Gambee Put On 2nd Team

NEW YORK (NEA)—If anybody knows a basketball player, it's a guy like Fuzzy Levane, an All-American himself at St. John's, a great pro, a coach in the National Basketball Association and now a full time scout for the New York Knickerbockers.

When Fuzzy Levane says Elgin Baylor has every shot in the book and great strength, besides, you listen—and nod. Fuzzy knows, because he's seen him. Just as he's flown up to Corvallis, Oregon to see Dave Gambee pop them for Oregon State, or down to San Francisco to watch Mike Farmer.

The St. Louis Hawks, too, have men like Fuzzy canvassing the country—31 of them. And so do the other professional teams.

To get a bona fide All-America basketball team, NEA Service and The Herald and News have gone to these men whose business it is to know the best. And these are their selections.

Experience? Baylor, Dees and Rodgers are all seniors who've been in every tight spot on a basketball court and know how to react.

Native talent? Has there ever been a basketball player better endowed than Chamberlain, the Big Dipper of the Jayhawks, who carries a mediocre team on his tremendous, agile frame?

Crowd appeal? Robertson, the sensational sophomore (and that's the only description you can give him) would fill any arena in the country.

Oscar, Wilt and Elgin have been tossing coins all season for the national scoring leadership, each pouring in the points at a clip of 30 or more at an outing. Joe Lapchick calls Robertson "the greatest sophomore I've ever seen." Eddie Gottlieb drools at the prospect of Chamberlain's availability to his Philadelphia Warriors in '60. And Baylor may be the top choice in the pro draft this spring.

That is, if the Minneapolis Lakers don't decide they could use Archie Dees to better advantage. Minnesota coach Ozzie Cowles called him "far superior to Don Schlund," a former Hoosier All-American.

Rodgers is the playmaker of this quintet, while scoring 20 points a game himself, the flashiest college player in the country.

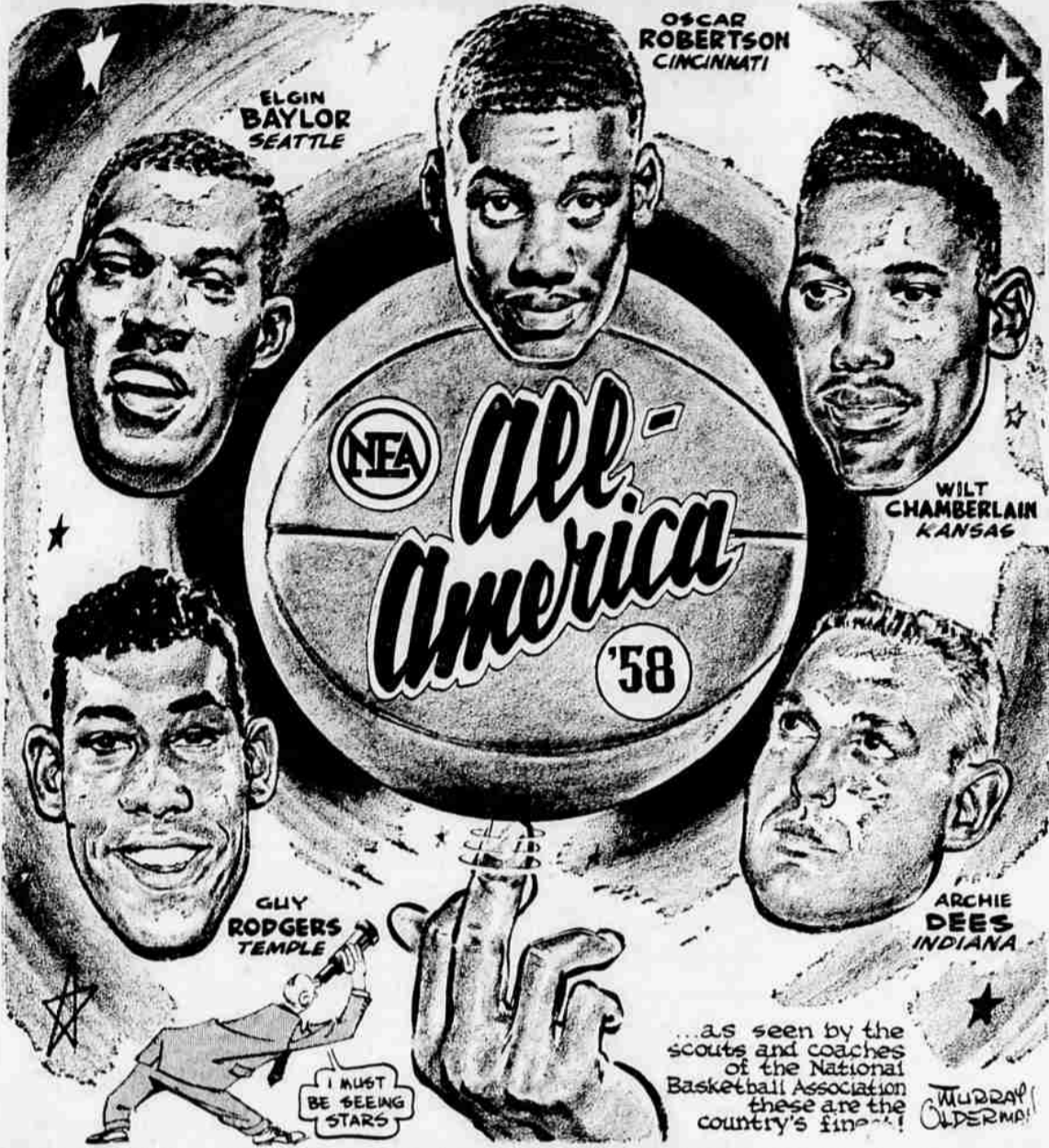

GOVERNMENT CAMP, Ore. (AP)—Oregon skiers ended the three-year Idaho domination of the Northwest Ski Assn. combined junior championships here Sunday by making a clean sweep of the meet's top places.

The first two places in the junior expert men's and women's combined were captured by Oregon youths. The women's list was headed by the skiing Saubert sisters of Lakeview, Joan and Jean. Terry Skjersaa, Bend and Joe Darr, Government Camp, led the boys.

Joan won the women's combined crown by .38 of a point. She edged out her sister by four tenths of a second in Sunday's downhill event.

Skjersaa placed third in the downhill and second in the slalom to beat Darr by a point.

The meet was the largest ever held on Mount Hood with 170 youngsters participating.

Mike Buckley of Seattle won the downhill race for junior expert men. Ed Ward, McCall, Idaho, who won the junior expert men's slalom Saturday, was disqualified for the slalom.

Twelve-year-old Karen Vance of Spokane, who placed first in the women's expert slalom Saturday, was third in both the downhill event and combined standings.

The Saubert sisters, Skjersaa and Darr won places on the PNSA team for the junior nationals at Winter Park, Colo., March 20-23.

California's Golden Bears and Oregon State's Beavers, two teams that faded in the clutch, meet Monday night at Eugene to decide which gets a berth in the NCAA regional basketball tournament.

They tied for the Pacific Coast Conference title, each with a 12-4 record, because the Beavers lost 62-55 to Idaho Saturday and the Bears lost 64-62 to Oregon Friday. Those were their last regular season games.

The last-minute title dither in the league can be attributed largely to the unpredictable Idaho Vandals, who upset both clubs in the closing weeks of the season.
