Pastor Plans Visit To KF

Not far from Palestine, in the land of Armenia, a missionary found a lad whose Armenian parents had been massacred for their Christian faith. That boy, now Rev. Samuel Doctorian, 27 years old who grew up in a Christian orphanage, will be guest speaker at Mills School auditorium, East Main and Orchard Avenue, at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, March 3. The public is invited to hear the speaker who is appearing under auspices of the Church of the Nazarene.

He lived for a time in the city of Jerusalem. At the age of 16 he was called to minister the Gospel. He attended a Bible school until it was closed by the Arab-Israeli War. He served as pastor for a time in the Middle East, then went into interdenominational evangelistic ministry.

Rev. Doctorian preached in many cities in the Middle East, East Africa, the Belgian Congo. He flew to this country in October of 1957 and will be engaged in his chosen work across the United States. He speaks English, Armenian, Arabic and Turkish and knows the various conflicting forces that are at work in the Middle East where he is permitted to move about freely.

In speaking of conditions there, Rev. Doctorian says, "I am burdened for a revival all over the Middle East, for there is nothing there that will save them from Communism, but a spiritual revival."

The public is invited to hear him.

Son Slays Pastor Father

LAS CRUCES, N.M. (AP) — A Baptist minister, whittling a switch to punish his twin 14-year-old sons, was shot to death by one of them yesterday in front of his rectory.

The Rev. Leonard Boyett was shot once in the back with a .38-caliber revolver held by his son John after the pastor called the boy to come for punishment.

Friends of the family told police the boys and their father hadn't gotten along recently, that the boys resented the strict discipline at home and planned to run away.

The boys stole the death weapon to "hunt rabbits" in their romantic plans to run away and hide at a nearby lake. One of the twins also stole \$30.10 from a family cookie jar.

Boyett discovered the loss.

He picked the twins up at school and drove them home. He stood on the front stoop whittling the three-foot, pencil-thin switch. Then he called, "John, come here."

John, standing in the front room with his sister Carolyn, 17, watching, lifted the revolver and fired through the screen door.

Both John and his twin brother Jack were in the custody of juvenile authorities. A Juvenile Court hearing will decide whether John will be tried as an adult or juvenile.

Jack was held as a witness "and because he wanted to stay with his brother," defense attorney J. Benson Newell said.

As the two boys were led to the police cruiser past the body of their father, Jack turned to his sobbing brother.

"John," he said, "you stop crying. Pray for dad."

Khrushchev's Farm Plan Victory May Be Temporary

Communist boss Nikita Khrushchev, Moscow announced last night, has put over his latest proposal for Soviet agriculture. But his victory may be temporary, a pale reflection of a deeper struggle agitating Communists in the Soviet Union and abroad.

From the dreary gobbledygook of Communist statements emerges an outline of party dissension over where Soviet socialism will go in the next decade. The conflict has important meaning for world peace.

Scraps of evidence indicate that Khrushchev is trying to fight Stalinism at home and to sustain it in the satellites. He reasserts Moscow's total mastery over world communism and all phases of Soviet and satellite life. But he also makes bright promises to the home folk, reminiscent of the nervous 1933 days after Stalin died. Strong popular pressure may be responsible.

A clue to the Khrushchev dilemma may be found in the Communist Central Committee's approval of Khrushchev's plan to "reorganize" the machine-tractor stations. These stations had the power to allocate or withhold machinery from collective farms and thus were a potent control weapon. But this sort of bureaucracy got in the way of farm production.

The Central Committee's decision probably means the end of the machine-tractor stations eventually, unless Khrushchev is reversed. Machinery will be sold directly to the collective farms. But Khrushchev did not approve this approval without objection, as evidenced by guarded statements in the Soviet press.

With characteristic double-talk, the party speaks now of a "further development of the collective farm system," raising the possibility of an even bolder Khrushchev revision of Stalin.
