

Event Theme For Postmark

ASHLAND — Mail postmarked at Oregon's first class post offices will carry an Oregon Shakespearean Festival inscription for the next six months, calling attention to the theater's expanded 1958 season. Postmasters throughout the state received authorization this week from Edwin A. Riley, director of the Postal Service Division of the Federal Post Office Department, Riley's letter to more than 35 stations approved the use of the cancellation message "in view of the information furnished this office regarding the scope of this activity and the interest it has engendered."

Text of the imprint, which will appear on Oregon mail dispatched to all parts of the world between March 15 and September 15, reads: "1958 Oregon Shakespearean Festival, July 23-September 4, 1958." In order to qualify for this service, an organization must be nonprofit in structure and must submit evidence of national or international interest; it must also show a large geographical scope in its participation. The Oregon event — the oldest organization of

its kind in the Western Hemisphere — is staffed by performers and technicians from England, Canada and all parts of the U.S.; its international audiences are 73 per cent tourist, annually representing all states and many foreign countries. A board of directors, selected from a large open membership, governs the yearly attraction, which was recently listed prominently in the "Saturday Review" Calendar of World Events, along with the Edinburgh, Salzburg, and other similar festivals.

Festival officials expressed their belief that the postal messages will help stimulate Oregon's growing tourist trade, with benefit to all parts of the state. During the six-month period large volumes of mail bearing the inscription will be delivered to homes and businesses around the globe.
