Fire Truck Cost Outlined

DUNSMUIR — A new fire truck will cost the average Dunsuir home owner about five dollars per year for five years. Fire Chief James Lambert said in making a plea for approval of such purchase via a special tax rate. Dunsuir voters will be asked to endorse a 10 cent per \$100 assessed valuation special tax for five years for the purchase of fire equipment at the city election on April 8.

Lambert pointed out the old engine, 34 years old, is difficult to maintain and operate. The city now has one modern truck and an adequate system of fire plugs. Replacement of the old truck will enable the city to retain its present low fire insurance rates. It will be safer for volunteer firemen to handle and will do a better and faster job. The volunteer fire department responds to all fires with both trucks, Lambert said.
