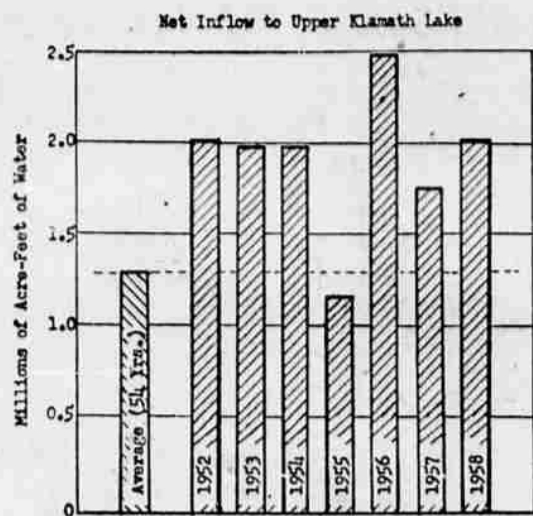
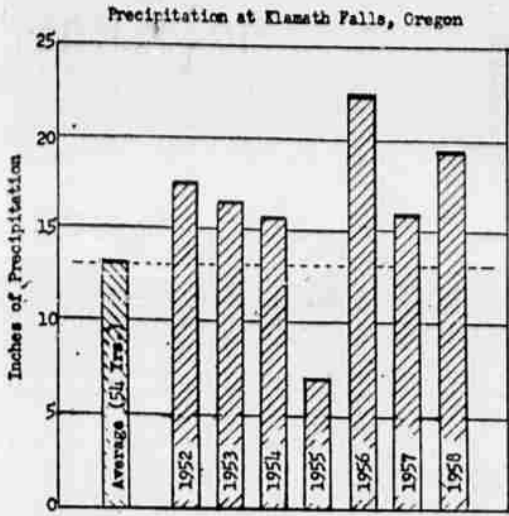


COMPARISON OF RECENT WET YEARS WITH AVERAGE OF 54 YEARS

negotiations were carried on for several years. Compact articles acceptable to all concerned were agreed upon and ratified by the Legislature of Oregon, the Legislature of California, signed by the respective governors on April 17, 1957, and on August 29, 1957 the congressional bill approving the compact was signed by President Eisenhower.

4. Copco Contract Relative to Operation of Link River Dam — A contract made on January 31, 1956 between the United States, Bureau of Reclamation (Department of the Interior), representing the water users of the Klamath Project, and The California Oregon Power Company, defines the conditions under which Link River Dam, which controls flow to Klamath Lake, will be operated by the power company. This contract, which is for a period of 50 years, superseded a similar contract dated February 24, 1917. It is particularly significant in water conservation since a favorable power rate of 6 mills per kw-hr is made available to the project water users for irrigation and drainage pumping. It also recognizes a preference of uses favorable to development of the Basin's land and water resources. Local groups and organizations participated in the negotiations.

Agreement of the operation of Link River Dam also cleared the way for Federal Power Commission's approval of Copco's power plant construction now underway at Big Bend below Keno.

3. Termination of Federal Supervision over Properties of Klamath Tribes — Public Law 587 passed by the 83rd Congress, approved August 13, 1954 provided procedures for termination of such supervision. Since the properties involved constitute a substantial part of the resources of the Basin area, the change in status may considerably affect the Basin economy and the rate of resource development.

6. Interior Secretary's Decision on Use of Public Lands — The most recent action of consequence to development in the Basin was Interior Secretary Seaton's decision of April 1, 1958 on the "homestead versus lease" controversy concerning the public lands in the Lower Klamath and Tule Lake areas. This decision offers a solution to a controversy which has existed for nearly a quarter of a century over the question of whether several thousand acres of former water area drained by the Klamath Federal Reclamation Project is to be used for homesteading or retained in wildlife refuges.

7. Continuing Programs — Although singular accomplishments such as the above indicate definite progress, other day by day efforts have contributed greatly to a fuller conservation and utilization of our water resource. Activities in conservation education, forest and range management, wildlife management and recreation are all interrelated with water. Progress in any of these activities is progress in water conservation.

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**Legislative Survey Hit By Siskiyou Outdoorsmen**

DUNSMUIR — Southern Siskiyou sportsmen challenged the validity of a state legislative survey of the Fish and Game Commission on Saturday when visited by J. D. Lauckhart of Seattle, state game official and Fred Ross of Redding, game management supervisor. The men met with James Lambert, president of the Dunsmuir Rod and Gun Club; D. E. Warren, president of the Weed Gun Club and vice president of the Northern Counties Wildlife Conservation Association; and Andy Wheeler of McCloud. Boyd Pittman of Yreka, another member of the conservation association, phoned his concurrence of opinion during the meeting.

Lauckhart outlined the survey procedure in the retention of Boaze Allen and Hamilton, management consultants of San Francisco, who in turn asked Ernest Swift of Washington, D.C., head of the Wildlife Federation, to hire qualified men to survey all phases of the Fish and Game Commission operation. He introduced himself as the expert retained to survey deer programs.

Lambert inquired how a clear picture of the deer situation could be obtained from a superficial sampling of opinion and asked why a man with possibly preconceived opinions had been hired. He unloaded a series of grievances dating to the authorization of a 1956 doe season over local

protests, and release of Fish and Game Commission news stories that failed to note opposition to policies.

Warren stated the mule deer herd is one of Siskiyou County's biggest assets. He suggested a stepped-up winter range and water program, curtailment of sheep and cattle grazing in game refuges and national forest lands and some attention to local opinion.

The three local men gave approval to the Busch Bill which provides for supervisory vet of doe hunts and unit management of deer herds but promised vigilance to see that it was properly administered. They were unanimous in their opinion that the either sex hunt in 1956 decimated the mule deer herd in Siskiyou County and cited for Lauckhart that according to their own deer tag count, the 1957 deer kill was off 50 per cent from the previous year.

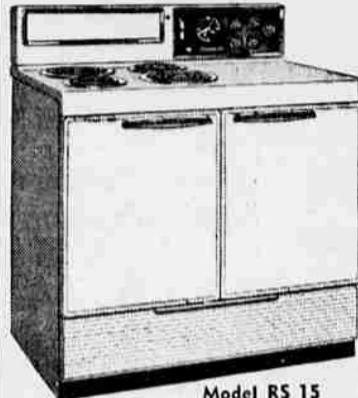

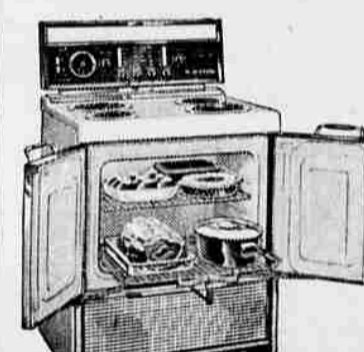

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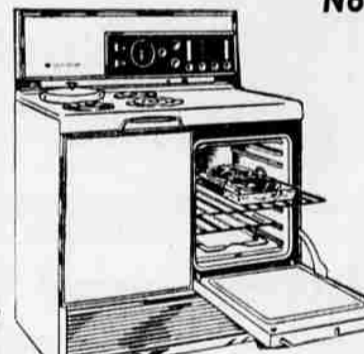
