



YREKA — An apportionment of \$378,532 was allowed the Yreka Union Elementary District by the State Allocation Board in Sacramento to be used for the construction of a senior elementary (seventh and eighth) grade school.

News of the apportionment was received by the Board of Trustees at its regular meeting Tuesday afternoon May 5, and immediate instructions were given. Robert B. Reynolds, superintendent of schools, to check the legal requirements for making of an election in which the voters would decide the state money and whether the balance of \$113,000 is local bonds to qualify for the apportionment.

It was stressed by Reynolds that the bond issue will leave the local tax rate unchanged. It will convert obligations of 11 cents a \$100 of assessed valuations, now being paid the state on a provision allowance, to paying off the increased total of local bonds outstanding.

A five-minute vote is required for approval of both propositions.

Under the state program, the Yreka Board will receive the state aid for the remainder of the school year and for the next two years. The state will then take over the entire cost, covering both local bonds and

the payments to the state for 20 years; 30 cents for the ensuing 10 years.

Should assessed valuations raise, the payments to the state may be increased, but the tax rate will remain unchanged.

Clayton King, Reynolds' secretary, has been hired by the board to design the new eight classroom building, which will be located near the intersection of the proposed highway, on a 1.5-acre school-owned tract of the present Yreka Senior School on what is known as Cato Field.

There was comment by Reynolds that the local election will be scheduled for the new school in the fall of the 1960-61 school year.

The need for the new school is based on the increase of the school population from 60 to 70 students a year. Present enrollment in 1965, with the heaviest enrollment growth in the kindergarten and primary grades, where educators feel all classes will be under 20 in the younger grades, grows through the system.

Reynolds stated that the increased capacity will allow for the anticipated growth within the next several years, and that more room is available for a school library.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Al Gore (D-Tenn.) expressed doubt about that many states would go along with the terms of a House-passed bill to extend wilderness areas.

He disputed the estimate, endorsed by the Wilderness Society, that as many as "more than eight million" acres could be added to "protected showboating with the view of the unimproved landscape."

Gore spoke in an interview with the news magazine *Time*, one of which he recently chaired a review of new wilderness designations to leaders at a recent day of hearings on the bill.

The measure would extend the duration of temporary permit compensation by 90 per cent, up to 13 weeks in most states, to insure jobless workers who have exhausted their eligibility for payments.

The rest of the program, if all states choose to participate, is estimated to cost \$60 million dollars. The federal government would advance the money to the states, which would have to repay it beginning in 1983.

Additional funding from the Department of the Interior would supplement additional water supplies and cover. Observations of wildlife are approximately 20 reservoirs throughout the Snake Mountains area since that time of all reservoirs will remain open to the public. Richard Laudenschlager, chairman of the 1959 United Fund-Red Cross campaign, announced the kickoff date of the annual fall drive as Tuesday, September 16.

The fund board, at a meeting Monday noon, approved the date on the recommendation of the campaign committee which has already begun organizational meetings to plan for the county wide drive.

Directors heard a report from Mrs. Earl Sheridan, chairman of the budget committee, on the schedule for budget conferences. She said conferences with the individual agencies participating in the united appeal will be held from June 16 through 19. Prior to these dates, individual budget committee members will meet with their assigned local agency heads to discuss budget requests and review programs and activities.

Leo Molatore, United Fund treasurer, reported a total of \$35,816 has already been disbursed to the agencies. This leaves an amount collectible on pledges of \$31,006.

In connection with discussions on the inclusion of various agencies in the United Fund drive, Molatore commented that the Heart Association, which withdrew from the United Fund last year, collected approximately \$1,300 in Klamath County, according to a release from the association's state headquarters. Molatore pointed out that this is nearly \$700 less than the \$1,999 received from the United Fund drive in 1957.

He reviewed figures which showed that during the four years Heart Association was affiliated with the United Fund, the health agency received more, with no expense to the agency, than it had in its independent drive, in which the gross figure must also pay campaign expenses. He added that, although the heart group has its reason for withdrawing the fact that the local United Fund budget committee would not guarantee \$4,000, Heart could have received a net amount in excess of \$2,000 by remaining in the united drive. The \$2,000-plus figure was the goal recommended by the local United Fund Budget Committee.
