Soviets Okay Hope's Visit

WASHINGTON (AP)—Comedian Bob Hope apparently rates with the Russians. He's getting a visa to visit Russia, and a Soviet Embassy attaché says clearance came through in the "remarkable" time of only two weeks. Arrangements were made Wednesday to issue the visa here after Hope had spent several days in London in a fruitless wait for permission to fly to Moscow to film a television show. Madame Tamara Mamedova, the Russian Embassy's cultural attaché, said Hope would have gotten his visa earlier but "he moves so fast we couldn't catch up with him." Hope, who came here from London to accept an award from the USO National Council, said the Russians "put no restrictions on what I could do" in the Soviet Union. The show, which will use Russian acts, is intended for American audiences but Soviet diplomats said they might want to let Russian viewers see it.

ICBM Motor Gets Test

DENVER (AP)—A new tool for the United States' scientific and military arsenal got its baptism by fire yesterday. Martin Co. technicians test-fired the propulsion system of the Titan intercontinental ballistic missile being manufactured at Martin's foothills plant under a \$58-million-dollar Air Force contract. The brief captive test was termed successful. Martin spokesmen said other such tests would follow. How many such tests are required before final acceptance is not known. But the latest Titan may be ready for actual firing at Cape Canaveral, Fla., before year's end.
