

Henley Fifth In Tournament

ASHLAND—Henley won the consolation championship of the Rogue League sub-district basketball tournament played here over the past weekend, defeating Illinois Valley 41-31 Saturday night.

Phoenix captured the league championship and the right to meet the winner of the northern sub-district for a spot in the state A-2 tournament in Salem, March 17, 18 and 19. Phoenix topped Brookings 47-40 in the title game. Glendale won third place honors by defeating Eagle Point, 52-45.

Friday night, Henley tripped Rogue River 54-44. Phoenix topped Glendale 41-33 and Brookings advanced to the finals with a 56-52 win over Eagle Point.

In Saturday's consolation action, Jim Herringshaw paced Henley with nine points. High for IV was Dan Slanaker with 10.

Henley led 19-17 at halftime and 39-26 at the third quarter's end.

Hart Vies In Nick Ring Bout

Sugar Hart, sleek Philadelphia welterweight, will be after his seventh St. Nicholas Arena victory Monday night when he faces Clarence (Duke) Harris of Detroit.

Hart is undefeated at the small New York club. In fact, he has lost only three of 27 pro starts.

Not quite a year ago, Hart's 12-fight string was snapped by Walt Byars in Madison Square Garden. He bounced back to win two but then was stopped by Virgil Atkins. A draw with Charlie Cotton and a decision over Larry Baker in his last two starts brought Hart's record to 23-3-1. Hart, 22, is No. 7 among the welters in the National Boxing Assn. ratings, No. 10 in Ring Magazine.

Harris, 25, has a 23-5-1 record, winning two of three last year. This will be his first New York appearance.

The Wednesday night fights (ABC-TV) will present the Western Golden Gloves finals from Chicago Stadium for the second year.

Tentative plans call for title bouts in the 147, 160, 175 pound and heavyweight divisions to be seen. Other three-round championship fights may be carried if time permits.

Ike Chestnut of New York and Harold Gumes of Providence, R.I. meet in a featherweight match Friday at Madison Square Garden. Chestnut, stopped on cuts by Ricardo Moreno in November, is ranked among the top five in the class. Moreno went on to a title match with Hogan (Kid) Bassey, set for Los Angeles on April 1.

Gomes has won 13 of his last 14, losing only to Isidro Martinez, in the last three years. After the Martinez defeat last August he took a long vacation until Jan. 20 when he knocked out Harold Smith at St. Nick's.

Chestnut's record is 28-9-3, Gomes' 39-4. The fight will be carried on network (NBC) radio and television.

Roseburg In Cage Tourney

Roseburg's on-again, off-again basketball team definitely was on over the weekend and Monday was the latest team in the state destined for the Oregon prep Class A-1 basketball tournament.

Roseburg needed two victories over the weekend to clinch a tourney berth, and got them.

Friday night the Indians beat North Bend, ninth-ranked in the Associated Press Poll. And Saturday they nudged Marshfield 52-49 to clinch the title berth.

Roseburg earlier this season rose into the top 10 of the poll by upsetting three of its leaders. Then the Indians lost two games and fell out of the poll's top 10.

In winning District 5-A-1's second tourney, a spot, Roseburg knocked South Eugene out of the running for a berth in the prep classic.

Springfield earlier won the district's first tournament berth.

Roseburg was the only team to win a place in the tournament Saturday night, but top-ranked teams posted victories in other key prep games.

Klamath Falls, No. 1 in the poll, ran its season record to 21-1 by clipping Central Point 50-40.

And Astoria, the fifth-ranked team, bounced back from a Friday defeat to bury Gresham 91-50. Gordon Scott scored 30 points for Astoria.

The only other team in the top 10 that saw action Saturday night was ninth-ranked North Bend, which defeated Cottage Grove 71-53.

No Class A-2 or B state tournament berths were won Saturday night.

St. Francis of Eugene, Stayton and The Dalles are the only A-2 teams to thus far win a tourney berth. No class B teams yet have qualified.
