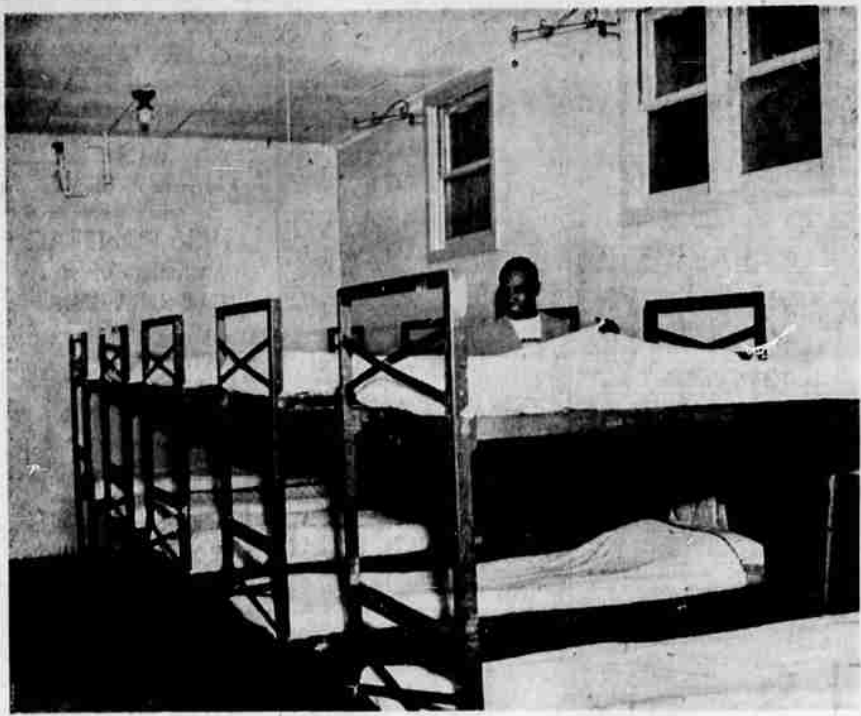

City Council Has Meeting

BONANZA — The Bonanza City Council met at the library on Monday night, March 10, with Mayor Walter Casebeer presiding. Among the routine business matters it was noted that the Oregon State Highway signs have been moved from near the center of town to the city limits.

The telephone franchise ordinance No. 207 was accepted by the council after being read for the third and last time. A new siren for the town marshal's car has been received by Marshal Robert Hartley.

A panel truck to be used as an emergency vehicle has been purchased by the rural and city volunteer firemen. It will be equipped with a resuscitator, gas masks, stretchers, and used as an ambulance.

Callers Came For Long Stay

The three Klamath County residents who tried to kick their way into the county jail at 3 o'clock last Thursday morning have definitely taken on the image of the man who came to dinner.

The three, Harold L. Davis, 31; Jo Ann Reed, 22; and Dollie Hodges, 18, wanted in the jail so they could visit friends and kicked in seven windows when they were denied access to the building.

Kicking in the windows gained them ready admittance to the jail each on a vagrancy charge. And now they will have a long time to visit their friends.

After pleading guilty to the charge in Judge D. E. Van Vactor's court Friday morning, the two women were sentenced to four months in the county jail and \$100 fines, and Davis (the spokesman for the lively little trio) was sentenced to five months and \$100. "There's one thing about it," adds Sheriff Murray Britton, "when people want in the jail that bad we can usually arrange it."

Driver Lands In Jail Again

Klamath County's Eveland F. Chilquin is very definitely one of those persons who knows what the future holds for him and just where he is going to be at any given time . . . at least for the next year.

Late last November Chilquin was arrested and charged with driving while intoxicated. His trial was set for December 7 and he failed to show up. It conflicted with his schedule inasmuch as he was at the time serving in the Sparks, Nevada jail on charges of driving while intoxicated.

However, the trial proceeded as scheduled in the district court of Judge D. E. Van Vactor and the man was found guilty by a jury. A bench warrant was issued for his arrest. However, the arrest had to wait inasmuch as he was still in the Sparks jail.

Two days ago the Klamath County State Police were called to a South Sixth Street location where it was reported that an automobile was being driven somewhat peculiarly. The state police investigated and found that Chilquin was the driver . . . just recently released from the Sparks jail.

He was served with the bench warrant, cited for being drunk in a public place, and cited for driving while under the influence of alcohol.

Friday morning in Judge Van Vactor's court he was sentenced to one year in the county jail and a \$750 fine on the bench warrant, sentenced to 35 days in jail on the most recent drunk charge, and given time to enter a plea and consult an attorney on the latest drunk driving charge.

DUNSMUIR — Repeal of tax exemptions for non-public schools was discussed by Dr. Abbott Book of San Francisco at a meeting with Protestant ministers and interested laymen at the Hotel Dunsmuir on Wednesday.

Dr. Book was introduced by the Rev. Olan A. Terrell of the First Methodist Church. He represents the Californians for Public Schools and was formerly executive secretary of the Council of Churches.

A proposition will appear on the ballot at the next general election seeking repeal of tax exemptions granted to parochial schools. Dr. Book said. He stressed the adequacy of our public school system, cost of maintaining it through property taxation and the importance of keeping education devoid of special influences.

KF Mill Wins Safety Award

The Klamath Falls branch of Weyerhaeuser Timber Company has bettered the industrial safety record in the saw mill industry held for some eight years by Hines Lumber Company of Hines, Oregon.

J. B. Bishop, local Weyerhaeuser manager, has received word from Ned H. Dearborn, president of the National Safety Council, that the council's highest recognition for outstanding industrial safety will be awarded to this plant. The Award of Honor is presented only where an establishment's record satisfies the rigid requirements laid down in the National Safety Council's award plan. It is not competitive and is awarded only for achievement.

The average employment at the local Weyerhaeuser plant is 1205 men. These men have established a record of 1,040,826 injury free man-hours to win this Award of Honor plaque. The record previously set by the Hines plant was high in the saw mill industry nationally and stood at approximately 886,000 man-hours.

This is the local Weyerhaeuser plant's first safety award this year and the outstanding safety record was established between June 5, 1957 and December 19, 1957.

The date of the official presentation of this award to the men in the lumber division will be announced, Bishop said. The division includes employees of the hardboard plant, pres-log department, box factory, planing mill, shipping department, kilns, green chain and others.

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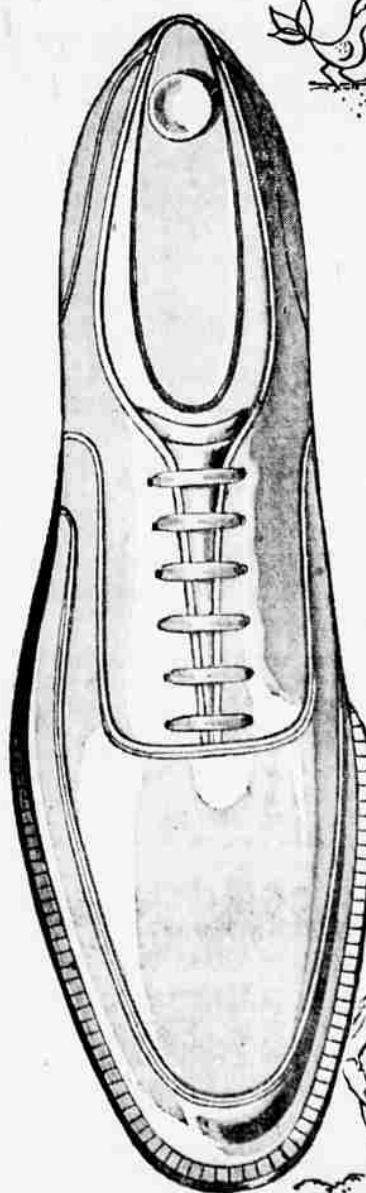


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
