Alaska Question Showdown Set

WASHINGTON — Alaskan statehood legislation moves toward a fateful showdown in the House this week. Events of the next 10 days may decide whether the bill stays alive or dies as its predecessors have in the past.

Although still bottled up in the House Rules Committee, where it is strongly opposed by Chairman Howard W. Smith (D-Va.), the Alaska bill has been placed on the week's program by the House leadership.

Statehood bills have a privileged status under which they may be brought to the floor for consideration through a motion by the chairman of the House Insular Affairs Committee—in this case, Rep. Clair Engle (D-Calif.)—without Rules Committee clearance.

Happy Footnote To Crash; Crewmen Escape Injury

MADRAS, Ore. — There was this happy footnote to the wreckage of a plane that lay twisted and burned Monday atop a butte in Central Oregon:

Its two crewmen escaped without injury.

The giant Boeing 307 cargo plane crashed on the butte in rugged country, 15 miles west of here Saturday night, after a mid-air explosion sent flames rippling through the craft.

After its crash landing, pilot Leo Wassenberg and co-pilot Al Brooks scrambled to safety.

The craft had taken off 4 1/2 hours earlier on a fuel consumption test from Troutdale, and was returning to the field near Portland when the explosion occurred.

Wassenberg said he was flying at about 1,000 feet when trouble struck.

The craft then was flying over a mile-wide canyon. Fliers here speculated that if the plane had been another 100 feet lower, it might have dropped into the canyon instead of reaching the grassy, rock-strewn butte.

"We were on our way back to Troutdale when I heard an explosion, a kind of a loud boom. I looked back in the plane and the floor was on fire," Wassenberg said.

SAN QUENTIN, Calif. — Crewcuts and flat-tops are out for ducktails, Elvis Presley sideburns and skinhead haircuts are out for San Quentin State Prison inmates.
