Farm Bureau Has Program

MONTAGUE — Sedg Nelson, Siskiyou County farm adviser of Yreka, and Dr. John Nehay, state veterinarian from Redding, both appeared as guest speakers before 50 members of the Shasta Valley Farm Center of the Siskiyou County Farm Bureau, at a meeting held on February 18 at the Montague auditorium.
 Nelson's talk was on tax valuation, and he explained how the tax rate is expected to remain at about the same level, since valuation of property and cattle has risen. He also spoke briefly on the high percentage of Siskiyou County cattle infected with brucellosis as compared to other counties in California. He stated that the reason the infection was so severe was due to the fact that testing of cattle has not been completed.
 Dr. Nehay's talk covered the requirements for transporting cattle across the California state line into other states. He stated that all owners wishing to transport cattle into other states must have official certificates, which can be obtained from him or any livestock sanitary official of the state.
 Other business brought up during the meeting included a request from John Doren, Montague farmer, that a resolution be drawn up and presented to the Farm Bureau for consideration regarding the declaration of racoons being a predatory animal, instead of a protected fur bearing animal.
 Mrs. George Flock reported that the Shasta Valley Farm Women's group had sponsored Marshall Martin and Richard Terswilliger, two farm youths from Montague, to attend the Youth Conference at the Farm Bureau Training Center recently held at Asilomar, California.
 Mrs. Dinny Leavers announced that she and her committee have completed all preparations for the table arrangements and decorations for the forthcoming annual potluck dinner party given each year by the Siskiyou County Farm Bureau, which will be held this year at the Montague auditorium Saturday, March 1.

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Discussion Set At Library

"What Stakes in the Middle East?" a great decisions subject, will be discussed by a panel at a luncheon meeting of the Klamath County Farm Bureau Women, to be held Friday, February 28, in the Empire Room of the Winema Hotel. Mrs. Joe Emmert, cataloger at the Klamath County Library, will give a brief explanation of the Great Decisions program and introduce the guest speakers.
 Members of the panel will be James Boyle, head of the school of allied arts and sciences at Oregon Technical Institute; Leonard Burkhardt, instructor in the engineering division of the school of technical associates, and Walter Hoag, instructor in the school of allied arts and sciences, who participated in the 1957 Great Decisions discussion group.
 Great Decisions is an eight-week discussion program designed to focus attention and provide facts on key foreign policy issues. The ideas and materials were developed by the Foreign Policy Association, a nonpartisan, nonprofit organization which seeks to stimulate interest and provide information.
 To make reliable facts readily available for Great Decisions, the Foreign Policy Association has prepared eight fact sheets. Each fact sheet presents one of the eight key foreign policy issues facing the United States and its citizens in 1958. They give background information, hard facts, and policy alternatives. The sheets are set up in a discussion outline. There are no "canned answers." Citizens read the facts, discuss the issues and come to their own individual conclusions.
 Local residents who do not wish to join a regular discussion group may participate in the program by reading the articles in the Sunday Oregonian and filling out the printed opinion ballot. Medford Great Decisions discussion panel may be seen of KOTI-TV each Saturday afternoon at 5 o'clock.
