenue service began its telephone assistance program three years ago and it has been expanded each year to aid taxpayers to greater accuracy in their Forms 1040 and 1040A, Granquist pointed out.

The phone number to call in Klamath Falls is TU 4-4264. A special group of revenue agents is detailed each day to man the phone battery.

"Taxpayers needing information or advice shouldn't lose any time in calling us," Granquist stressed. "Right now we can give quick, explicit service. As the filing deadline grows nearer, however, lines will become jammed. Naturally, we ask that every taxpayer who calls us have his or her return in hand, along with any records relating to the problem, and that they have all the necessary facts and figures in mind."

"My best advice, again," Granquist said, "is start to prepare your return now. Go as far as you can, fill in and compute everything you can, then call us for help on the remainder. We'd like to make this phase of our taxpayer assistance program, especially, one of mutual cooperation."
