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Police Inspector Presents Report To Mayor, Council

The results of a two month evaluation of the Klamath Falls Police Department were presented to Mayor Lawrence Slater by Inspector Richard Young of the Berkeley, California Police Department at Monday night's council session.

The voluminous report, covering over 300 pages was compiled by the inspector, who had not only evaluated the department, but had also instituted a number of changes in operation.

In presenting the report, Inspector Young said, "I have enjoyed my stay in Klamath Falls very much. Nothing but the very best cooperation has been extended to me by everyone. I tried not to be too critical, but there are some things that should be corrected, these things are obvious in the report."

"Some people may not be happy with the report, and it affects some more than others," he continued, "but the report is an honest summary of what I found."

Inspector Young also commented on the private police patrol in the city, commenting, "I am sorry if my report was taken as an indictment of the private patrol which a number of the merchants now use. We have a private police patrol in Berkeley, and find it extremely useful. The regular police certainly will check doors whenever possible, but they have many other duties to perform also. They cannot provide all the services that a private patrol does. The individual merchants will have to decide on that, but I did not intend that an end should be put to it."

City Treasurer Mrs. Lola Heilbroner was instructed to deposit \$30,000 of city equipment funds in the Bank of Klamath Falls on a one year deposit basis.

Approval was given for the Girl Scouts to conduct a cookie sale in the city from April 11 through April 20, and also for a fund raising drive by the Crippled Children's Fund Committee.

Mayor Slater accepted the report, and remarked "With 300 pages to read and digest, I expect it will be a week or so before we will have some answers on what portions of the report can be put into effect and how best to put it into operation."

The mayor also announced that several of the copies would be available immediately to the police department, and that three or four copies would be placed at the city library in order that the general public might have access to it.

Bids for two new police cars were opened and Balsiger Motor Company submitted the low bids. The police department proposed to trade in two motorcycles and one police car for the two new ones. The net bids after deducting the trade-ins and the excise taxes were listed as follows for the two patrol vehicles: Balsiger Motors \$2,934.14; Jim Olson Motors \$3,427.90 and Dugan and Mest \$3,647.08. The bids were referred to the police commission with power to act.

The city engineer was instructed to prepare preliminary plans for the paving of St. Francis Street from Oregon Avenue to Pleasant Avenue.

Another project, the paving of Worden from Delta to Lytton was held up pending the engineer ascertaining the wishes of owners of vacant property in the area who would be required to pay the difference in their assessments in cash.

RESOLUTION NO. 673

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, TO CONSTRUCT AND LAY SEWERS IN ALL SUNNYLAND ADDITION, SOUTH ONE-HALF OF TRACT 37, AND NORTH ONE-HALF OF TRACT 38, AND 41 OF ENTERPRISE TRACTS ADDITION, APPROVING PLANS, SPECIFICATIONS AND ESTIMATES THEREFOR FILED BY THE CITY ENGINEER, AND DECLARING THE BOUNDARIES OF THE PROPERTY BENEFITED, AND DIRECTING CERTAIN STEPS TO BE TAKEN, SAID PROJECT TO BE KNOWN AS SEWER UNIT NO. 26.

The City Engineer of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, pursuant to a resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having filed plans, specifications and estimates for the cost of constructing and laying what is to be known as the 26th sewer unit of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, located in that portion of said City as follows: All Sunnyland Addition, the South one-half of tract 37, and north 200 feet of tract 38, and 41 of Enterprise Tracts Addition, embracing in said unit of said property hereinafter bounded and described, and the Common Council now finds them satisfactory, THEREFORE:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, DULY ASSEMBLED IN REGULAR SESSION AS FOLLOWS:

Section I.

That the plans, specifications and estimates of what is to be known as the 26th sewer unit of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, filed with the City by the City Engineer, shall be, and the same are hereby approved and adopted.

Section II.

That the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, hereby declares its intention to construct and install the 26th Sewer Unit of said City in accordance with the said plans, specifications, and estimates, this project consist of constructing a complete sewer system to serve the area included in all of Sunnyland Addition, the South one-half of tract 37, and the North 200 feet of tract 38, and 41 of Enterprise Tracts Addition. The project will include concrete sewer pipe with rubber ring joints, manholes, lampholes, connections, and all necessary appurtenances, all as more fully shown by the plans and specifications on file with the Police Judge of said City at a total estimated cost as follows, to-wit:

Cement sewer pipe, rubber rings with appurtenances—\$28,000 said estimate includes engineering, attorney fees, supervision, advertising, clerical assistance and unforeseen contingencies.

Section III.

That the property lying within the boundaries hereinafter described, shall be and is hereby declared to be benefited by the construction and installation of said sewer system, to-wit:

Beginning at the Northwest corner of Section 3 Township 38 South, Range 9 East, Willamette Meridian in the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon; thence southerly along the centerline of Washburn Way 275 feet, thence Easterly parallel to and 200 feet distant South of said line of said Washburn Way, 1974 feet, more or less, to the line of Tract 32 of Enterprise Tracts Addition, said line also being the city limits of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon; thence Northerly along the Easterly line, and the Easterly line extended of said Tract 32 Enterprise Tracts, to the Southeast corner of said Sunnyland Addition to the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon; thence continuing Northerly along the Easterly line of said Sunnyland Addition to the Northerly line, and the Northerly line extended of said Tract 37 of Enterprise Tracts, thence Southerly along the Westerly line of said Tract 37 Enterprise Tracts to the Northerly line of Shasta Way, thence Westerly along the Northerly line, and the Northerly line extended of Shasta Way to the centerline of Washburn Way to the point of beginning.

Said real property above described lying in Klamath Falls, Klamath County, Oregon, shall be and is hereby declared to be benefited and assessed for the expense of said sewer unit.
