Unemployed In Small Dip

About 1,400 workers went back to work last month to reduce the number of active jobseekers to 73,600 but the trend was not sufficient to cut payments that have been averaging \$1,500,000 a week since the year-end. Benefit reserves dropped below the \$31,500,000 estimated floor in the first week of March, making certain that unemployment tax rates of 26.000 employer accounts will go to the normal 2.7 per cent on second quarter payrolls.

Fifteen local offices of the State Unemployment Compensation Commission reported slight improvement in job opportunities during the month, while 11 noted new layoffs, particularly in wood products and some other industries. The number of unemployed rose 18,400 or a third higher than a year ago.

Bend, Klamath Falls, LaGrande, Medford, North Bend, Roseburg and The Dalles reported increases over recent comparable periods. A reduction of 3.6 per cent in the number of jobseekers came from the Portland four-county metropolitan area but the total of 29,600 was considerably higher than the 19,300 last year. Payments to the insured unemployed reached \$5,811,681, 1.4 x 1 month, highest February total in the 21-year history of the commission and exceeded only by January's \$6,884,704. With claimants nearing 120,000 since the start of the benefit year last July payments have gone to 75,000 workers with 9,000 exhausting their benefit rights.

The increase in tax rates on second quarter payrolls (due in July) will affect about 12,000 employers who will pay at reduced rates from 0.8 to 2.4 per cent already assigned for the first quarter of 1958. The remaining 14,000 employers, including nearly 6,000 employers of two or three workers normally subject to the law, pay the normal 2.7 per cent until they qualify for experience rating. This uniform tax will continue until benefit reserves rise over the "floor" at the end of a quarter.

TIMBER MEN'S MEETING — YREKA — The annual timber operators meeting to discuss the 1958 timber sales program on the Klamath National Forest will begin at 10 a.m. March 24, in the Yreka City Hall.

Forest Supervisor R. W. Bower points out that in addition to presenting the 1958 sales program, relating topics such as access roads, fire control, and other matters will be discussed. All timber operators and other interested persons are invited to attend.

Continuance Of Road Levy Up To Voters In Primary

Klamath County residents will vote May 16 on whether or not to continue assessing the special three-mill road levy over another five-year period.

Members of the Klamath County Court point out that the current five-year levy expires July 1 of 1959, but that the matter will be put to the voters during the primary election this year so that it will not be necessary to schedule a special election when the levy expires next year.

County Judge Charlie Mack and Commissioners Jerry Rajnos and Ed Gowen fully endorse passage of the levy so that already surfaced and oiled roads can be adequately maintained, and so that other needed spans in the county can be oiled and improved and constructed.

Soroptimists Hear Nurse

Services of the Klamath County Health Department, headed by Dr. Seth Kerron, county health officer, were presented for members of the Klamath Falls Soroptimist Club at the March 6 luncheon meeting at the Winema Hotel.

The speaker, Hilda Boyle, supervising nurse of the department, who illustrated her talk with colored slides, said the office is operated with local, state and federal funds. Specialized training for health officers and nurses requires special preparation and rigid training, despite some opinion that "only nurses and doctors who cannot qualify for other positions find their way into public health work."

She named fields of service as covering among many, control of communicable diseases, restaurant inspection, immunization, mental health problems, child welfare clinics, mother and baby care, home visiting, school student checks, and personal interviews.

The present staff includes Dr. Kerron, five public health nurses and a sanitarian, plus assistance from a psychologist and a psychiatrist.

Klamath County, the speaker said, has an outstanding record in the state for fields of service.

Miss Boyle, graduate of the University of Minnesota, was introduced by Margaret Larkin, program chairman. Next week's luncheon will be followed by a business meeting.

Guests this week were Mrs. Sig Unander, wife of the Republican candidate for governor of Oregon, and Mrs. Darrell L. Heard, this city.

Mayor Makes Safety Plea

DUNSMUIR — "Seven out of every 10 accidents happen off the job," J. Morgan Jones, Dunsmuir's mayor, told a crowd of several hundred assembled for the launching of a community-industry safety campaign March 3.

Jones asked the people of Dunsmuir to equal the record of Shasta Division of Southern Pacific and qualify for national safety recognition. "Operation Safety" for Dunsmuir is tied in with Southern Pacific's yellow flag campaign urging employees to use caution before hazards develop.

Lee Clark, police chief, noted Dunsmuir has experienced five straight years without a pedestrian fatality and said this could continue.

A. W. Kilborn, Shasta Division superintendent, accepted a safety plaque in behalf of the employees of the division from J. W. Corbett of San Francisco, SP vice president. The award was from SP president, D. J. Russell, recognizing the top safety record among the system's 10 divisions.

Shasta Division had only 1.23 personal injuries per million man hours in 1957.

MOUNT SHASTA — The drive for funds for the American Red Cross in Mount Shasta will get underway Tuesday, March 11, and continue during the month. This was announced at a meeting in the Mount Shasta City Hall Tuesday, March 4, which was presided over by county Red Cross chairman Judge Kenneth T. Stone.

Among those attending were Mount Shasta Mayor Phil Googins; Carl Ross, Red Cross field man of San Francisco; Charles O'Donnell, Yreka; Judge John Kinstry, Mount Shasta, and more than 20 other interested persons.

Mrs. Julia Sartor, in charge of the Mount Shasta campaign, announced that the local quota would be \$1,000.

Justifying fund collections, Mount Shasta's Chief of Police Harold Barnum told that seldom a week passed without his department having to call on Red Cross workers to aid some stranded traveler who had to be helped with food, gasoline or other necessities.

Siskiyou County executive secretary Charles O'Donnell stated that Red Cross funds for relief in Siskiyou County following the floods of December 1955 exceeded collections in the county for the past 30 years.
