

Meet Pierre Pflimlin, France's New Premier

PARIS — Pierre Pflimlin, 22nd premier of postwar France, has held seven different posts in 16 governments but never before the No. 1 job.

He was asked twice to form cabinets and failed both times. He continued piling up experience by being minister of agriculture eight times and was finance minister under Felix Gaillard.

Pflimlin is the first member of his party — the Catholic Popular Republican Movement (MRP) — to head a government since Georges Bidault was premier for 10 months in 1949-50. Bidault was the

first candidate called by President Rene Coty in the current crisis. He failed to form a government because the MRP would not back his plan for a tougher policy in dealing with the Algerian rebellion.

Pflimlin, far more liberal in his North African views, has the bulk of the slightly leftist MRP solidly behind him. But conservative opposition in the Assembly and the army seizure of power in Algiers make clear the opposition he faces from the extreme right.

Pflimlin — the name is pronounced roughly flim-lin and means little plum — is a 51-year-

old lawyer from Alsace, in eastern France. He is a tall, thin man with strongly marked features and silvery hair. An eloquent speaker, he is the national president of his party.

Although of an old Alsatian family, Pflimlin was born in the northern French mill town of Roubaix, near the Belgian border. After studying at Mulhouse and the Catholic Institute of Paris, he took his doctorate of laws at Strasbourg University.

Mobilized as a lieutenant interpreter, Pflimlin served in the Belgian and French campaigns early in World War II. After France

collapsed, he hid out through most of the German occupation near Thionville-Les-Bains.

Pflimlin became a deputy after the war and also is president of the Bas-Rhin (Lower Rhine) County Council.

A specialist in economic questions, he has published several technical books. The best known is "The Economic Situation of the Third Reich."

The new premier's favorite relaxation is a long, all-day walk in the country. He is married and has three children, aged 15, 13 and 11.

Mind Readers In Tie Score

CHICAGO (UP) — Cambridge College in England and the University of Chicago battled to a draw in the world's first international intercollegiate mind reading meet.

No one could make up his mind who won.

"Our senders may not have been too strong," Larry Victor, Schenectady, N.Y., said Tuesday night. "Then again, maybe their receivers weren't fully tuned in. It's sort of hard to tell exactly what went wrong."

"These results, of course, are not conclusive," Steve Abrams, Chicago, who ran the American half of the meet, said. "Scores have to be analyzed and re-analyzed. Then we analyze the analysis."

Tom Glynn, Montreal, Canada, a third member of the Chicago crew, said the laws of chance would allow either side to correctly choose 50 out of 250 cards. "Our opponents at Cambridge wound up with an average of about 47," Victor said. "They came out worse than the laws of chance."

Cambridge and Chicago each supplied 10 receivers and one sender to the meet. The sender would concentrate on a card-sized symbol and the receivers, across the ocean, would write down what card it was.

The symbols were a star, a circle, a square, a cross and waves.

KLAMATH AGENCY — A certificate of award was granted to Matthew B. Spencer of Klamath Agency, Monday, May 5. The award, which was granted to Spencer by the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Department of the Interior, is in recognition of service performed in a manner exceeding the requirements of his position.

Argentine Head Fulfills Promise

BUENOS AIRES — President Arturo Frondizi carried out an election pledge last night by ordering a blanket wage increase but only on steps against the inflation which has accompanied previous pay hikes.

In a nationwide radio address Frondizi ordered salaries raised 10 per cent over their Feb. 1, 1958, level. Most workers have won raises since then and these will be figured in the 10 per cent.

The increases will be about 200 pesos (\$3.20 a month) for the average white collar worker who now makes about 2,000 pesos (\$32) a month.

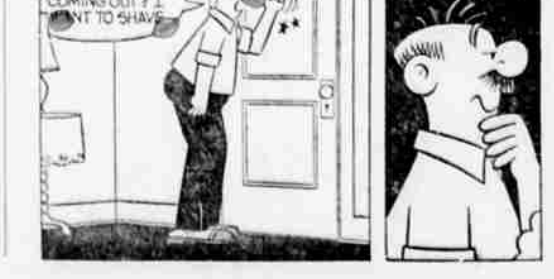
Van Cliburn is a 24-year-old pianist from Texas. He won the Tchaikovsky piano contest in Moscow in 1958. He is now on tour in the United States.
