Glenn Moore Picks Oregon, Joins Robinson, Ex-Mate

Glenn Moore, Klamath Union High School's two-time all-state center, is headed for the University of Oregon.

This news ends one of the hottest contested questions raised here in some time. The 6-8 prep basketball sensation made his decision late Tuesday in a telephone conversation with Steve Belko, University of Oregon basketball coach.

Moore is the second all-state selection to pick Oregon this year from the state championship KUHS team. Recently, Dave Robinson revealed he would further his education and basketball careers at the U of O.

The two leaders of the Klamath state championship drive will join a former Pelican all-stater when they play ball for the Webfoots. Moore and Robinson will be following Butch Kimpton, a KU 1957 all-stater, who was the sparkplug of the Ducks Frosh team this past winter.

In making his announcement, Moore said it was the biggest decision of his life but added "I think that the overall picture at Oregon will make me happier. I am very much impressed with Mr.

Silky Shines In Trial Run

BALTIMORE (UP)—The Silky Sullivan Marching and Chorus Society was bubbling with confidence today following "a very satisfactory effort" by the California colt in his final workout for Saturday's Preakness Stakes.

Silky, who disappointed his legion of supporters by finishing 12th in the Kentucky Derby, turned on his biggest burst of speed since arriving in the East Tuesday when he worked a mile in 1:41 4-5.

With Oliver Cutshaw perched on his back, the son of Irish-bred Silky was clocked off the first quarter in 26 2-5 seconds, half in :50 4-5 and six furlongs in 1:15 over the Pimlico track.

"It was a very satisfactory effort and he certainly showed that he favors this race track," said trainer Reggie Cornell. "It just goes to show what I said earlier. You have to throw out his bad effort over the muddy track in the Derby."

Sonny Liston, Mederos Meet

CHICAGO (AP)—Julio Mederos, a Cuban heavyweight who has recorded some impressive victories, takes on Sonny Liston of Philadelphia tonight in a 10-round bout in Chicago Stadium.

Mederos, 25, has a 21-13-3 record which includes 14 knockouts and victories over such seasoned performers as Roland La Starza, Harold Johnson and Bob Satterfield. He is expected to weigh about 200 pounds to Liston's 210.

Liston, a 26-year-old former Golden Gloves champion out of St. Louis, will be making his first national television appearance (ABC 9 p.m. EST) although he has won 17 of 18 professional bouts. His only defeat came at the hands of Maty Marshall when Liston fought four rounds with a broken jaw. He avenged the loss in a rematch.

Mederos has been beaten in his last two starts. He dropped a 10-round decision to George Chuvalo in January before being knocked out by Alex Mitelf last July.

NY Blanks Orioles; BoSox Top Senators

Time was when those New York Yankees kept padding their American League lead with power at the plate. Now they're doing it with pitching.

The Yankee staff leads the majors with five shutouts and Don (perfect game) Larsen has two of them, pushing his scoreless inning string to 29 last night with a four-hitter that beat the Baltimore Orioles 3-0.

That put New York three games

ahead of second place Washington, beaten 9-6 by Boston. Detroit moved within .004 percentage of the third place Orioles with an 11-1 job on Cleveland, and the Chicago White Sox defeated Kansas City 9-2.

Larsen had been idled since April 21 by shoulder trouble and rain.

The big right-hander, whose perfect game in the 1956 World Series, ended a shutout duel with Connie Johnson (1-3) with his second home run of the season, 10th in the majors, in the fifth inning. Larsen, 2-for-2 at bat, walked ahead of Hank Bauer's two-run double in the seventh.

Injury May Keep Cicotte With Yanks

Right-hander Al Cicotte of the New York Yankees may have gained a temporary "stay of execution" when Bill Skowron re-injured his back last Sunday against the Washington Senators.

The Yankees must lose three players from their roster by midnight Thursday in order to get down to the 25-player limit. Cicotte, who hasn't appeared in a game this season, was a prime candidate for the ax along with veteran outfielder Enos Slaughter and infielder Fritz Brickell.

However, if Skowron is placed on the disabled list as expected, Cicotte probably will be retained.

The Pittsburgh Pirates released utility outfielder Jim Pendleton outright to Columbus of the International League and are within one player of the 25-man limit. Pendleton, acquired from Milwaukee last season, appeared in only three games this year, collecting one hit in three at bats.

Shortstop Andre Rodgers of the San Francisco Giants was optioned to Phoenix of the Pacific Coast League. The Chicago Cubs shipped pitcher John Oler to Fort Worth of the Texas League.

KU Jayvees Edge Hornets

In a last half of the second thriller, the Pelican Jayvee basketball team won a 44-38 decision over the Henley Hornets Tuesday afternoon on Modoc Field.

The Pelicans, who went into the stand one run short, overcame the deficit in the last half of the game. Dick Moore, another outstanding outfielder, hit a home run in the third inning to give the Pelicans a 2-0 lead. Gary Head, who put the Pelicans on a two-hit, 10-straight victory over pitcher Paul Bishop.

The Hornets had four hits, including a home run in the fourth inning, but they got to Bishop for only two singles, which combined with 10 JV errors, accounted for the 10-0 three runs.

Bishop and first-leader Doug Griesel contributed to the Pelicans' extra-base knowledge in the 10-0 victory.

Royals Move Back In Lead

Montreal Royals, riding behind a strong left arm of pitcher Tom La Sorda, are back in first place in the International League today.

The stocky southpaw turned in the fifth straight complete game of the season today, nipping the St. Louis Browns 3-0. Today night, La Sorda, working with an early three-run lead, gave up single in the seventh and ninth innings in winning his fourth game against defeat.

La Sorda went the distance for the Leafs and suffered his second loss in four decisions. Roy Lennon hit his eighth homer for the Royals, who now lead second place Rochester by a game and a half. Rocky Nelson got his high circuit for the Leafs.

In other games, Buffalo shut out Rochester, 2-0, as Rip Coleman earned his first win after two defeats. Miguel Cuellar of Toledo hurled a two-hit shutout over Columbus, the Sugar Kings 6-0, and Miami outslugged Richmond, 10-7.

Bucs Climb To Third; Giants Slap Dodgers

You might say the Cincinnati Redlegs made a gross error last December when they traded southpaw Don Gross to Pittsburgh.

The deal capped a five-day swapping spree that brought the Reds a half-dozen new pitchers and gave them their No. 1 starter of the moment, Bob Purkey (3-1). But the trade gave the Pirates what the Reds have needed most—a tough relief man.

The 26-year-old lefty has won one, saved three for the Pirates and hasn't allowed a run in 14 2-3 innings. He's given up just four hits, while striking out 16.

Gross fanned four in three perfect relief innings against his old mates last night, saving a 6-3 victory for the Pirates, who have won five straight and 14 of their last 18.

It was the fourth defeat in a row for the Reds, who blew early leads in all of them.

The third place Pirates now are a half-game behind San Francisco. The Giants regained the National League lead by rocking Los Angeles 16-9 for their sixth straight victory. Philadelphia dropped Milwaukee to second, ending the Braves streak at seven 5-2.

Stan Musial finally collected his 3,000th hit, touching off a rally with a pinch double as the St. Louis Cardinals won their sixth straight, 5-3 over the Chicago Cubs.

World Ring Brass Checks Heavy Ranks

NEW YORK (UP)—Julius Helfand said today the World Championship Boxing Committee will take "definite action" on the heavyweight situation late this month.

Helfand, chairman of the New York State Athletic Commission and president of the committee, will fly to Paris May 25 and preside at the committee meeting there May 26-30.

Just what ultimatum to be given champion Floyd Patterson will be decided by the committee, Helfand said. Young Floyd hasn't defended his crown since last Aug. 22, when he knocked out amateur Pete Rademacher in the sixth round at Seattle.

Cus D'Amato, Patterson's manager, declared today, "If the World Committee or any other organization tries to force us into a fight with an opponent who may have any connection with the International Boxing Club—no matter how indirect—we will challenge the committee's action in court."

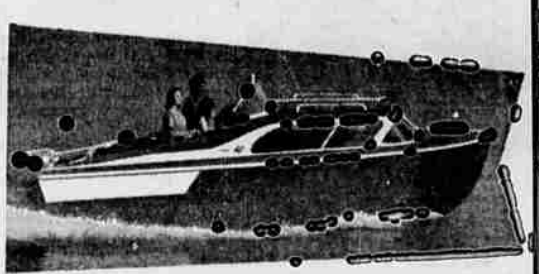

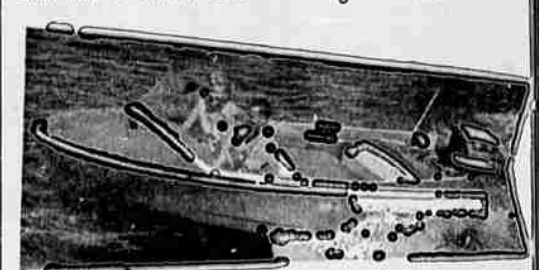
