

# Musial Benched, To Seek 3,000th On Home Field

CHICAGO (UP)—Stan Musial, the St. Louis Cardinal slugger who is only one hit away from 3,000, will not reach the coveted goal today according to Manager Fred Hutchinson.

Hutchinson last night announced he is benching The Man so that Musial can register his 3,000th hit at St. Louis.

"Stan has always expressed the desire to make his 3,000th hit in St. Louis and I'm going to give him that opportunity," said Hutchinson.

Musial rapped out his 2,999th hit in the first inning of a 6-4 victory over the Chicago Cubs. He stroked a double into left center field. He walked in the third and then grounded out weakly in his next three appearances.

"It'll be a good clean shot when I get it," said Musial after yesterday's game.

The Cardinals go home Wednesday to open a two-game series with the San Francisco Giants.

The 37-year-old Musial, a veteran of 16 years in the majors,

think I was trying to guide the ball too much after getting that home. Maybe I should have just hit away.

"It's a funny game. I was going so good I thought I'd surely make it in St. Louis Sunday. I needed seven hits in that four-game series against the Cubs and now, five games later, I'm still trying. That's what makes baseball the game it is."

Musial was benched by Cub pitchers last Friday and Saturday. Then he turned hot Sunday and picked up two hits in the first game and three more in the second game before drawing walks in his two final appearances.

The St. Louis crowd roared, naturally. At Wrigley Field yesterday after hitting his first-inning double, Musial walked on four straight pitches and the Chicago crowd boomed Cub pitcher Glen Hobbie.

Hutchinson said that if he must use Musial as a pinch batter today he'll not hesitate to do so.

# Dodgers To Call On Newk

LOS ANGELES (UP)—The Los Angeles Dodgers, nesting in last place in the National League for the first time in 10 years, today called on big Don Newcombe to try and stem the rampaging San Francisco Giants.

Manager Bill Rigney of the Giants sent bonus baby Mike McCormack with a 2-0 record against Newcombe who has two losses and no wins this year. The game was the last for both clubs before starting three weeks on road trips east.

The victory-flushed Giants ran up their fifth straight win and fifth in a row over the Dodgers Monday night with a 12-3 triumph led by Willie Mays' two homers, one a grand slam blast over the left center field screen that the grinning star later said was the hardest-hit homer of his career.

**THE BIG BLOWS**

Mays drove in five runs with his two homers and Daryl Spencer also hit two homers to raise his total for the season to six, four of them off the Dodgers. And the Giants' 17 hits were their largest total of the year.

For Mays, the two circuit blows made a total of five in three games, all against the Dodgers. Although one of Mays' homers was over the left field screen, it probably would have been good for four bases in almost any park, landing about 30 rows up in Memorial Coliseum.

The Giants blasted starter Don Drysdale out of the box in two innings for his sixth defeat against one relief win. Meanwhile, Ruben Gomez was scoring his third win, all against the Dodgers, against two defeats for the season. Gomez struck out 10 men and walked only one while giving up six hits.

**SOME LONG BALLS**

The Dodgers were able to get more extra base hits than normal for them, five of the safeties, going for more than one base, clinaxed by Gil Hodges' homer in the bottom of the ninth.

But Manager Walt Alton said the Dodgers didn't get enough men on base to make the long hits count. And four errors contributed to their downfall as only five of the Giants' runs were earned.

The Dodgers used five pitchers before they were able to stem the Giants' surge in the ninth when reliever Clem Labine, set them down with a single walk.

The last time the Dodgers were in the National League cellar was on July 2, 1948. Despite their poor showing thus far this season, 29,770 fans turned out Monday night to bring the Dodgers' total home attendance for 20 games to 557,289.
