Jackie Robinson Defends Ex-Mates

NEW YORK (UP)—Jackie Robinson sprang to the support of his ex-Dodgers teammates today by dismissing Billy Herman's charges of complacency and laziness as "pure, unadulterated poppycock."

"Guys like Peeewe Reese, Duke Snider and Gil Hodges have too much pride to let the team fall apart around their ears," said the ex-Dodger great who now is director of personnel for the Chicago Cubs.

"Herman knows better than to say what he did."

Herman, an ex-Dodger coach now in the same role for the world champion Milwaukee Braves, said recently that the Dodgers "lacked the desire" to be a strong pennant challenger. His remarks created scarcely a ripple among the Dodgers training at Vero Beach, Fla., but Robinson made it plain he's still willing to fight for the club even if he isn't a member of it any more.

"I think the Dodgers are going to have a great year in Los Angeles," he said. "They have some problems but they're still a powerful team. And they'll draw crowds in Los Angeles that'll make those old turnouts in Brooklyn look tiny in comparison."

Robinson has no official connection with baseball any more but still receives requests for advice from young players and remains alert to the problems other Negro players may encounter.

On the former, Robinson says: "I tell a young player to go through college if he can. Then I advise him to be tough-minded in his negotiations with the clubs he signs with. I tell him not to listen to that baloney about bonuses ruining kids. And I tell him to remember when the club can't use you any more it's going to drop you — so get it while you can."

On the latter, Jackie is his usual aggressive self: "There is still a strong undercurrent of opposition to Negroes in baseball. And there isn't a single Negro player in the game today who is aggressive enough to ensure that the Negro will continue to make progress in the game. The trouble with most of them is they don't want to rock the boat."

Robinson said he was delighted with his executive job and entertained no desire to return to the game whose unwritten color line he broke in 1947.

"In 1950 I had a desire to become a manager eventually," he said. "But five years later I decided I would not pay the price to get the chance. I could have stayed in baseball if I acted the way the front office wanted me to act. But I decided I would not."

Delany Bids For Indoor Mile Record

CHICAGO (AP)—Ron Delany, Ireland's swift-striding gift to Villanova University, gets his next-to-last 1958 try at the world indoor mile record in the Chicago Relays tonight.

A capacity 10,000 in the International Amphitheater will watch the Irish Olympic champion scurry after the world mark of 4:03.6 which he missed by only a tenth of a second last month.

Four other Olympic gold medal winners will perform in the meet. Delany has won the Olympic 1,500-meter event.

Delany, seeking his 23rd consecutive indoor victory at the distance, defends the Banker's Mile title he won last year in 4:03.8.

The world record of 4:03.6 was set by Denmark's Gunnar Nielsen in New York in 1955. Delany was clocked in 4:03.7 in the National AAU Championships in New York last month.

It probably is tonight or never this year for Delany. He makes his final indoor appearance in Cleveland next week and there he must travel 12 laps to the mile. Tonight, he needs to circle the spruce boards only 11 times the same number he did in his near record-matching effort last month.

He has three rivals, including Burr Grim of the University of Maryland; Jim Beatty, formerly of North Carolina, and Phil Coleman of Chicago. Delany and Grim had a little body-checking episode last week as the Irishman triumphed in the mile feature of the K. of C. Meet in New York.

The other Olympic stars defend Chicago Relays titles. Charley Jenkins, the 400-meter Olympic winner, defends at 600 yards. Ira Murchison, member of the victorious U.S. 400-meter relay team in the 1956 Melbourne Games, tries to keep his 50-yard dash title.

Olympic broad jump champion Greg Bell challenges Murchison in the 50 spring. There is no broad jump competition. Glenn Davis, Olympic 400-meter hurdle winner, seeks the 60 high hurdles title.

Two Injured In NHL Play

BOSTON (UP)—Boston Bruins winger Jerry Toppazzini and Montreal goalie Jacques Plante were hospitalized in good condition today following injuries in Thursday night's National Hockey League donnybrook at the Garden.

Plante sustained a slight brain concussion when teammate Doug Harvey crashed into Boston winger Vic Stasiuk at the corner of the Canadiens cage in the second period. The impact sent Plante sprawling backward against the left goalpost and then to the ice.

Toppazzini fell to the ice in the first period behind the Montreal net after a collision on the boards. His eye, struck by a hockey stick, hemorrhaged badly immediately after the injury and he lost temporary vision in it. However, the hemorrhaging stopped shortly.

The third-place Bruins posted a 7-3 victory against the Canadiens, who clinched the NHL race two weeks ago.

Dodgers Not Dead Despite Campy Loss

VERO BEACH, Fla. (UP)—Any club looking for a catcher? Not the Los Angeles Dodgers, who have lost one of the best in the business—Roy Campanella.

"They all are saying we are hurting for catching since that unfortunate automobile accident to Roy," said General Manager Buzz Bavasi of the Dodgers.

"But I don't think we're too bad off for catching. After all, how many really good catchers are there in the league?"

Walter Alton, the Dodger manager sitting next to Bavasi, lifted up two fingers.

"You can name them," Alton said. "I won't."

PRETTY CLEAR

There was no doubt he meant Ed Bailey of the Cincinnati Reds and Stan Lopata of the Philadelphia Phillies.

"We aren't making any offers for any catchers," said Bavasi. "We are not worried about our catching."

Asked if he wasn't saying that because the other clubs may set too high a value on what catching they have, Bavasi replied: "Definitely not. We always are willing to listen to deals and we always are willing to make them. But if the other teams in this league — and in the American League, too — think they have us over the barrel because we've lost Campy, they have another thing coming."

He called Rube Walker, who has been Campanella's understudy for years, "as good a catcher as there is in the league."

Last year Walker scored in 60 games, but hit only .181. Because of his running, he is known around the league as baseball's "slow boat to China."

CAN'T MISS

"But we'll take him," Bavasi said. "And to help him out we have a kid by the name Joe Pignatano. Our scouts say he can't miss."

Told that there were reports that the Dodgers had outfielder Sandy Amoroso waived out of the league so he could be used for trade bait for a catcher with an American League club, Bavasi said: "That's ridiculous. We don't have our eyes on any American League catcher, any more than we have them on any National League catcher — except those on our own club."

Elgin Baylor Slacks Off Pace, Still High

An affliction which might be termed the Late Season Lags has cramped the scoring muscles of agile Elgin Baylor, but the big Chief of Seattle University has the Pacific Northwest title wrapped and ready for mothballs.

His 27 points Monday night against the Bradley Braves were below his 32.3 average but pushed his season total to 840. This is 14 points more than the 826 which earned him the regional crown last year, and 166 more than the total which hoisted Chuck Curtis of Pacific Lutheran into second place.

Both Curtis and Baylor have further opportunity to increase their totals. Seattle University enters the Far West NCAA regional this week in San Francisco. Pacific Lutheran is in Kansas City for a crack at the NAIA national championship it barely missed last year. Tourney games were not included in this week's compilation.

Most of the other contenders have completed their seasons. Dick Gardner of Northwest Nazarene was in third spot with 622 points this week. Loren Anderson of Seattle Pacific was fourth with 613 and Bill Hollingsworth of Southern Oregon College fifth with 539.

Merchant Marines Football Hopes Up

NEW YORK (UP)—The admiral, complete with the usual quota of gold braid, was talking defensively about football at the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy. The academy, at Kings Point, N.Y., has not been anything faintly resembling a juggernaut since instituting the sport with great expectations in 1945. In 13 seasons it has won only 37 of 109 games, hasn't scored a win since the second game of 1955 and that means 22 games in a row minus triumph.

"But we did beat Fordham in 1946," Admiral Gordon McClintock asserted.

"Yes," said the man sitting next to him. "That's why they gave up football."

Even the admiral chuckled. But the situation is no joke to Harry Wright, the man who made the laugh-provoking rejoinder. Because Wright, quarterback of Notre Dame's unbeaten 1941 team and more recently an assistant to Wally Butts at Georgia, is Kings Point's new gridiron tutor.

Wright isn't accustomed to losing and the handsome man who was headed for Texas A&M as Frank Leahy's assistant before his former coach had to withdraw from the job is determined to field a winning team.

"I don't have a direct line to our Lord and only He knows the future," Wright says. "But I'll promise you one thing. Our boys will be in shape and they'll know how to block and tackle."

Training, after seven years at a co-ed school, doesn't present any training problems at all-male Kings Point.

"It's nice to know a guard stands at the gate all night," Harry grinned. "I've been at co-ed schools where even if you nailed the windows shut at night in the athletic dormitory the boys would still manage to get out."

Kings Point began its gridiron career ambitiously, booking such titans as Maryland, Harvard, Boston College, William and Mary, Villanova, Yale and Colgate. But the Mariners had to spend their sophomore years at sea and the roof fell in. As of now, the academy can boast only of an unbeaten wrestling team and a sailing team which "is often undefeated."

Wright knows it is a grim challenge. But the Mariners now take sea duty in the summer and he has hopes of attracting better players by selling the idea that graduates can step into \$10,000-a-year jobs as third mates or third engineers. It's an attractive pitch. "I don't figure I'm on a large white horse leading a charge which can't be stopped," Wright explains. "But we want to play better football and bigger teams. I think we can do it."

He just might, too. Harry is a determined sort. He proved that when he hitch-hiked to Notre Dame, starred as the freshman beat the varsity and won a varsity scholarship.
