Ohlund Files For Clerk

YREKA — Robert J. (Bob) Ohlund of Yreka, assistant Siskiyou County assessor, last week announced his candidacy for the office of county clerk, in opposition to incumbent Rachel Cordes, and Loyd Johnson, Yreka insurance man.

Ohlund is a veteran of World War II, and has served as veteran's service officer for Siskiyou County from 1945 to 1952. He is known for his assistance to returned veterans and their families following World War II and during the Korean conflict.

Ohlund attended local schools and is a graduate of Heald Business College, majoring in business administration. He is 35, and makes his home in Yreka with his wife, Hazel, and two children, Rhonda, 11, and Barry, 9.

Prior to his entry into the military service he was an employee at Hill, with the Fruit Growers Supply Company, and he was a member of the local union.

Ohlund is most active in community affairs, being a member of several civic and community organizations. He served on the Yreka Area Apprenticeship Council, and was for several years district service officer for both the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars. He was also chairman of the National Employ the Physically Handicapped Committee, and served as commissioner on the Yreka Housing Authority.

He is a past president of the 20-30 Club, and was campaign chairman of the countywide Cancer Society Fund Drive in 1956.

Ohlund stated, "with 13 years clerical and administrative experience in public service, I believe I am well qualified to serve as county clerk."

"If I am elected," he further stated, "my first consideration and primary function will be in serving the citizens of Siskiyou County, and to carry out the duties of county clerk with prompt efficiency, diligence and integrity."
