Groups Study Deer Reports

YREKA—Members of two Siskiyou County sportsmen's groups today continued their studies on comparisons of the deer kill in Siskiyou County during 1957 and 1958.

The two groups—the Dunsmuir Rod and Gun Club and the Weed Gun Club — spent two weekends copying information given on thousands of deer tags.

"We will have the figures ready by March 24," said Everett Warren of Weed, vice president of the Northern Counties Wildlife Conservation Association, which sponsored the studies.

On that date the Siskiyou County supervisors will hear reports by the state fish and game department for special deer hunts in Siskiyou County this year.

Warren said the board that day will bear out the contention which his groups have been making. The two sportsmen's groups have said the 1956 special either-sex hunts almost wiped out the deer herd in eastern Siskiyou County.
