NEW YORK (UP)—The flowers that bloom in the spring are bursting out all over today in the baseball training camps.

Managers, after replaying all those losing games of last season through the long winter nights, know how to avoid such catastrophes this time around. Play-

ers, after chasing the chills, are as optimistic as a guy with a ticket on every horse in the race.

Proving that hope springs annually, as well as eternally, are these bright bits from the baseball spas:

Bobby Bragan, Cleveland: "I'm going to be a good boy and temper my remarks and my actions." (Giving us the long-awaited tiger with horizontal stripes.)

A LITTLE COOPERATION
George Sisler, Pittsburgh batting coach: "One additional hit in every seven games will raise the Pirate team batting average from .250 to .300." (If rival pitchers cooperate and if Pirate hitters have been striking out on purpose.)

Chuck Dressen, Brooklyn coach: "The Yanks might have finished fourth in the National League last year." (A man might make money selling electric blankets in the Congo, too.)

Romack Leads Open Action

ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla. (UP)—Defending Champion Barbara Romack Porter of Sacramento, Calif., led the way into the 18-hole semi-finals of the Florida East Coast Women's Amateur Golf Tournament today.

Mrs. Porter met young Judy Bell of Wichita, Kan.

The other semi-final pitted young upstart Dale Fleming of Tulsa, Okla., against Mary Ann Reynolds, Georgia State champion from Albany.

Miss Fleming became the giant-killer of the tournament Thursday by downing Grace DeMoss, hometown favorite, medalist and two-time former winner of the event, 1-up on the 19th hole.

The 20-year-old University of Oklahoma coed then went on to capture a quarterfinal victory over Doris Phillips of Belleville, Ill., 3 and 2.

Mrs. Porter advanced easily with a 5 and 4 win over intercollegiate champion Marian Bailey, Evanston, Ill., and 5 and 3 victory over Mrs. Maurice Glick, veteran tourney player from Baltimore.

AAU Swim Meet Set At Portland
PORTLAND (UP)—A total of 118 men and women are entered in the Oregon AAU sponsored Western Swimming and Diving Championships to be held this weekend at the Multnomah Athletic Club.

They represent eight women's teams and 13 men's teams from California, Washington, Oregon and Canada.

SIME TO DEFEND TITLE
SANGER, Calif. (UP)—Dave Sime of Duke will defend his 100 and 220-yard dash titles at a track meet here on June 7, the Central California AAU announced Thursday.

Sime set a world record of 20 seconds flat in the 220 and tied the world mark of 9.3 seconds for the 100 here two years ago.

Teams Invited To Indian Meet
TOPPENISH, Wash. (UP)—Five out-of-state teams have been invited to play in the 3rd annual all-Indian basketball tournament scheduled for March 12-15 at White Swan and Toppenish.

Back to defend its title will be the Lapwai, Idaho, team, representing the Nez Perce Indians. Other out-of-state teams scheduled to play are the Crow team of Lodgegrass, Mont., and the Chiloquin, Warm Springs and Umatilla teams from Oregon.

Washington will be represented by the Makahs, Colvilles, Swinomish and Yakima tribes. The Yakimas will have four teams in the tournament, the Ace of Clubs, the Status Eagles, the White Swan Chiefs and the Toppenish Paipooses.

Top Clubs Survive Cage Play

If NCAA officials are heaving a temporary sigh of relief today, it's because the "biggies" they want for their championship basketball clambake have passed their first tests in the post season tournaments of the Southern and Atlantic Coast Conferences.

All four seeded teams, including regular season champ Duke and defending conference and national champ North Carolina, advanced in the ACC meet at Raleigh. West Virginia, swept its first-round game in the Southern loop's tournament at Richmond.

The postseason tournaments decide who fills the automatic NCAA berths from the two conferences. The club that outbattled 'em all season could lose out.

Tonight in the ACC, top-seeded Duke plays fourth-seeded Maryland, and second-seeded North Carolina State (ineligible for the NCAA) meets third-seeded North Carolina. Each survived a first-round scare.

Duke rallied on a 12-point streak in the second half to top Wake Forest 51-44. North Carolina, 12 points behind at one stage, picked up to beat Clemson 62-51. North Carolina State downed South Carolina 66-61. Maryland spilled stubborn Virginia 70-66 on Gene Dabko's layup basket and free throw with 1:47 left.

In the Southern tournament, West Virginia plays Richmond, and George Washington faces William and Mary.

West Virginia romped over Davidson yesterday 91-61 with its usual balanced attack while Richmond downed the Citadel 63-59. George Washington beat Furman 73-59 and William and Mary eliminated Virginia Tech 79-61.

The Mountaineers are important in NCAA plans because they happen to be the No. 2 team nationally, a swift, classy outfit with a 24-1 record, and a good bet to wind up No. 1 when the experts vote in next week's final Associated Press poll.

Wyoming blew a chance to clinch the Skyline championship and an NCAA berth, and the NCAA Small College Tournament got under way in last night's other features.

Utah, bound for the National Invitation Tournament, tripped Wyoming in overtime 81-74. Wyoming 10-3, holds a one-game lead over Colorado State U. in the Skyline race, each with one game left.

Colorado State lost a chance to pull into a tie, dropping a 51-44 decision to Montana. If they tie for the title, a flip of the coin will decide the NCAA representative.

Akron defeated Austin Peay 76-61 and Evansville edged Wabash 70-68 in overtime at Evansville in first-round games in the Midwest regional of the NCAA Small College Tournament.

Baylor Could Better Old NW Scoring High

Just one of his better evenings could put Elgin Baylor ahead of the 625 points that earned him the Pacific Northwest collegiate basketball scoring title in 1957.

The Seattle University All America, who hit 60 points in one game and has had several 47-and-up performances, had 792 when the books were closed for the week Saturday. He was 150 ahead of Chuck Curtis of Pacific Lutheran, who splurged into second place.

Baylor has at least three games left to play, one each against Idaho State and Bradley and the third against the Skyline champion in the National Collegiate

Athletic Assn. tourney warmup. The latter is likely to be Wyoming.

A winning streak for Seattle U. in post-season play could open the way for Baylor to become the Northwest's second thousand-point man. Johnny O'Brien, also of Seattle U., scored 1051 in 1952.

Loren Anderson of Seattle Pacific, third man on the list, has finished his season with 613 points. The little guy still tops the field in free throws with 211 to Baylor's 208. All other men in the top ten still have games to play.

Dave Gardner of Northwest Nazarene became the fourth man to hit 600 for the season. Idaho's Gary Simmons and Southern Oregon's Bill Hollingsworth were the only players in the 500 area, with 512. The other leaders, all with more than 400 points, were Jack Riley of Linfield, Jack Winters of Portland State, Doug Smart of Washington, and Dave Gambee of Oregon State.

Davey Moore Grabs Verdict

LOS ANGELES (UP)—Davey Moore, No. 1 featherweight contender looking for a match with the champ, mowed down Vince Delgado Thursday night with a knockout in the third round of Olympic Auditorium's 10-round main event.

The hard-punching Springfield, Ohio, battler floored Delgado, 127, Los Angeles, in the second with a smashing right cross and a left hook that caught up with him in the third.

Moore, 127-pound veteran of 36 professional fights, ended a five-hour series of punches with a left hook to send Delgado to the canvas for the full count.

Delgado, a 3-1 underdog going into the bout, attempted to struggle to his feet but was counted out. His meeting with Moore was the 14th fight of his career.

Moore zoomed from virtual obscurity in 1957 in a series of wins over some of the best in his division. The win over Delgado was his eighth straight. He has a 30-5-1 pro record.
