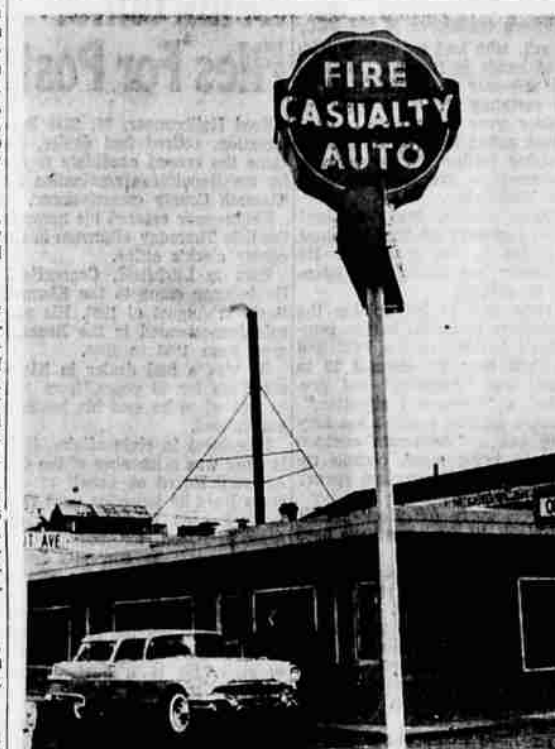

ARCADIA, Calif. (AP) - You've had tips on horses. Well, here's a horse who can give you a tip. He knows how to win when he's losing. This is made Silky Sullivan, a 3-year-old, the sensational darling of those who have read about him, seen him run. Early in a race he falls so far behind you'd think he was setting the pace for the next feature. As jockey Willie Harmatz, who rode Silky in several races, said: "I sure gets lonesome back there." But then, when all seems absolutely lost, this colt appears to shift gears. Within a stride or two he flares from a jaunty gallop to a blaze of speed. From dead last, usually, he begins to catch up, then pass. Horse after horse is left behind. And, at the last moment, he's in front. One of Silky's owners has to go behind the clubhouse whenever the colt runs. It's doctor's orders.

KF Woman Not To File

Mrs. Josephine Kittredge, a Klamath Falls woman who has been exceptionally active in tax study work and other community interest projects, said today that she does not aspire to be a candidate for any public office this year. "Numerous persons have asked me about my intentions," she said, "and I want to thank those people who have called and written me urging that I be a candidate for public office this year. "I believe it is more in the public interest to continue working for better economic understanding in the framework of the Oregon Nonpartisan Tax League, than it would be for me to run for either the State Legislature or Congress. I am principally interested in helping in the all-out effort to solve Oregon's tax problems, and feel that I can better accomplish this end by working in my present capacity. She added that there are many qualified citizens who should be urged to run for elective office, and recommended that candidates be chosen from those with a competent background in tax and money matters and the field of public service. Police Slay 'Cop Killer' ODESSA, Tex. (AP) - West Texas peace officers mowed down the accused killer of a deputy sheriff before he could pull the trigger on his cocked pistol last night. Sheriff Lem Gabrel said the slain suspect was G. F. (Jack) McMichael, 36, an ex-convict sought in a two-state manhunt. Deputy Thad West, 40, was shot without warning yesterday morning while checking a baby selling report. Gabrel said McMichael was found at the home of a girl friend. Officers surrounded the house. The sheriff said McMichael came to the front door with a pistol in his hand, then dashed for the back door after spotting the deputies outside. "We shouted for him to halt," the sheriff said, "and he whirled and cocked his pistol." Several officers fired about the same time and McMichael fell without shooting. Gabrel said Ruby Luellen Lanford, 50, was charged with harboring a criminal. The manhunt spread as far as Hobbs, N.M., after McMichael fled the scene of the early morning shooting. Deputy West was killed as he walked into an apartment. The landlady, Mrs. Frank Matthews, said she rented the apartment to Mrs. Pat Ledbetter, 18, and McMichael under the names of Mrs. and Mrs. Ledbetter. With them were Mrs. Ledbetter's two children, 2 and 4 months old. Deputy Sheriff G. K. Kelly said West went to the apartment to check reports an effort had been made to sell the 4-month-old Cindy. Detective Capt. Al Smithers said Mrs. Ledbetter told him she admitted West and told McMichael the deputy was there. McMichael, Smithers quoted her as saying, walked out of the bathroom shooting and West never had time to reach for his pistol. Kelly quoted Mrs. Ledbetter as saying, "I would never sell my baby." No charges were filed against Mrs. Ledbetter. Her children were taken over by the welfare office.
