

Adequate Water Supply Forecast For Basin Area

Irrigation water supplies for Klamath Basin lands in 1958 are assured of being adequate in amount even if March snow accumulation should fall somewhat below normal. Present reservoir water supplies and future runoff to be expected from snow-melt on well watered watersheds will add up to above normal water supplies, according to a report released today by W. T. Frost, snow survey supervisor for U.S. Department of Agriculture, Soil Conservation Service and Oregon Agricultural Experiment Station.

Dump, Road Cleanup Set

The county court acted Wednesday to have the public dump areas cleaned up and to clean some of the county road portions where persons have dumped garbage and other material during the winter months. The road department has been instructed to do the cleanup work beginning this week.

Judge Charlie Mack and Commissioners Ed Gowen and Jerry Rajnus explained that they have received numerous calls in recent weeks about trash blocking some of the remote county roads and barring the entrance to the dumping areas. A Malin delegation appeared before the court Wednesday and complained about the condition of the Malin dump.

Dump areas to be cleaned include those at Keno, Malin, Bonanza and Langell Valley.

Judge Mack added that the county is at the same time going to undertake a program for more rigidly enforced the laws prohibiting the dumping of trash in or along the side of roads.

Fugitive Held In Missouri

Legislators Approve Plan To Boost Highway Patrol

SACRAMENTO (UP) — The Assembly Ways and Means Committee put the stamp of approval today on Gov. Goodwin J. Knight's request for 264 more men for the Highway Patrol.

Despite efforts of legislative analyst A. Alan Post to cut the money for the salaries for the new patrolmen out of the budget, the committee voted 14-4 to approve the governor's proposal.

"This is no time to curb the efforts of the Highway Patrol," said Assemblyman Herbert R. Klocksiem (R - Long Beach). "There are just too many people being killed and injured on our highways and there are more cars every year."

In other action on the governor's two billion dollar budget request Wednesday, Ways and Means also:

Cut from the budget all funds to build 30 roadside rest areas and promised to take a good long look at the entire program next January before continuing it.

Approved a \$308,000 appropriation for staff to get started on two new state colleges in Alameda and Orange counties with the hope that classes can start at the new institutions by the fall of 1959.

Approved, over Post's objections, a controversial appropriation of \$399,536 to continue the California high school Cadet Corps, an organization which trains some 15,000 students in 244 schools.

Voted an extra \$800,000 to go with another one million dollar request to finance a matching program with counties for construction of camps for Youth Authority wards.

Other developments in the Legislature, as the two houses prepared to take a long weekend recess so the members could go back home and file for reelection, included:

Confirmation: Knight asked the Senate to confirm more than a dozen recent appointments, including two of his secretaries to high-pay jobs on the Youth Authority and Public Utilities Commission and Harry Finks, labor union executive, to the Personnel Board. Sen. Hugh Burns (D - Fresno) promised the Senate Rules Committee would hold a full and early hearing and interview each appointee.

Construction: Sen. Nelson Dilworth (R - Hemet) introduced a measure asking for an immediate appropriation of 30 million dollars from tidelands oil money to be used to loan school dis-

tricts so they can build new plants.

Special session: Assemblyman Jesse M. Unruh (D - Los Angeles) wrote the governor urging him to add to the special session call the matter of unemployment insurance. Unruh asserted the Department of Employment was enforcing the act "in a manner unsym-

pathetic with the plight of many unemployed workers in California." Tax exemption: Representatives of both the shipping industry and labor pleaded with a joint interim committee to back bills already introduced to exempt from personal property taxes ships under construction in California yards.
