

Dodgers, Giants Set First Eastern Travel

LOS ANGELES (UP) — The Dodgers and the Giants were on their first eastern swing today after having remained on the coast since the National League season opened a month ago, but it will be some time before Los Angeles fans get over the performance of Willie Mays.

Mays chose the Giants' deadliest rivals, the Dodgers, in a fierce competition transplanted to the West Coast, as the club to tee off against in his biggest splurge of the season.

Phoenix Humbles Portland

The Phoenix Giants ran up the 1958 Pacific Coast League season's high score Tuesday night as they defeated Portland 22-3.

The Giants got 20 hits, including a grand slam homer by Felipe Alou and circuit clouts by Leon Wagner and Roger McCardell.

The Sacramento Solons edged the Vancouver Mounties and regained first place in the standings. In other games, the San Diego Padres bumped Seattle 7-3 and Salt Lake City defeated Spokane 6-1.

Alou's blast came in the third. McCardell got his homer, a three-run affair, in the sixth. Bob Willard and Jack Littrell, the third of three Portland hurriers, homered for the Beavers.

The Beavers gave the Giants all the help they could by committing six errors. Ernie Broglio, who went the route for Phoenix, limited Portland to six hits.

Harry Bright's two-run double was the key blow in a three-run, ninth-inning rally that gave the Solons victory over the Mounties.

Sacramento was trailing 2-0 going into the ninth, but the Solons got four hits and pushed three runs across. Bright scored the winning run on Jim Greengrass' single.

Marshall Bridges held the Mounties to three hits in the seven innings he worked. Lifted for a pinchhitter in the eighth, Bridges fanned 12 Mounties.

A big sixth inning gave the Padres victory. With the score 2-2, the Pads got five runs in the sixth on doubles by Bill Glynn and Larry Raines, a single, two walks and a sacrifice fly.

Seattle got single runs in the third and fourth and wound up their end of the scoring with one tally in the ninth on doubles by Jack Bloomfield and Phil Shartzer. Earl Averill homered for San Diego in the third.

Eddie O'Brien six-hit Spokane and whacked out a run-scoring double in the seventh inning when the Bees splurged for five runs.

Joe Christopher's standup triple got the rally going and O'Brien and Dick Stuart smashed out doubles before it was over.

Dick Hanlon was charged with the loss, his second in six decisions.
