As a result of the disease she was left almost completely paralyzed, retaining only the use of her right arm and hand and movement of her head. Because of her disability she is unable to operate her wheel chair and it must be pushed by others.

Mrs. Carol Mulder, chairman, has announced that the program will feature the all-city grade school orchestra, solos from students of the Klamath Union High School music department, the grade school music departments, the Thurston School of Dance, and the Howell Dance Studio. 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Teacher Contracts Viewed By City School Directors

Members of the Klamath Falls Elementary School Board are as yet undecided concerning the method of extending contracts to teachers for the forthcoming school year. The group discussed the matter at length Monday evening but was unable to conclude a definite course of action because of two principal factors:

1. The school boards throughout the state have not yet received information from the State Tax Commission indicating the extent of state school aid which will be received under the modified provisions of the basic school support fund law.

2. Attorneys throughout the state have not agreed in their interpretations of the three-year contract hiring law passed at the last regular session of the State Legislature.

School Attorney George Proctor told the board Monday evening that he interprets the law as meaning that a teacher receiving a three-year contract would thereby sacrifice his or her right to re-negotiate salary schedules each year.

He pointed out that increments or other wage adjustment provisions could be included in the original contract, but that beyond such provisions the individual teacher hired on a three-year basis could not negotiate for other salary modifications during the three-year period.

The law provides that by March 15 the school board must do one of three things with regard to the elementary teachers who have been with the system for three consecutive years: (1) Offer a three-year contract; (2) notify the teacher of dismissal; (3) do nothing and await affirmative action by the teacher.

If the school board did not extend a three-year contract or notify a teacher of dismissal by

March 15, it would then be the obligation of the teacher to ask the board for a one-year contract not later than April 1. The board would be obligated to grant such a one-year contract at the salary now being received by the teacher.

The board finds itself in a particularly complicated position inasmuch as it is unable to conclude the 1958-59 teacher salaries until it is known how much the school district will receive from the state. At the same time, the March 15 deadline as prescribed by law is near at hand, and the board is without the necessary information to undertake any form of three-year negotiation.

In other matters, the joint school boards voted to buy the district gasoline under provisions of the recently submitted Signal gas bid to the county school department until the city districts decide definitely what they are going to do.

During mid-February the Signal Oil Company submitted a winning bid of 21.19 cents per gallon for furnishing gasoline to the county school department. A day prior to

the action, said the city galleage was definitely a factor when computing the 21.19 cent per gallon bid to the county schools, and said the practice of the prior years would seem to establish a binding precedent.

The school boards plan a more definite conclusion of the matter at a later date.

Advertising Plan Studied

DUNSMUIR — The use of advertising funds will be studied by the Dunsmuir Chamber of Commerce before allocation of the advertising budget, it was decided at the monthly dinner meeting of the chamber at the Hotel Dunsmuir last week.

The wishes of other chambers of commerce within the county will be considered in evaluation of the advertising program, Armand Brunel, chamber president, said.

In other business, the chamber voted a case of eggs to the Junior Chamber of Commerce, which is sponsoring a community Easter egg hunt. The chamber will join with the Lions and Rotary clubs in giving a farewell dinner for A. W. Kilborn, Shasta division superintendent, who is being transferred by Southern Pacific to Tucson, Arizona, on April 1.

The chamber endorsed the proposed site area for the Siskiyou County Junior College.

A membership drive will be held this month with Ed Scribner as chairman. Scribner and Mrs. Roscoe Kimble also inquire into the possibility of a Newcomers Club.

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Snow Survey Findings Listed

MOUNT SHASTA — District forester John C. Watt reports that the snow survey on Mt. Shasta for March 1 shows Horse Camp is buried under 184 inches of packed snow that holds 76 inches of water.

Sand Flat, at a lower elevation, has 126 inches of snow with a water content of 50 inches.

A year ago Horse Camp snow measured 85 inches, with 29 inches of water; while Sand Flat held 55 inches of snow that assayed 24 inches of water.

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
