Two new advertising salesmen have joined the Herald and News staff. Don Garrett, 1814 1/2 Johnson Ave., moved with his wife and 11-year-old baby to Klamath Falls from Montana at Christmas time. He has his own collection agency at Billings and has had previous sales experience. Byron Smith, 4207 Onyx, the other newcomer, is married and has a 7-year-old son and 4-year-old daughter. He says his only other newspaper experience was as a mailer on the Yakima Daily Republic. They replace Larry Mulvaney, now ad manager for the Paso Robles Press and Jim Crismon, resigned to work for Great West Life Assurance Agency. Jack Pearson and Jim Allen are the veteran advertising account executives. J. A. McDonald adds retail advertising manager to his national advertising manager duties, with the title of Display Advertising manager. In baseball parlance, he is a "playing manager." Classified advertising continues with no personnel changes in its new quarters on the main floor of the Herald and News building. W. H. Totton, CAM, Dave Landis is expected back on the ad staff this summer at the close of the spring term at Willamette University, according to A. D. (Deb) Addison, who now has the official title of advertising director.

Work just completed by Morrison & Howard's office includes a new chapel type church building for the Dunsuir Methodist Church which will be of combination board and bat and local field stone construction with ornamental iron crosses and sun shields. It will occupy about 6,400 square feet and bid opening has been set for 7:30 p.m. on March 7. Morrison & Howard have drawn plans for adding a Sunday School wing, social rooms and kitchen to the Chillicothe Methodist Church. The first unit will be 40x40 feet and plans for a second unit of similar size are being prepared for construction at some future date. Near completion in the same office are plans for a one-story, 10,000 square foot reinforced concrete county vehicle repair and maintenance shop building for Klamath County. Plans call for a 23-foot ceiling to accommodate a 20-ton bridge crane with 5-ton auxiliary. Bids will probably be invited later this month.

Dorris Theater To Close Doors

DORRIS — The Dorris Theater will close its doors with Saturday night's show, March 1. The Jones' operated the motion picture show in the Dorris City Hall during the '30s, and then built a theater building on Third Street in Dorris which began operating in 1941. Two years ago they added a cinemascope to their screen. Jones stated that they are reluctant to close the theater because of the people in Butte Valley who have depended upon it for entertainment, but circumstances are forcing them to do so.

Escape Leads To Legal Row

RENO — This legal conundrum has two attorneys digging through their law books: Can Washington state force the return of one of its former prison inmates who escaped while he was on Oregon soil? Involved is John L. Dotson, 53. While serving a prison term at Walla Walla, Wash., in 1954 Dotson wandered off when he and other inmates were picking tomatoes on a farm nine miles south of the state line, in Oregon. Deputy Dist. Atty. Edwin C. Mulcahy argued for Washington authorities that Dotson was under Washington authority, because of the guard's presence. Opposing, Atty. Proctor Hug Jr., Dotson's counsel, said the Washington warrant charging Dotson with being a fugitive was invalid because he violated the escape law in Oregon. Dotson was picked up here last week on suspicion of robbery. District Judge Grant Bowen ordered both lawyers to do some digging in their legal tomes and appear before him again next week.

Jury To Hear Murder Case

Bruce Tupper, 28-year-old Chilcoquin man charged with the January 15 gunshot slaying of a 39-year-old woman at Chilcoquin, was bound over to the grand jury Friday afternoon following a preliminary hearing in the district court of Judge D. E. Van Vactor. The deceased is Teresa Hunt, 39, who died instantly after being shot through the head. The shooting reportedly followed a quarrel at the woman's home. During the preliminary hearing Tupper was represented by Portland Attorneys George Rein Iller and Joseph Stearn, and Klamath Falls Attorney Glenn Ramirez. Deputy District Attorney Freeman (Pat) Murray prosecuted for the state. The grand jury will convene on Monday, March 3.

Following registration a nurse takes your temperature, tests your hemoglobin, checks blood pressure and pulse, and records a history of any recent illness that might affect your ability to deposit. You drink a glass of fruit juice and then enter the donor room. The actual blood deposit takes approximately five minutes, after which you rest for 15 minutes. Rest period is followed by refreshments in the canteen. There is a qualified doctor present at all times.
