

Stan Needs Two; Cards On Streak

ST. LOUIS (AP)—A party honoring Stan Musial's 3,000th hit turned out to be the celebration of a four-game winning streak by the St. Louis Cardinals.

"It's a good celebration either way," Stan the Man said in the dressing room. Musial made a dramatic run at the 3,000-hit milestone with five hits in a double-header sweep over the Chicago Cubs.

He is now only two hits shy and

expects to get them today or tomorrow at Chicago. Musial had three straight hits in the second game before going out his last two times up.

"It's great to be winning again," said Musial, now batting an incredible .494. "We've started to get some breaks and the pitching and hitting is looking better."

The party at the restaurant of Musial and his business partner, Julius (Biggie) Garagnani, was set up before the four-game series with the Cubs. Musial then needed seven hits, but that seemed to be a large order even for a seven-time batting champion.

Some 350 of Musial's friends attended the party and the guests included U. S. Senator Stuart Symington, Missouri Governor James T. Blair, and St. Louis Mayor Raymond R. Tucker.

Stan went hitless the first two games of the series, after hitting safely the first 17 games this season, but he announced the party was on, whether he made it before the home fans or not.

Stan admitted he hit at bad balls his last two times at bat.

"Maybe I was trying to crowd something into four games that it took me 16 years to accomplish," he said.

The Cubs made the pitches too wide to reach in walking Musial his last two times up in the first game. The crowd of 23,416 booed lustily.

The 37-year-old Cardinal star will occupy a unique place in the record books when he does reach the 3,000 hit mark.

No other long ball hitter has reached this milestone. Only five players have hit more home runs than Musial's 398, and some reached 3,000 hits.

The seven are Ty Cobb with 4,191; Tris Speaker, 3,515; Honus Wagner, 3,430; Eddie Collins, 3,311; Napoleon Lajoie, 3,251; Waver 3,162; and Adrian Anson, 3,081.

LaRayne Harris Tops City Pin Tournament

LaRayne Harris pocketed another city championship Saturday night when she won the 18th annual Women's City Bowling Tournament, closed at Lucky Lanes. LaRayne won the scratch all-events title with a very respectable 1,607.

Betty Scott won the handicap all-events title by rolling a 1,911 total. Yolanda Rosterella was second at 1,750 and Helen Kelch and Jean Rodgers finished in a tie for third place, each recording 1,770.

Nita Misco's 1,750 was good for fifth followed by Mary Ellen Hankins at 1,756. Eldina Greenwood at 1,735, Ruth Bishop at 1,725, Mary Bothwell at 1,723, LaRayne Harris at 1,715 and Helen Davis and Jean Rodgers finished in a tie for third place, each recording 1,710 totals.

Miss Bardahl Race Winner

CHELAN, Wash. (AP)—"If the top one falters..."

The old saying of the horse tracks carried over to the wet and wind-ruffled speedboat oval on Lake Chehalis Sunday when Norm Evans piloted the roaring Miss Bardahl to victory in the second annual Apple Cup race for unlimited hydroplane.

The top one—Miss Thriftway—spattered and died after winning two heats of the 60-mile race and leading for 7 1/2 laps of the final chase around the three-mile course.

The crowd which swelled the population of this little town of 2,300 to an estimated Sunday 50,000 saw one of the fastest races in the book of hydroplane contests.

There were five separate chases and the slowest was the 30-mile final, with Miss Bardahl clocked at an average 101.6 miles per hour. With an entry list of 30 boats, each of the first two 15-mile heats were divided into two sections of five boats each.

Pirates Whip Phils Twice; Cards Take Two From Cubs

Credit Joe L. Brown of the Pittsburgh Pirates with pulling off St. Louis' biggest "steal" since the Brinks robbery.

They laughed when Brown laid out the \$50,000 waiver price to acquire Bob Porterfield from the Red Sox last Friday. But the supposedly washed-up pitcher made it look like a million-dollar deal Sunday when he scored a 1-0, 11-inning victory over the Philadelphia Phillies in his National League debut.

That victory, coupled with Bob Friend's 10-4 decision in the first game, moved the astonishing Pirates into a second-place tie with the San Francisco Giants.

The Pirates, one game behind the streaking Milwaukee Braves, the Braves extended their lead to a season high of seven straight games Sunday when they rallied for a 7-6 triumph over the Cincinnati Reds.

In Sunday's other major developments:

The Baltimore Orioles took over third place in the American League when they beat the Red Sox, 3-2 and 4-0.

The revived St. Louis Cardinals pulled out two ninth-inning victories over the Chicago Cubs, 6-7 and 6-5, as Stan Musial collected five hits and moved within two of a 3,000-lifetime total.

Bill Skovron and Roy Sievers, two of the AL's top sluggers, were injured while the New York Yankees and Washington Senators split a doubleheader.
