foot, the injury, a bad sprain, has responded well to treatment, which has included radiation and whirlpool baths.

The mishap occurred with only eight minutes to go in the last scheduled workout before embarking on Niles, the captain of the Pelicans, has had what might be termed a bad week. It has been only four days since he received a fingernail in his eye — an injury that, luckily, looked a lot worse than it turned out to be. A quick trip to the hospital proved that he had only a bloodshot eye as a memento and no sight impairment.

Idaho Lass Sweeps Meet

SNOW BASIN, Utah (UP) — Miss Beverly Anderson of Mullan, Idaho, was easily the star of the three-day national Alpine ski championships which concluded Sunday. She won every event. Among the men it was not as clear-cut. Frank Brown of Boulder, Colo., won the combined title — computed from times in giant slalom, slalom and downhill. But Brown was 14th in the downhill Sunday, fifth in the slalom and third in the giant slalom. William Smith of Dartmouth won the downhill in one minute, 29.0 seconds. Tom Babler of Portland, Ore., was third in 1:29.8. Miss Anderson's time was 1:37.5. Then came Mary Alice Morrow of Boulder, Colo., in 1:40.5 and Joan Saubert of Sweet Home, Ore., in 1:42.5. FIS points for the combined gave Brown 11.7. The lowest figure is the best. Miss Anderson's FIS total was zero. Third in the women's combined was Miss Saubert with 16.66.

Virgil Akins, Logart Head TV Headliner

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Cuba's Isaac Logart and Virgil Akins of St. Louis clash Friday in the semifinals of the welterweight elimination tournament.

They will be fighting for the right to meet Vince Martinez for the vacant welter crown. Each will receive \$20,000 for the radio-televised 12-rounder.

That's the biggest purse ever for the two and a far cry from the days in Cuba when Logart fought a main event for \$1,500.

Logart is a 7-5 choice. The fast-moving, fast-punching, 24-year-old has won three straight and 15 of his last 17 fights. Akins, 30, has won 9 of his last 11, the final two by kayos over ex-welter king Tony DeMarco.

This is their third clash. They fought twice in 1955. Akins took the first by split decision while Logart won the second by a comfortable margin.

At New York's St. Nicholas Arena tonight, welterweights Jimmy Archer and Johnny Gorman, a couple of New Yorkers of Irish descent, clash in the television 10-rounder.

Archer, 23, is the 3-1 choice over the 22-year-old Gorman. Jimmy has a 17-2 record. Gorman 25-7-1.

Du Mont will telecast at 10 p.m. EST.

The postponement of the Eddie Machen-Zora Folley heavyweight clash results in an unexpected TV payday for middleweights Willie Vaughn of Los Angeles and Jimmy Beechman of Washington. Wednesday night they will fight in Washington.

NCAA — Temple 26-2 vs. Kentucky 21-6; Kansas State 22-3 vs. Seattle 22-5. Winners play for title Saturday night.

NIT — Bradley 20-6 vs. Xavier 16-11; Dayton 23-3 vs. Fordham 15-8 Tuesday Night. Bradley-Xavier winner faces St. Bonaventure 20-4. Dayton-Fordham plays St. Johns 18-6 in Thursday's semifinals. Winners to Saturday final.

Xavier got into the quarter-final bracket impressively, whipping Niagara 95-86, while Fordham romped past St. Francis of Pennsylvania 83-59. Third-seeded St. Bonaventure was a 79-75 winner over St. Joseph's (Pa.) after a first-round bye. St. Johns, in Saturday's other game, upset fourth-seeded Utah 71-70.

Temple, riding a 25-game winning streak that is the longest in the nation among major schools is favored to advance to the NCAA finals against Kansas State, the big, bruising Big Eight conference champion.

But the way Kentucky's Wildcats, old hands at NCAA tournament competition, and Seattle, with its great Elgin Baylor, have been playing, there's no guarantee.

The Wildcats smashed a good Notre Dame team 89-56 Saturday night in the Midwestern regional final at Lexington, Ky. Seattle first snapped San Francisco's 20-game winning streak on Baylor's 35-foot jump shot at the buzzer, then rode Charlie Brown's clutch play to a 66-62 overtime victory over California in the Far Western regional.

Temple, led by All America Guy Rodgers, crushed Dartmouth in Saturday's title game 69-50 of the Eastern regional at Charlotte.

Kansas State, with three regulars 6-8 or more, overpowered Oklahoma State 69-57 in the Midwestern regional final at Lawrence, Kan.

The two small-school national crowns were determined over the weekend. South Dakota won the NCAA small college title, defeating St. Michaels (Vt.) 75-53 at Evansville, Ind., and Tennessee State won the NAA championship for the second straight year, downing previously unbeaten Western Illinois 85-73 in the wind-up of a week of play at Kansas City.

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Lapwai To Meet Challenge

Two-time champion Lapwai faces a serious threat if it is to again capture the Klamath Reservation All-Indian Invitational Basketball Tournament which opens Wednesday afternoon at Chiloquin. Tournament action will continue through the championship game Saturday evening.

The defending champions from Lapwai are again ranked as one of the pre-tourney favorites, but the Idaho team must get over such talented entries as Lodge Grass, Montana; Toppenish, Washington; Fort Yates, North Dakota and the San Francisco Redaction Center.

Lodge Grass is expected to supply the Lapwais with all they can handle when and if the two meet in one of Friday's semifinal games. The Montana tribe captured the All-Indian National Tournament held this past week in Toppenish, Neah Bay, another local tourna-

ment entry placed third, Toppenish fourth and Lapwai fifth.

The Lodge Grass team will be sparked by Willis Medicine Horse, last year's outstanding player of the tournament and a new star just out of high school Larry Pretty Weasel. Pretty Weasel is regarded by many as the finest basketball prospect to come out of a Montana high school in several years.

Fort Washakie, Wyoming, will have one of the invitational tournament's top stars on hand in the person of Bernie Salaway. In last year's tournament the Fort Washakie cager scored 31 points which is the tourney's single game scoring record. Salaway was also a member of the 1957 all-star team selected at the close of the invitational meet.

The tournament opens Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 with the Chiloquin Thunderbirds meeting Reno in the first of 18 games to be played. Neah Bay faces Fort Bidwell in the second afternoon game. Wednesday night's action finds Fort Yates playing Toppenish and San Francisco meeting Warm Springs.

In other first round games scheduled Thursday, Fort Washakie meets the Chiloquin-Reno winner and Browning tangles with the winner of the Neah Bay-Fort Bidwell clash in the afternoon action. Thursday night's slate finds Lodge Grass and Lapwai making their first tourney bids against the winners of the Fort Yates-Toppenish and San Francisco-Warm Springs games of Wednesday.

Other tournament games are billed for afternoon and evening sessions on Friday and Saturday.

Braves Bounced By Yanks

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Mickey Mantle and Yogi Berra have started to get the bat squarely against the ball and today the word went out: "Beware the Yankees."

The New York sluggers snapped their slumps and unleashed their lethal power yesterday, leading the American Leaguers to a 4-1 exhibition victory over the world champion Milwaukee Braves. It was the first meeting between the two teams since the World Series.

Mantle and Berra aroused the entire Yank cast from its lethargic glow and lifted New York's Grapefruit League record to 4-3. The Yanks got some solid pitching from veteran Art Ditmar and youngsters Ryne Duren and Al Cicotte, who combined for an eight-hitter.

Mantle stroked two doubles, scoring twice and accounting for one run driven in. Berra slashed a double, added a single and picked up two RBIs.

Cleveland's Indians also got a boost when ace pitcher Herb Score finally made his exhibition debut. Sideline last year when a batted ball struck him in the eye, Score suffered an ankle sprain early in spring training.

He gave up two runs and four hits in a three-inning stint as the Indians bowed to San Francisco 6-5. Johnny Antonelli won it.

Washington unveiled a slugger in Neil Chrissy, who struck three homers in a 10-4 victory over Detroit 5-1; Pittsburgh edged Philadelphia 6-5 in 10 innings; and Chicago's White Sox clubbed Kansas City 8-2.

Chrisley drove in six runs with his three round-trippers, one a grand slammer, as the Nats routed Paul Foytack with five runs in the first.

Stan Musial's three-run homer, highlighting a five-run eighth, brought the Cardinals their victory. Veteran Hal Jeffcoat was the victim.

The Dodgers received good pitching from Don Drysdale, Danny McDevitt and Jackie Collum, who limited the Red Sox to five hits.

Pittsburgh won when Phil's third baseman Willie Jones uncorked a wild throw in the 10th with runners on first and second. Roberto Clemente legged it home.

The White Sox jumped on George Brunet and Tom Gorman in the last two innings for five runs after holding a 3-2 lead. Alex Kellner pitched well for the A's.

AUSTRIAN TAKES DOWNHILL

ZERMATT, Switzerland (UP) — Toni Mark of Austria won the four-mile Gornegrat Derby downhill ski race Sunday in 7 minutes, 0.3 seconds, while Sonja Sperl of Germany and Erika Netzer of Austria tied for first in the women's category. Americans Terry End and Tammy Dix finished 14th and 16th, respectively in the women's race.

Milwaukee Favored To Defend NL Crown

BRADENTON, Fla. (UP) — The Milwaukee Braves appear to have what it takes to win the National League pennant again.

They have the pitching and the power — the combination which in 1957 carried them to the world's championship. They seem to have the right balance of veterans and youngsters, and unlike so many championship clubs, they didn't stand pat during the off-season.

The Braves made a deal with the Cubs, which most other managers called "a steal," and Manager Fred Haney believes it will improve the club.

While refusing to come right out and predict a pennant, Haney calls his pitching depth the "best in the league" and claims such stars as Hank Aaron, Eddie Ma-

thews and Wes Covington "have yet to reach their potential."

RIGHT FIELD DOUBTFUL

The only position on the club which isn't set is right field. With Bill Bruton on the doubtful list because of knee trouble, Aaron will shift to center. Covington will play left.

"It might be we will have to make a deal," Haney says, "but you know not many teams want to trade with the club on top."

As matters stand now, Bob Hazle, who came up to the club last season when Bruton was hurt and hit .403 in 41 games with the Braves, has the inside track for the third outfield berth. John Demerit, the former Wisconsin star for whom the Braves paid a \$75,000 bonus, is getting a good look.

But on the basis of the 147 he hit in 32 games with the team last season, it looks like he will be sent out for experience.

Ray Shearer, who hit .316 at Wichita last season, also is getting a shot at the job and the veteran Andy Pafko will be around for utility duty.

Haney may platoon first base this year, using Joe Adcock when a left-hander pitches against the Braves and the better-fielding Frank Torre when a rightie goes against them. There are those who think Torre can beat Adcock out of the job, making Big Joe available in a deal for an outfielder.

INFIELD ALL SET

The rest of the infield will have veteran Red Schoendienst at second, Johnny Logan at short and Mathews at third. The Braves started to click last season when they acquired Schoendienst on June 15.

It's when the talk turns to pitching that Haney really beams. "I've got eight starters," he claims, listing Lew Burdette, Bob Buhl and Warren Spahn, as the top three men.

Back of them he has Bob Rush, Juan Pizarro, the southpaw labeled as "a sure star"; Gene Conley, whose 9.9 record was disappointing last year; Bob Trowbridge, who had seven victories last year; and Humberto Robinson, an 18-game winner with Toronto last year.

For relief there will be Ernie Johnson, one of the ace bullpen men in the league, and young Don McMahon, who showed in the World Series that he could really fire that ball. Other relief possibilities include Don Kaiser, obtained from the Cubs with Rush, and Joey Jay, back for another trial after winning 17 at Wichita.

The catching is all set with Del Crandall, Del Rice and Carl Sawatski. Bob Taylor probably will be sent out for the season.

All in all, the Braves' outlook is a most hopeful one.

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
