SP Predicts More Losses

FRESNO (UP)—A gloomy prospect of continued losses in Southern Pacific railroad passenger service operations was outlined Wednesday at a Public Utilities Commission hearing here.

The company has asked the PUC to grant permission to reduce service. The PUC was to resume hearings on the firm's requests in Los Angeles today and Friday and conclude the sessions next week in San Francisco.

Robert M. Gilmore, assistant vice president in charge of passenger service, reported Wednesday that the company has lost more than 20 million dollars on its passenger system. He pointed out other railroads faced with the same situation have been allowed to reduce service.

However, PUC engineers contended the company actually made a profit of \$2,800,000 last year. They claimed SP has been charging against its passenger service expenses for other operations. SP wants to discontinue the West Coast trains between Sacramento and Los Angeles and continue combined operation of the coastal Lark and Starlight, which started on an interim basis last July. The company contended it lost more than one million dollars on the West Coast trains in a 12-month period ending March 31.

Gilmore said the company would agree to an extension of the night Lark train to connect with trains from Sacramento to the Bay Area. He also withdrew a petition to discontinue the reserved seats on the San Joaquin and Sacramento Daylight trains but retain a special service charge of \$1.

PUC Commissioner Matthew Dooley granted the request with the stipulation that the railroad may resubmit its petition later. The withdrawal was made in the interest of speeding the hearings.

RUDE NUDE

DRUMRIGHT, Okla. (UP)—A rude nude who likes to ride around in his automobile after dark is being sought by police in this area of northeastern Oklahoma.

The unclothed man, described as being in his late 20s, has been forcing other cars and trucks off the road. The highway patrol has six such recent reports.

Ogden Fathers Meet Opposition

OGDEN, Utah (UP)—Four city councilmen have discovered that supporting fluoridation of the community's water supply can be as uncomfortable as aching teeth.

Fluoridation has run into some strong opposition here, and it could be violent opposition. The County Welfare Council announced yesterday the four councilmen have been threatened by physical violence or business boycotts by numerous anonymous callers.

Mayor Raymond S. Wright and Councilmen C. Austin Seager, Elmer Myers and Scott B. Price voted to set up a fluoridation plant. The other three council members voted against it.

The city is going ahead with plans to buy the equipment though an initiative petition against fluoridation is to be voted upon in November 1959.

INTERFERENCE

LONDON (UP)—Moscow Radio charged the United States Thursday with open interference in Lebanon's internal affairs by sending military equipment to the riot-torn Middle East country. An Arab language broadcast said Lebanese authorities were "planning to use these American weapons to fight the anti-imperialist popular movement."

Mother, Child Die In Crash

DENISON, Tex. (UP)—A Greyhound bus skidded off a rain-slick highway early today, hit a tree and a power pole and split open. A young mother and her child were electrocuted. Four passengers were injured.

Irvine Echola of Kansas City, Mo., said the bus driver apparently swerved to miss an auto and plunged off the road. "I saw the car and the driver started wrestling the wheel," Echola said. "The bus started to skid and I thought 'Oh, oh, here we go.'"

Bus driver James Towse of Tulsa declined to make a statement except to say it was a "skidding accident."

Mrs. Shirley Smith, about 21, of Fort Worth, and her daughter, Melanie Jane, about 1 1/2, were killed. Echola said the baby fell out of a 6-foot gap in the side of the bus. When the mother jumped out to get her, he said, they were electrocuted.

The passengers had to wait nearly an hour for the Texas Power and Light Co. to shut off power to a high tension line lying across the bus before they could get out.

WASHINGTON (UP)—The newspaper industry today mourned the loss of Thomas L. Stokes, Pulitzer prize-winning columnist of United Feather Syndicate who died here Wednesday.

TB DROPS

PORTLAND (UP)—The incidence of tuberculosis in Oregon dropped 2 1/2 per cent last year, the Oregon Tuberculosis and Health Assn. said Wednesday.

The association said at its annual meeting here that only 578 new cases were reported in the state.

He was stricken earlier this year, he was voted a special citation by the Raymond Clapper Memorial Association for the "unvarying high standards" of his work.

His column appeared in more than 100 newspapers. He was widely regarded as the top political writer in the United States.

The citation was similar to a number of tributes he received in 37 years of covering Washington politics for United Press, the Scripps-Howard Newspaper Alliance and United Features.

His fellow Washington correspondents once voted him the newsman who did the best job based on reliability, fairness and news analysis.

In 1938, Stokes received the Pulitzer prize for an expose of vote scandals involving workers on government relief in Kentucky. He also was awarded the Raymond Clapper award in 1947 as the Washington newsman whose work best typified that of the late Clapper, noted newsman killed in a World War II plane crash.

Although most of his biggest stories were written from the capital, Stokes traveled extensively.

His theory was that a good understanding of Washington news depended on frequent visits elsewhere.



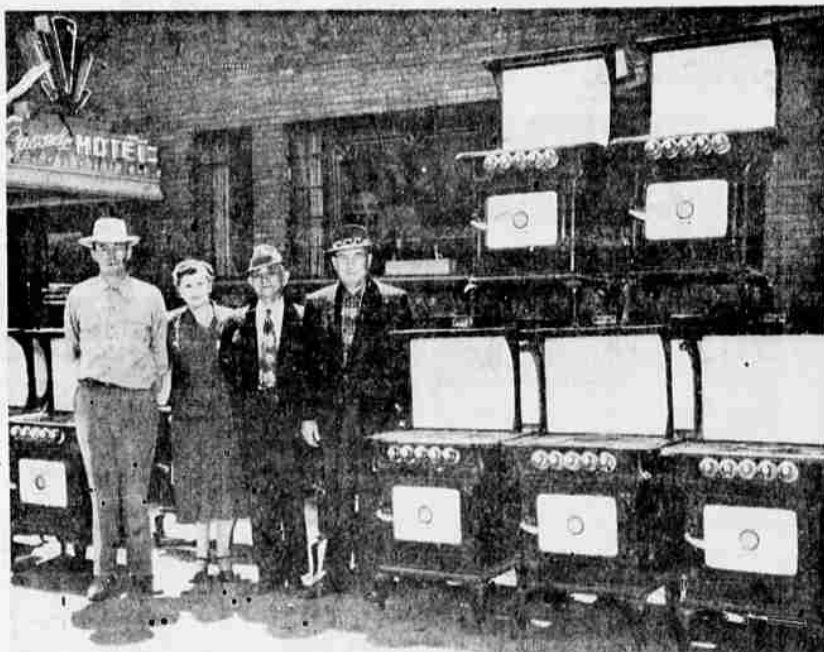

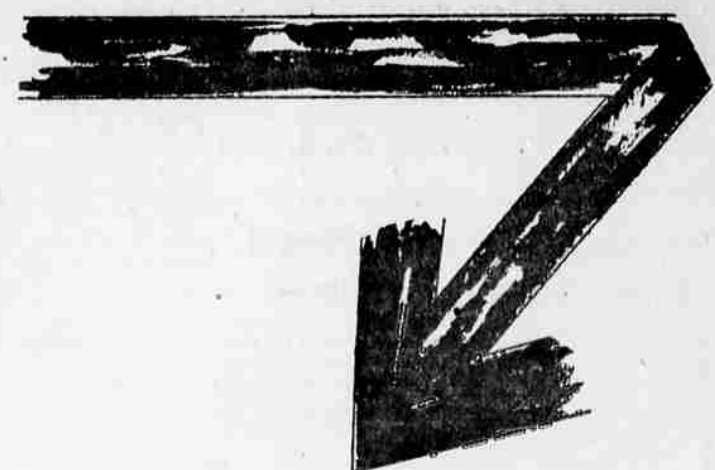
