### KF Mill Buys Timber Tract

ALTURAS — The Border Mountain unit consisting of 3,800,000 board feet of sugar pine and ponderosa pine and 1,600,000 board feet of fir was sold Monday to Loren Palmerton of Klamath Falls. Palmerton bid \$44.85 per thousand for the pine and \$5.35 for the fir. Other participating bidders were the White Pine Lumber Company of Alturas, the Chiloquin Timber Company and the Ellingson Lumber Company of Klamath Falls.

The Ellingson Lumber Company of Klamath Falls was high bidder on the Bruin Flat unit. The Chiloquin Lumber Company and White Pine Lumber Company also submitted bids. High bid was \$44.99 per thousand for 905,000 board feet of ponderosa and sugar pine and \$8.35 for 3,135,000 feet of fir. The total bid price for the two units exceeded the appraised price by \$65,265.

Both units are located west of the old Long Bell Camp in Siskiyou County.

### Special Tax Move Backed

DUNSMUIR — Inefficient hand labor methods justify the request for an additional tax rate of 12 cents per \$100 assessed valuation for street equipment, John Petty, superintendent of public works, states.

Dunsmuir voters are being asked to approve a special tax for the next five years at the city election April 8. Petty said there are 14 miles of streets in the city, nine without curbs and gutters. Maintenance, grading and drainage is almost impossible with present equipment, Petty said, and the present \$1 per \$100 tax rate does not allow the public works department sufficient budget for equipment purchase.

Through the tax raise about \$30,000 could be raised, Petty said, for the purchase of a four-wheel-drive truck with a five yard dump body and push plow and a used street grader and accessories.

Use of an additional truck with the one purchased five years ago could save the city \$20 a day hauling blacktop from Redding, Petty stated. Street improvement cannot keep pace with street deterioration at present, he concluded and hopes the citizenry will see the ultimate economy in providing adequate equipment.

### School Post Filing Outlined

City school clerk Harold Ashley advises that April 4 is the deadline date for filing as a candidate for the elementary school board of directors. April 24 is the deadline for filing as a candidate for the high school board of directors.

It was erroneously reported by the Herald and News March 6 that the deadline for filing in both districts would be April 5. School board members whose terms expire this year are Letha Murphy on the elementary board and Jack Linman on the high school board. Each of the terms is for a five-year period beginning July 1, 1958. The incumbents have not indicated whether they will seek reelection.

The school board and budget elections will be May 5.
