Klamath Union High School's concert band left at noon Thursday, March 6, for Eugene where a public concert was presented that

evening by both KU and South Eugene high schools.

Half-hour periods, in which the bands played separately, consisted of the first part of the program. Then the two bands merged and played three selections together.

Upon arrival in Eugene, Klamath Union's band rehearsed the combined numbers with South Eugene. Housing was furnished by South Eugene band members, so following the rehearsal KU students were assigned to their quarters.

Selections played in the concert by KU's band were "March Colonel Bogey" by Kenneth J. Allford; "Allerseelen (All Soul's Day)" composed by R. Strauss, arranged by Davis; "Raymond Overture" composed by A. Thomas, arranged by Saffrank; "Great Gate of Kiev" by Mussorgsky-Leiden and "Fandango" by Perkins.

Combined numbers were "King John" (Tone Poem) by Moellmann; "Grand Festival" (Overture) by Zamecnik; and "The Thunder March" by Sousa.

Early the next morning the Klamath Union students started home.

## Kudos Won At Mock 'UN'

Honorable mention was given to Klamath Union High School who represented Great Britain at the annual International Relations League's Model United Nations 20-22.

Four hundred and fifteen students from all over Oregon attended the three-day meeting. Wilson High School of Portland was voted the top delegation, with Klamath Falls, South Eugene and Lebanon as runners-up.

In the closing moments of the session, delegates to the MUN defeated a resolution that would have censured Great Britain for sinking a Turkish ship.

"The students did a very admirable job and stayed alert every moment," stated Mr. Paul Deller, adviser.

The session was sponsored jointly by the Oregon Education Association and the University of Oregon.

## Quill, Scroll Reorganized

After being inactive since 1947, Quill and Scroll has been reorganized at Klamath Union High School and named the Frank Jenkins chapter.

Only 10 students from KU will be chosen by the national chapter of Quill and Scroll to join the local organization. Students interested in the club are Leah Hill, Neleta Dunlap, Judy Ellis, Betty Yancey, Jo Ann Bogatay, John Nolen, Fred Heard, Pat Carroll, Ronnie Owens and Sandra Spear.

Purpose of Quill and Scroll is to instill in students the ideal of scholarship; to advance the standards of the profession of journalism by developing better journalists and a higher core of ethics; to promote exact and dispassionate thinking, and clear and forceful writing.

Since a chapter of Quill and Scroll in a school exists to reward the individual student for meritorious work, the size of the group to be chosen for membership depends upon: (1) The level of ability of the staff as a whole for a particular year; (2) The number of staff members meeting the general requirements of the society; (3) The particular requirements of the adviser, which may be based upon the number of lines published, or a point system of grading for staff work; factors which vary with local conditions and frequency of publication.

It is never the size of the chapter, but its presence that is significant to adviser and staff. A chapter that is small, in relation to the size of the group interested in journalism, well organized and with the purpose for which it exists known and understood by the student body, is the ideal by which the honorary journalistic group may fulfill its objective.

The local chapter is the heart of Quill and Scroll. The member belongs to an international organization; his membership widens his horizon, increases his journalistic perspective, and gives him the prestige of membership in an honorary scholastic society; but in the final analysis, benefits the student in proportion to his participation in the activities of his own chapter.

K Club's goal is "to encourage interest and participation in varsity athletics at KUHS, to cultivate an understanding of problems of athletics among the faculty, and to promote good sportsmanship at all times."

A major change of the lettermen's club is the name of the organization. In the past few years it has been known as the "K-Club." However, the proper name of the club when it was first organized many years ago was "Order of the K." The new constitution points out the newly adopted name as being "Order of the K."

The club's activities include maintaining the K Club section during basketball games, selling refreshments at athletic events, patrolling noon dances and assemblies, and the K Club Carnival.
