At a Thursday night meeting of interested people \$313 was credited to the project, according to Lewis Pohl, publicity director. That sum represented the \$75 pledge from the Fire Belles, \$35 collected by coin cans in business establishments, and the rest from personal and business donations. The sum was jumped by \$82.50 the following night as a result of a benefit dinner given by the Williamson River Mission Club, and on Saturday night \$204.56 was cleared for the fund by the talent show and auction put on by the Klamath discussion group. It was decided at the Thursday meeting to have the specifications for the ambulance drawn up and calls for bids will be in the near future. Proceeds from a benefit card party to be held Friday night, March 14, at the Masonic Hall, will be turned over at that time. The public is reminded that bridge, pinocle and canasta will be played and tickets are reasonably priced.
