Fort Rock-Silver Lake Soil District Holds Annual Meet

FORT ROCK — Verne Cady, Burns, speaking at the annual meeting of the Fort Rock-Silver Lake Soil Conservation District Tuesday, told of the struggle in behalf of Eastern Oregon in school reorganization legislation passed at the 1957 session. He also spoke of his work on the highway committee, both during 1957 and during the interim.

Slides of the Legislature in session were a feature of his morning presentation which included the pupils of Fort Rock and Silver Lake schools.

A highlight of the day was the annual speaking contest between the two schools with Joan Perry, eighth grade daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Branch, Fort Rock, winning first place and the privilege of keeping the district plaque at Fort Rock School. Joan's name

will be engraved as 1958 winner. Second in the contest was Dale Swearingen of Silver Lake and third, Olivia Seelen of Fort Rock. Other contestants were Karen Kimsey and Linda Nelson of Silver Lake and Roger Miles, Fort Rock. Nine other pupils had prepared speeches and were eliminated in local contests. Teachers are Mrs. Frakes, Silver Lake, and Hubert Wagers, Fort Rock.

Merchandise gift certificates were presented in behalf of Bend merchants.

Bill Anderson, Soil Conservation Service range specialist of Pendleton, spoke on range conservation. Using slides he demonstrated range readiness of key forage plants.

The lower grade pupils of the two schools presented a conservation skit.

Dick Yates of Silver Lake, chairman of the North Lake County Telephone Committee, reported on the hearing held at Lakeview in February, stating that the situation now looks more favorable toward possible service to this area.

Also taking part in the program were Lloyd Gift, Bonanza rancher and director of the Oregon Association of Soil Conservation Districts; Duane Crane and Jack Gillette, SCS technicians who work with the district; and J. D. Cornum, Silver Lake, Lake County commissioner.

Robert Morehouse, Fort Rock, was elected to the board of supervisors replacing R. A. Long, D. A. Schumacher and Eston Porter, both of Silver Lake, were reelected as supervisors.

Other visitors were Oris Rudd, Lake County extension agent; Roy Johnson and Fred Greenfield of the Bend SCS office and Wall Risse, Bonanza.

Mrs. Anne Sprague, Lake County superintendent of schools, in introducing Cady pointed out the able work he has done in representing all parts of his large legislative district.

A potluck luncheon was served at noon to more than 130 by ladies of Fort Rock Grange, with Mrs. Truman Kimsey and Mrs. Robert Morehouse in charge.

Zoning Plan Aired At Meet

MOUNT SHASTA—The proposed zoning ordinance in and around Mount Shasta brought considerable discussion at the public hearing before the Mount Shasta City Council at its March 9 meeting.

Property owned by the McCloud River Railway Company on the north of town, which is now listed as restricted industrial, has been requested by the company to be made unrestricted. This property is near a planned residential area.

Frank M. Asbell, chairman of the planning group, defended the board's actions by pointing out sites available for unrestricted development where noise, odor or dust would not bother residential areas. Asbell had the backing of several residents whose homes would be less attractive if undesirable industry were nearby.

Rey D. Black, representing the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter Day Saints of Salt Lake, said the \$50,000 church his group planned to build near town would be moved elsewhere if the property became unrestricted.

On the other side, Sidney Mumm and W. E. Grossen stated that to curtail railroad development meant lessened payrolls, less favorable rail rates, less chance for residents to make a living and would be a discrimination against established property owners.

Before the proposed zoning ordinance can become a law it must be ratified by the Mount Shasta City Council, Siskiyou County Planning Commission and the county supervisors.

Mayor Phil Googins explained the meeting was for the purpose of learning the wishes of the majority.

A second and final hearing will be held Friday evening, March 21 in the city hall. The mayor urges all interested persons to come to the meeting or to write city officials how they stand on the subject.

Stove Fumes Claim Seven

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) — A sheriff's deputy found the bodies of seven persons and a dog when he kicked open the door of a tightly shut home here last night. They had been asphyxiated by a butane gas stove.

Coroner Alphonse Dickenson said the victims had evidently been dead since Saturday night.

Dead were Mr. and Mrs. Luke Vaughn and their daughter, about 16; William Harris, 52; his wife Jeannette, 45; of Chowchilla; their daughter, Mrs. Beatrice Galloway, 18, Victorville; and a girl about 2, believed to be Mrs. Galloway's daughter.

Also dead was a small dog but two other dogs in another part of the Vaughn home survived.

Sheriff's Lt. Robert Saum found the bodies when he went to the house at the request of Vaughn's employer when the man failed to show up for work Monday.

Saum said he could get no answer although lights were on in the house. All the windows and doors were tightly closed, he said, and a new heater was in place "but apparently no ventilator had been rigged for it."

Gunfire Halts Prison Riot

PETROS, Tenn. (AP) — State prison officials heard convicts' grievances after a gunfire barrage halted a second night of rioting at Brushy Mountain State Prison.

Among other things, spokesmen for the rioters complained of "cruelty by the guards" and "unequal treatment of prisoners."

One prisoner, Fred Roberts of Knoxville, was wounded in the cheek by a guard's shotgun during a mass attempt last night to break out of the prison, isolated in the rugged Cumberland Mountains about 50 miles west of Knoxville. As he was carried out to a hospital at nearby Oak Ridge — where his condition later was reported not serious — the other prisoners became ominously silent. They returned to their cell wing.

Soon thereafter, State Commissioner of Institutions Keith Hampton arrived from Nashville, the state capital, and met with two spokesmen for the white prisoners.

Afterwards, he told a news conference: "I cannot tell what will be the outcome of this meeting, but I hope the riot will be ended."

Hampton said he and Warden Frank Llewellyn told the spokesmen their grievances were "very small" and said the prisoners agreed.

The second night of rioting erupted when four prisoners managed to break out of their cell. This gave access to the master lever opening the other cells, and they freed 300 convicts.

Dodging gunfire, they went to the prison hospital and visitors' gallery, wrecking the foyer as they had wrecked their cell wing a night earlier. But when Roberts was wounded, they ceased the disturbance and agreed to send their spokesmen to meet with Hampton.

Grievances included the cruelty and unequal treatment charges, complaints that prisoners weren't told what outgoing mail would pass censors, and what they called lack of recreation facilities.

Prison officials contended that the convicts had no valid complaints.

ADENAUER TO LONDON

LONDON (UP) — West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer will pay an official visit to London April 16-18 for talks with Prime Minister Harold Macmillan, informed diplomatic sources said today.

Father Kills Son, Suicides

PEORIA, Ill. (AP) — A despondent father took his son to dinner last night, bought him toys and candy and then, police said, penned a lengthy note to his estranged wife and shot and killed the boy and himself.

Police found the bodies of Louis C. Larson, 32, and his 6-year-old son Ronnie together in bed in Larson's one-room basement apartment. Larson was an employee of a U.S. Department of Agriculture laboratory in Peoria.

Police said a five-page handwritten note telling of the father's despondency and his reasons for the shooting was found in the room. A new kite, several candy bars, a half-empty bag of candy and an empty milk shake carton were on a bedside table.

Police said the boy, fully clothed and tucked into bed, had been shot in the back of the head. Larson, a 22-caliber rifle along side him in bed, had been shot in the right temple.

Officers said Larson and his wife Gladys had been estranged two weeks ago after a series of marital difficulties. Both had taken separate apartments. The boy had been living with his mother and police said Mrs. Larson told them her husband apparently had taken the boy from her apartment while she was out.
