Aside to the Milwaukee fan who sent a weeping willow tree to New York Yankee Manager Casey Stengel:

It made O' Casey mad. But that's not the only reason Stengel is angry. His Yankees need some willows with base hits in them.

The American League champs dropped a 1-0 verdict to the Boston Red Sox for their fifth loss and third whitewashing in six exhibition starts.

After the game, Stengel alerted regulars Hank Bauer, Bill Skowron and Gil McDougald. "Be ready to work by the weekend," he told the tender-armed trio. "We gotta win a ball game pretty soon."

In commenting on the \$45 bill he received from a tree nursery in Wisconsin for "one weeping willow delivered at Glendale, Calif. (Stengel's home)," Casey said, "The guy who pulled the joke is going to find it expensive, because the willow goes right back unless the New York club wants to pay for it."

The Yankees managed only six hits off Frank Sullivan, George Sussie and Al Schroll. Billy Conzolo got the winning hit for Boston, a long single to left center after Sammy White's double in the third inning.

Milwaukee raked Johnny Podres for six runs in the first two innings as the Braves defeated the Los Angeles Dodgers 8-2. Doubles by Andy Pafko, Johnny Logan and Felix Mantilla featured a four-run outburst by the Braves in the second inning. Felipe Montemayor homered for Los Angeles.

Ted Williams Changes On Helmet Views

SARASOTA, Fla. (UP)—The furor over whether Ted Williams would defy American League President Will Harridge's mandate that all players wear protective helmets this season turned out to be a tempest in a teapot.

The Boston Red Sox slugger said Thursday he not only will wear the protective helmet, but that he has been wearing one for the past ten days. The headgear is not the plastic type worn by National Leaguers. Instead it is a regular baseball cap with a protective helmet lining made of fibre.

What made Ted change his mind is not known, but earlier the 39-year-old batting champion had stoutly maintained he would not wear a helmet, asserting it interfered with his timing. Williams, however, had advised other players to wear helmets.

The rule was passed during the American League club owners' meeting last January 25, but had been kept secret for some time. It was not until weeks later that Frank Lane, general manager of the Cleveland Indians, let the cat out of the bag when he told reporters that the league had voted 7-1, in favor of it. The lone dissenting club was the Boston Red Sox.

The National League already has this rule.
