### KF Concert Association Cheers Local Performance

The performance Wednesday night in Klamath Falls of the De Paur Gala was a unique and thoroughly delightful program of song; a presentation which, among the group attractions presented in recent years by the Klamath Community Concerts Association, ranks with the Chicago Opera Ballet in the opinion of this lay critic.

Leonard de Paur, a competent conductor and an entrepreneur with rare showmanship, established a ready contact with his audience, and his personality infected performers and listeners as well.

Even with the program editing which excluded Mendelssohn's "Walpurgis Night," the featured attractions, "Lost in the Stars," "Carmina Burana" and "Archy and Mehitabel" provided variety, flavor and quality.

Based on Alan Paton's "Cry the Beloved Country," Kurt Weill and Maxwell Anderson's "Lost in the Stars" is a poignant story of interracial violence. Outstanding in the score were the convincing title song, sung by soprano soloist Inez Matthews, baritone soloist McHenry Boatwright and the chorus; the comic relief "Big Black Mole," sung by Berniece Hall, an exceptionally fine singer-actress; and the staccato beat "Train to Johannesburg." The story in song, narrated by Paul Westbrook, offered a perfect blend of current drama and contemporary music.

Baritone Boatwright lacks his director's ability to establish a quick and personal contact with his audience, yet his masterful voice and his tremendous range were exhibited in portions of "Carmina Burana." The text of this choral work dates to the 13th century, and was rediscovered in an old Benedictine monastery in the Bavarian Alps south of Munich.

But eliciting the most comment from local concert-goers, some pro and some con, was the "back alley opera," George Kleinsinger's "Archy and Mehitabel." Truly a hecatomb opera, with a jazz-flavored score refreshing and amusing, the production was a masterpiece of imagination in staging, with only a few stools and chairs for props. Melvin Stewart amusingly portrayed "Archy," the comic cockroach who peeks out platitudes on politics philosophy and love on a

### Bolivian Leader Not To Resign

LA PAZ, Bolivia (AP)—President Hernan Siles Zuazo has withdrawn his resignation at the urging of 13 unions. Congress had not acted on it.

The President sent Congress his resignation earlier this week because labor groups headed by Juan Lechin objected to an austerity program designed by U.S. experts to bolster Bolivia's economy.

The 13 pro-Siles Zuazo unions struck yesterday, tying up transportation in La Paz, and said they would stay out until the President withdrew his resignation.

### SNOW SURVEY

In urging generosity during the drive, Mrs. Rubidoux said that over \$40,000 was expended for relief in Siskiyou County following the disastrous fires on the Klamath River in 1955. She pointed out it is the only national organization equipped to meet major disasters.
