

Favorites Pull Out Cage Nod

Seven favorites and darkhorse Seattle squared off Saturday night in the four regional finals of the NCAA basketball championship after a Friday night of thrills that saw one game won at the buzzer — between two of the nation's mightiest teams — settled in overtime.

Here's how they lined up for Saturday night's engagements to decide the four contestants for the deciding rounds at Louisville, Ky., March 21-22:

At Charlotte, N.C.—Temple vs. Dartmouth.

At Lexington, Ky.—Notre Dame vs. Kentucky.

At Lawrence, Kan.—Kansas State vs. Oklahoma State.

At San Francisco—Seattle vs. California.

Victories by all except Seattle were more or less expected. But the Chieftains came through as All-America Elgin Baylor, the nation's No. 2 individual scorer, led loose with a 35-foot field shot at the final buzzer to down the San Francisco Dons, best defensive outfit in the country, 69-67.

Cincinnati's All-America Oscar Robertson, leader of the scoring parade, lived up to advance notices at Lawrence but missed a free throw in the final second that would have sent the Bearcats off the floor as the winner. Third-ranked Kansas State went on to down second-ranked Cincinnati 83-60 in overtime.

Oklahoma State won the right to meet the well-balanced Wildcats from K-State with a routine 65-40 victory over Arkansas. Temple squeaked by Maryland 71-67 and Dartmouth dumped Manhattan 79-62 at Charlotte.

Kentucky had little trouble against Miami of Ohio at Lexington, winning 94-70, but Notre Dame was pressed before eliminating Indiana 94-87.

California joined Seattle in the West Coast finals with a 54-43 decision over Idaho State.

With the NCAA university competition down to eight teams, the organization's small college crown in the hands of South Dakota and the NAIA field reduced to two teams (unbent Western Illinois and defending champion Tennessee State), the NIT in New York moves back into the picture with four games.

In afternoon clashes, Niagara met Xavier of Ohio and fourth-seeded Utah took on St. John's of New York, in a nationally televised game (CBS) which started 4:30 p.m. EST. At night Fordham played at St. Francis of Loretto, Pa., and third-seeded St. Bonaventure saw action against St. Joseph's of Philadelphia.

NAIA Views Football Rules

KANSAS CITY (AP)—The National Assn. of Intercollegiate Athletics has modified its football rules to fit those being followed by high schools, junior colleges and professional teams.

Until now, the NAIA has patterned its code generally after that of the National Collegiate Athletic Assn. The NAIA adopted the modifications at a membership meeting here Friday.

By doing so, the athletic organization completed a cooperative tie-up with the National Junior College Athletic Assn. and the National Federation of State High School Activities Assn. The cooperative is known as the National Alliance Athletic Assn.

The NAIA was formed in 1957 and allied the NAIA with the other two organizations in all sports but football, a matter which was left to Friday's NAIA meeting.

Briefly, the football modifications allow free substitution; permit one player on a team to confer with his coach at the sideline during timeouts, allow fumble or backward pass to be recovered and advanced by any player; and stipulate that a successful try-for-point after touchdown is scored as one point, no matter how made.

Anthony Kayoes Foe; Asks For Heavy King

NEW YORK (AP)—What a difference one fight makes! Six months ago Tony Anthony was knocked out by Archie Moore in a bid for the old guard's light heavyweight crown. Today the lean, young New Yorker was seeking a crack at heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson.

"We want Patterson," shouted Manager Ernie Braca after his 23-year-old punching protégé stopped awkward, wild-swinging Yvon Durelle of Canada in 31 seconds of the seventh round of a television thriller at Madison Square Garden Friday night.

Floored in the first round by a right and left to the head, Anthony came raging back to stagger the 28-year-old fighting fisherman repeatedly, floor him in the sixth and bomb him in the seventh. Referee Ruby Goldstein intervened while the game Canadian still was standing.

"Tony is stepping into the heavyweight class now," said Braca as Anthony nodded assent. "We only kept him down for this one fight. Durelle has been hollering that he won the first fight when they called it a draw. We wanted to prove something to him

NEW YORK, (UP)—Fearless Fraley's facts and figures: Juan Manuel Fangio, five times world road racing champion and twice winner of the Grand Prix to be held at Sebring, Fla., next Saturday, plays all the angles when he's behind the wheel.

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Braves Improve Hill Staff

Milwaukee Manager Fred Haney has added some new and solid ingredients to a pitching recipe that helped carry the Braves to their first world championship last season.

The recipe: Take the strong starting pitchers, Warren Spahn, Lew Burdette, Bob Buhl and Gene Conley... sprinkle with a touch of time relievers, Don McMahon and Ernie Johnson... add some exceptional youngsters, Juan Pizarro, Carleton Willey, Bob Trowbridge and Joey Jay... and sweeten the mixture with some components obtained from Chicago, Bob Rush and Don Kaiser.

Some National League managers and club officials hollered loud and long when the Braves acquired Rush and Kaiser from the Cubs in a five-player deal last Dec. 5. In Rush, they claimed, Milwaukee picked up a durable veteran right-hander who would make the Braves much tougher to beat in 1958.

And they probably knew what they were yelling about. For, the 32-year-old winner of 110 big league ball games is showing up well in the early exhibition games.

Friday, Rush gave up only one hit in three scoreless innings as the Braves trounced the Philadelphia Phillies 8-1. Spahn also worked three scoreless frames while Pizarro yielded the only Phils' tally on a home run by Harry Anderson.

The St. Louis Cards, another NL contender, also won. They turned back the Pittsburgh Pirates 8-5. Joe Cunningham was the winners' big gun with four runs batted in on a 3-for-4 performance.

The New York Yankees, the Braves' victims in the last World Series, got help from regulars Bill Skowron, Hank Bauer and Gil McDougald to defeat the Cincinnati Bombers' second victory in seven games—both against the Redlegs. Don Larsen allowed only two singles in a five-inning stint.

In other games, the Chicago White Sox beat the Los Angeles Dodgers 3-1 under the arc lights; the San Francisco Giants trimmed Cleveland 7-2; Detroit beat Boston 11-8; Baltimore nipped the Cubs Washington 5-1.

An error by Don Zimmer, who tossed away a doubleplay ball, enabled the White Sox to pick up two second inning runs for their margin of victory. Rookie catcher Roger McCardell cracked two homers, one a grand slam, for the Giants. The winners got nifty pitching from Ramon Montant, Stu Miller and Dom Zanni.

Alpine Goes To Harwood

SNOW BASIN, Utah (AP)—Stan Harwood of Boulder, Colo., whooshed down the 1½-mile, 60-gate course in 2 minutes, 24.6 seconds Friday to win the giant slalom in the National Alpine Ski Championships.

And "whoosh" is the appropriate word — some 10 inches of new snow fell during the day. That makes for "powder" in the ski vernacular and snow flakes really flew as the 40-odd skiers swerved around the gates.

Beverly Anderson of Mullan, Idaho, won the women's race. Her time was 2:42.6 down a slightly shorter course.

Gardner Smith of Mammoth, Calif., finished nine-tenths of a second behind Harwood and moved into a favorite spot for the combined title which is computed on showings in all three events — the giant slalom, slalom and downhill. Smith is especially good in the downhill which concludes the three-day event Sunday.

Following Harwood and Smith were Frank Brown of the University of Colorado in 2:25.7; Robert Rolak of Camp Hale, Colo., in 2:29.3; Dick Dorror of Reno, Nev., in 2:30.6; Dick Webber of Ogden, Utah, in 2:31.1; Glynn Cress of Granby, Colo., in 2:31.6; Bill Meyers of Salt Lake City in 2:31.8; Tony Perry of Denver in 2:32.7; and Verne Anderson of Rossland, British Columbia, in 2:34.0.

Mary Line of Santa Fe, N.M., was second to Miss Anderson in 2:44.3. Then came Joan Saubert of Lakeview, Ore., in 2:54.2; Roberta Waterston of Boulder in 2:57.6; and Carol Izett of Denver in 2:59.1.

South Dakota Nabs Maple Win

EVANSVILLE, Ind. (UP)—South Dakota's basketball coach, Dwane Clodfelter, nearly apologized Saturday because his Coyotes won the NCAA small college division basketball championship with a 75-53 triumph over upstart St. Michael's of Vermont.

"We were lucky," Clodfelter said, "we had to be lucky to get here and then we had to be lucky to get through the tournament. But any team that wins it has to be lucky."

Guard Jimmy Daniels was the star, bucketing 40 points for the winner to increase his total for the three game finals to 82, second highest in the field. Evansville's Ed Smallwood scored 41 points in the Ace's 93-83 win over Wheaton in the consolation game for an 87 point total.

Baylor's Long Shot Sinks USF Dons

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Fantastic Elgin Baylor and his Seattle teammates tangles with underdog California Saturday night for the right to represent the West in the NCAA basketball championships.

A Pacific Coast record basketball crowd of 18,382 went wild in the Cow Palace Friday night as All-America Baylor sank a 35-footer at the buzzer to defeat San Francisco, 69-67.

California, co-champs of the Pacific Coast Conference, earlier took a colorless 54-43 victory over Idaho State.

Although the Cal-Idaho State opener of the two-night NCAA regional playoffs, was quiet, the crowd got its money's worth when USF and Seattle took over.

The 6-6 Baylor scored 35 points, 23 in the second half. He pulled off 14 rebounds and set up many another Seattle basket. Typical was a floor long pass in the first

half to Jerry Frizzell, who scored to narrow USF's halftime lead to 33-31.

California Coach Pete Newell called Baylor's play "the greatest one-man performance I've ever seen." USF Coach Phil Woolpert said the Dons did everything possible to try to stop him.

In the second half there never was more than a four-point spread as San Francisco's Fred LaCour, a 6-4 sophomore; Gene Brown; and Mike Farmer kept collective pace with Baylor. LaCour had 20 points, Brown 19 and Farmer 10.

The Seattle victory reversed an earlier 60-51 USF victory and marked the first time in four years the Dons have failed to make the NCAA finale, this year at Louisville, Ky.

Seattle played most of the game without two starters, Jim Harney and Francis Saunders, both hampered by injuries. Don Ogorek and Don Piasecki, both sophomores,

filled in admirably. California lagged for only the first few minutes against the Idahoans, then Don McIntosh and Earl Robinson put the Bears ahead to stay.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—A Cow Palace full house saw Friday night how Elgin Baylor won his All-America laurels.

Baylor's final basket, a 35-footer as the buzzer sounded gave Seattle a 69-67 victory over San Francisco in the NCAA Western basketball regional.

The 6-6 junior didn't score a point for the first 7½ minutes and got only 12 the first half. But he's the nation's second leading scorer with a better than 33 points-a-game average. He wound up with 35 Friday night.

Baylor got them when his team needed them — on tips, layups and jump shots from everywhere. He hit 13 free throws, two in the

last minute. He fired a floor-long pass, good for a layup by Jerry Frizzell as the first half buzzer sounded leaving Seattle only two points behind. And he got 14 of his team's 45 rebounds.

California Coach Pete Newell and USF mentor Phil Woolpert praised Baylor and Seattle's John Castellani said "The big boy proved what everyone said about him."

Even the normally calm Baylor was excited. He called it the greatest game he ever played.
