



THE TURQUOISE AND WHITE LANAI pictured above is entirely skylighted and open to the outdoors during the summer months. Italian glass mosaic tiles in shades of blue, border the angular pool and match the blue of the ceiling beams.

Indoor plantings, not shown in this limited view, carry out the oriental motif. The family room, kitchen, dining room, living room and master bedroom all have direct access through sliding glass walls to the lanai and swimming pool, an area of approximately 2,000 square feet.

Dawn Bockmier, decorator for this architect's dream house designed and built by Donald K. MacGillivray in Spokane, chose rattan upholstered in white for the furniture across the pool on the gleaming white vinyl deck. Throw pillows of Italian cotton are in a jade-green and lime plaid. One of the most spectacular houses built in the Pacific Northwest was recently completed in Spokane. Donald K. MacGillivray, the designer and builder of this unique house, said that he got his inspiration from a trip to Hawaii several years ago. He said that his main goal was to build a home with an enclosed pool "that completely avoided the YMCA look."

His finished dream home with its indoor pool and lanai has captured the feeling of the Hawaiian-

Japanese style of architecture by the use of simple lines, upcurved eaves and shoji panel effect achieved with black trim on white surfaces.

The magnificent combination of unobstructed view through sliding glass walls and the tasteful employment of color in the dramatic 12-room dwelling has drawn inquiries from various newspapers and national magazines.

Picture coverage and details of the "swimming pool house" were given in the Spokane, Washington Spokesman-Review in December, and the house is a picture-feature in the March national outdoor living magazine, Town and Country.

This newspaper's interest stems from the fact that Dawn Bockmier, decorator for the superbly handsome house, claims Klamath Falls as her home town. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Whitlock, well known local residents, 230 North Sixth Street.

A comparative newcomer in the interior decorating field, Dawn's sensational success is truly background material for a "local girl makes good" story.

On January 17, she was mar-

ried to David Moon, and the following is quoted from that day's issue of the Spokesman-Review: "Dawn Bockmier, E27 Eighth, prominent interior decorator, and David Moon, Opportunity, will be married tonight in Las Vegas, Nevada. They were to leave by plane early this morning."

The item said that the bride would wear a navy blue sheer wool two-piece dress "accented with white. Her big picture hat laden with flowers was also white."
