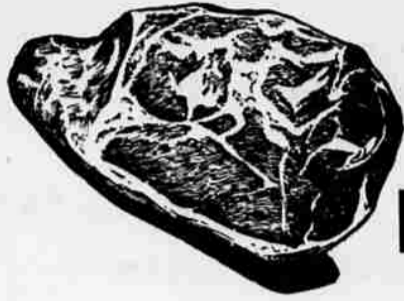

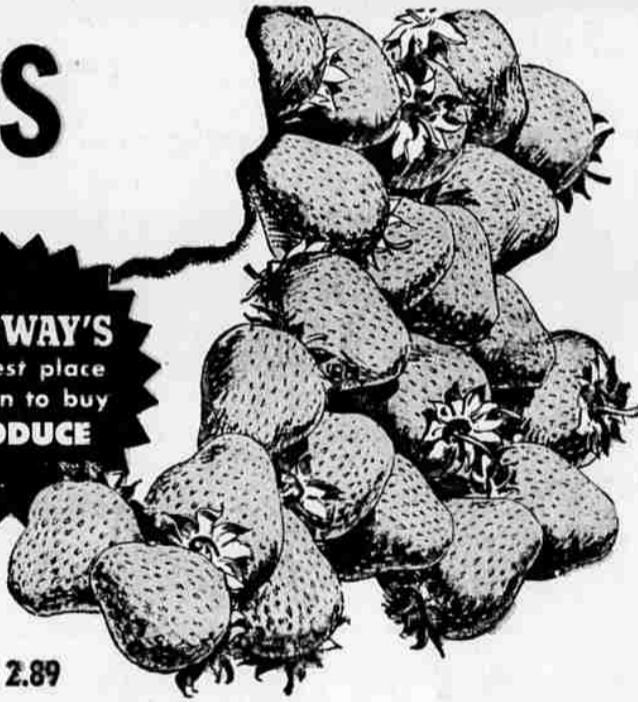

## Alturas Girl In Recital

Miss Asher was the recent recipient of the high school music diploma and a 100 music scholarship presented by the National Guild of Piano Teachers. The scholarship is given to students who participate in the guild auditions for a period of 10 years receiving superior ratings during this time—and who satisfy requirements necessary to receive the high school music diploma during their senior year.

Piano compositions to be performed by Miss Asher include "Prelude in A Flat" by Bach, "Andante" from Sonata Op. 26 by Beethoven, "Nocturne Op. 27 No. 2" and "Berceuse" by Chopin, "Whims" by Schumann, "Rhapsody" by Dohnanyi and "Malaguena" by Lecuena.

A talented violinist as well as pianist, Miss Asher will play "Meditation" by Massenet, and the Bach-Gounod "Ave Maria."

Assisting the soloist will be the Cecilia String Ensemble with Kathleen Ball as accompanist.

## Ike To Have 3 Jet Planes

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government is buying three jet transports costing five million dollars each to be used by President Eisenhower and other high ranking officials on long distance trips. The planes, four-jet Boeing 707s, may be delivered by the end of this year. The 707, now being produced for commercial use, has a top speed of 500-600 miles an hour and is capable of stratospheric flight.

Eisenhower's approval of the purchase order was announced yesterday by White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty, who said the planes would be available for use by the President or other top government officials on cross-country or intercontinental flights.

Hagerty said none of the three speed jets would be assigned to Eisenhower alone. He said the President would continue to use his personal plane, the propeller-driven Columbine III, on many trips.

The Boeing plane was picked, Hagerty said, because it is "the first American jet transport aircraft with substantial flying experience."

## Right-To-Work Nears Vote Spot

SACRAMENTO (AP)—California's proposed right-to-work initiative is more than two-thirds of the way to gaining a place on the November ballot.

Sponsors have filed 221,488 certified signatures on petitions from 33 counties, the secretary of state's office said yesterday. They need 322,429.

Backers of the proposed constitutional amendment, which would outlaw union membership as a condition for employment in the state, have until June 26 to get the remaining 100,941 signatures.

FORT ROCK—A change in the base allotment for wheat acreages was explained at the meeting of Fort Rock Grange Saturday, May 10. ## KU Senior Wins Award

Jeffrey W. Carter, KUHS senior and son of Mr. and Mrs. E. Wood W. Carter, 1234 Eldorado, has won a National Merit Scholarship in nationwide competition.

The youth will use the scholarship for a four-year course at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, beginning next September. He will major in metallurgy and intends to become a metallurgical engineer.

Carter's first examination toward qualifying for the honor was taken last October at KUHS. The top 10 per cent of the senior class took the tests and Carter was the only student to emerge as a semi-finalist. A total of about 256,000 took this examination nationwide.

Jeffrey's next aptitude examination occurred on January 8 and from this he remained among the 7,500 students across the nation who were to be considered for actual scholarships.

The Merit Scholar Selection Committee then chose 1,000 most talented youngsters from the 7,500 and the local KUHS youth was among them. Oregon has a total of 10 winners.

Young Carter's all-around qualifications as a good citizen were taken into account as well as his scholastic ability. The teen-ager has been active in Cub Scouts, Babe Ruth Baseball, high school football, baseball and basketball. He managed the KUHS basketball team for two years. He was on the honor roll in the 10th and 11th grades.

Jeffrey is also active in church work and community service. His hobbies are reading, scientific projects and sports.

The National Merit Scholarship Corporation's funds for scholarships come from private sources, including over 70 corporations and other organizations across the nation.
