Little Railroad Guides Pilots Back To Safety

DALLAS (AP)—A little railroad is part of a new system to parachute pilots safely home from the edges of space.

The pilot slides inside a closed capsule. The whole capsule is shot out of the plane along a short set of rails. Then it parachutes to earth.

Designed for planes flying far faster than sound and many miles high, this escape system solves many problems which would face future space voyagers. Some such system might be used to bring men safely off a manned satellite circling the earth.

The ball-out capsule was described to an aviation conference sponsored by the American Rocket Society and American Society of Mechanical Engineers by C. W. Russell, assistant project engineer of Republic Aviation Corp., Farmingdale, N.Y.

Shooting the capsule downward out of the bottom of the plane along guide rails gets it free safely, Russell said.

But it has to be strongly engineered to stand up when it hits the airstream. The pilot has to be securely harnessed, so he doesn't hit his head on the top when the capsule shoots downward, or get thrown forward when it hits the airstream. He has to be saved from too-vicious jolts when parachutes open and the capsule lands.

Sewer Project Work Started

The first phase of the South Suburban Sanitary District's project started today with crews beginning the construction of the main B canal, east of Altamont Junior High School and approximately 750 feet south of the Sixth Street canal crossing.

A contract was awarded by the board of directors of the district to Arthur H. Patterson Jr., 2074 Earle, on his bid price of \$5,284.50. The work includes laying approximately 400 feet of 12-inch pipe, part transite and part of it clay, beneath the canal. The concrete envelope which surrounds the pipe must be at least two feet below the canal bed, according to Maurice Gunderson, engineer for the sanitary district.

The work is being expedited to permit this small portion of the job, which will total more than a million dollars, to be completed before April 4, Gunderson said. The completion date was set, he said, so that the irrigation district engineers can turn the water into the canal on April 7 to test the dikes for mouse damage.

Veteran Actor Pat O'Brien Raps Professional Irishmen

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Pat O'Brien—that's right, Pat O'Brien—said today he can't stand professional Irishmen.

"You know the kind," the actor told a reporter, "the guy who cries in his green creme de menthe the minute a high-pitched whisky tenor breaks into 'Ireland Must Be Heaven.'"

His remarks startled his colleagues on the Columbia sound stage where he is making "The Last Hurrah," a story of a famed Irish political boss. His coworkers boast such fine Italian names as Spencer Tracy, Frank McHugh, Jimmy Gleason, Edward Brophy and director John Ford, who

changed his name from Sean O'Feeney.

"I know this set looks like a road company of Dublin's Abbey Players," said O'Brien, "but I still hate professional Irishmen."

O'Brien admitted his hi-fi collection includes a dozen albums of Irish songs but only "because my kids like them."

The O'Brien children are named Mavourneen, Sean, Terry and Kathleen Brigid. His wife picked the names, O'Brien explained.

Pat also drives a big limousine painted kelly green but that, he said, is just a coincidence.

"It was the only color in the salesroom when I was ready to buy."

Another O'Brien peeve: the guy who is a rabid follower of Notre Dame football although he never saw or attended the school.

O'Brien's biggest pain is the guy who uses expressions like "begorrah."

"I spent time in Ireland and I never once heard the word. Actually, it was invented by an American burlesque comic, Pat White."

As he talked, an assistant director interrupted to tell him that director Ford wanted him on the set.

"The back of me hand to him," said O'Brien.

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Reports Indicate Indonesian Forces Joining Rebel Ranks

SINGAPORE (AP)—The fall of North Sumatra's key port, Medan, to a rebellious army garrison touched off speculation today that North Celebes and other island sectors soon would join the spreading war against President Sukarno's regime.

The central government confirmed rebel reports that some 2,000 troops under U.S.-trained Maj. Boyke Nainn Golan had seized the city of 300,000—yesterday in the second major development since the rebellion in the Outer Islands turned into a civil war nearly two weeks ago.

Obviously alarmed over the turn of events, Sukarno ordered reinforcements dispatched to the Medan area.

In North Celebes, in east Indonesia, the rebel commander, Lt. Col. Ventje Sumal, was expected to launch an offensive soon. There also were indications the strongly anti-Communist garrison in West Java might join the spreading revolt.

Neutral South Sumatra also showed signs of swinging over to the rebels. A broadcast from the capital of Palembang denounced the government's attack on Central Sumatra, and the South Sumatran commander, Lt. Col. Barlian, held long conferences with his staff on the situation. And in a speech urged negotiations "to halt further destruction."

Sukarno announced that his forces had captured the town of Siak Sri Indrapura in Central Sumatra. He claimed the seizure consolidated the central government's control of the east coast of Central Sumatra. The rebels still hold the west coast and its big port, Padang.

Sukarno also authorized the U.S.-owned Caltex Oil Co. to resume operations in the Central Sumatran oil fields around Pakanbaru. The company suspended operations when the Jakarta forces invaded.

Sukarno's chief of staff, Maj. Gen. Abdul Harris Nasution, broadcast an appeal to Col. Djamin Ginting, fleeing commander of the North Sumatra area, and the chiefs of the navy and air force to keep control of Jakarta.

The rebel radio said Ginting took to the hills with some 600 troops when the insurgents began arresting loyalist officers and was holed up in the mountains of Sibolga, about 100 miles south of Medan.

Observers in Singapore believed Ginting would not hold out indefinitely but wanted to be in a strong bargaining position when the rebels consolidate their hold over the area.

Rebel accounts said Medan, vital port for the rubber trade with Singapore, fell in seven hours of hard fighting. The revolt was sparked by Sumatran troops of the Medan garrison enraged at the Jakarta force's invasion of Central Sumatra.

The force attacked Medan airport, then invaded the barracks and army posts occupied by Javanese troops loyal to Sukarno. The streets were raked by machine-gun fire. There has been no report on casualties, however.
