Graham Chats On Sex In SF — SAN FRANCISCO (UP) — Billy Graham says no age has emphasized sex more than ours — "and enjoyed it less."

Sex, the evangelist told an audience of 14,000 at the Cow Palace Wednesday night, is God-given and can bring heaven or hell — depending on how it is used.

"Sex is like fire," he said. "Used wisely, it can be a blessing. Used unwisely, you can be burned by it."

He took as the text for his sermon, 1st of his six-point crusade, the Seventh Commandment: "Thou shalt not commit adultery."

Referring to the modern emphasis on sex, Graham said: "Now that we are free to do as we like, we don't like what we do. Many people are growing sick by their sex liberties."

Graham noted that the laws of sex are generally taken against ministers. But he said he believes "it's about time" that they discuss sex and its implications frankly from the pulpit.

"To act as if we had no sex desires would bring about hypocrisy and complexes," he said.

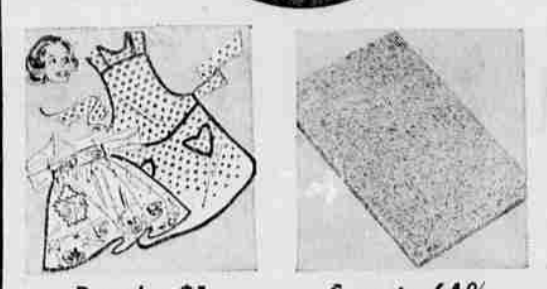
Klamath Falls is one of five Moose lodges in the state of Oregon chosen for this school of instruction by the supreme lodge at Mooseheart, Illinois.
