Braves To Meet Redlegs

The time has come for these Cincinnati Redlegs to decide whether they are to be contenders in that National League pennant race. They open a four-game series at home against the world champion Milwaukee Braves tonight.

It was a year ago today that the Redlegs busted into the NL lead for a stay of almost a month. Now they're fifth, 3½ games behind Milwaukee.

The Redlegs lost 18 of 22 with Milwaukee a year ago and have lost four of five to the champs this season.

It was a three-game sweep by the Braves last weekend in Milwaukee that started the Redlegs on a five-game losing streak that didn't end until they managed a 9-4 victory over Pittsburgh yesterday.

The Braves were trailing 3-1 when last night's game was postponed by first-inning rain at Philadelphia. That left Milwaukee in shaky command of first place — by .024 percentage points over the St. Louis Cardinals' winning streak at seven, 4-2.

Last place Los Angeles ended its losing streak at six — longest since 1950 for the Dodgers — with an 11-inning, 4-2 victory at Chicago.

Redlegs 9, Bucs 4

The Redlegs had to come from behind at Pittsburgh after leading 3-0. George Crowe drove in five runs for the Reds, clouting a two-run homer in the seventh for a 5-4 edge that ended the Pirates' winning string at six.

Bob Friend lost his second against five victories, leaving in a four-run ninth capped by Crowe's two-run single.

U.S. Open Sets Entry List High

NEW YORK (UP) — A record 2,123 golfers will battle it out in qualifying rounds for 145 berths in the U.S. Open championship at Tulsa's Southern Hills Country Club, June 12-14.

The U.S. Golf Association actually received 2,140 entries before the deadline for filing Tuesday night, but 17 players, including defending champion Dick Mayer, qualified automatically for the championship.

There will be 28 qualifying rounds this year, the first at Honolulu on May 26 and the remainder scattered throughout the nation on June 2.

Tigers Tripped By Tribe

Little Ned Garver, whose 20 victories for a last place club now are all but forgotten, is back in business again as the pitching ace of the Kansas City Athletics.

It was in 1951 that Garver, a baby-faced kid of 25, was 20-12 for the old cellar dwelling St. Louis Browns, who won but 52 games that year.

Garver, who stands 5-10½, has had only one winning season since 14-11 with Detroit in 1954, but now he's 4-1 with the A's after collecting his second shutout with a seven-hit, 3-0 victory over the Chicago White Sox yesterday.

Cleveland moved into a fourth place tie with Detroit, belting the Tigers 8-5 in the only other game played. Baltimore at New York was postponed because of rain. Washington and Boston weren't scheduled.

A three-run homer by Vic Power, following singles by Mike Baxes and Hec Lopez, broke up a scoreless duel between Garver and Jim Wilson at Kansas City. It was Power's second homer, both off the White Sox right-hander, now 3-2.

Garver, 32, breezed in his third complete game except for the second when Bubba Phillips' double followed the Sox' lone walk. Lopez fielded Luis Aparicio's grounders to get the runner at the plate, and Wilson then tapped back to the mound to end the threat.

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Herald and News SPORTS Preakness Classic Slated To Have Big Starting Field

BALTIMORE (UP) — Trainers of Preakness horses paraded to the Pimlico racing secretary's office today to enter their steeds in Maryland's big three-year-old classic, and the prospects called for the largest field in 30 years.

Jimmy Conway, who trains Talented Show for Mrs. Ada L. Rice of Chicago, beat the gun by telephoning his entry in from New Jersey yesterday. Eleven others headed by the Calumet Farm's Tim Tam, winner of the Ken-

tucky Derby two weeks ago, were expected to be named for the mile and three-sixteenths gallop on Saturday.

With a dozen starters, and the Derby mud an excuse for many of the horses, this 32nd Preakness shapes up as one of the most controversial races since Survivor

copped the inaugural in 1873. In 1928, Harry Payne Whitney's Victorian defeated 17 rivals—the most ever to start in the Preakness.

In addition to Silky, 12th in the

Derby go, Tim Tam and Talent Show, others in the expected lineup were the Main Chance Farm entry of Jewel's Reward and Liberty Ruler, the Sunny Blue Farm's Lincoln Road, the Crabgrass stable's Nouredin, the Llangollen Farm's Gone Fishin', Edward J. Potter Jr.'s Pilon, the Powhatan stable's Michore, Mrs. Anna Cannuli's Chance it Tony, and George Lewis' Martins Rullah.

The Preakness has attracted more horses out of the Louisville event since Hector was a pup. Usually the Preakness has only seven or eight starters. The derby horses with their placings, apart from Tim Tam and Silky, are Lincoln Road (2), Journeiden (3), Jewel's Reward (4), Martins Rullah (5), Chance it Tony (6), and Gone Fishin' (8).

The weatherman predicted fair and mild weather and the presence of the Derby stars plus the lure of come-from-behind Silky probably will mean one of the biggest Pimlico crowds in years. The track has been fast for several days, but whether any horse can

menace Nashua's track and Preakness record of 1:54 3-5 set in 1955 remains to be seen.

No derby winner since Citation, another Calumetee, added the Preakness black-eyed susans to the roses he collected in Kentucky. That was 10 years ago. Citation then went on to grab the Belmont Stakes, completing the elusive Triple Crown that has been managed by only eight horses in the history of American racing.

The race will get full TV and radio (CBS) treatment on the nationwide network from 4:30-5 p. m. EST.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UP) — At least half a dozen of the nation's most daring drivers were poised today to shatter the qualification records for the 500-mile Memorial Day Speedway auto race.

The 33-car field for the 42nd annual "300" with a jackpot of more than \$500,000 at stake, will be weeded out in two weekends of time trials, beginning Saturday.

The long-range weather forecast indicated conditions might be "just right" for record-breaking least, most seasoned observers predicted the records by the 1956 pole-sitter and race winner, Pat Flaherty, of 146.056 and 145.596 miles an hour for one and four laps, respectively, will go by the boards barring adverse weather conditions.

The pole spot on race day — the inside position in the front row goes to the fastest first-day driver-car combination.

Railbirds figured that Pat O'Connor, last year's pole-sitter, national driving champion Jimmy Bryan, former race winner Troy Ruttman, lead-footed Ed Elisian, Jimmy Reece and burly Paul Russo have the best chance to lead the pack through the pace lap on race day.

The Klamath Union Pelican track team enters its last dual meet competition of the season Saturday as it challenges the Crater Comets at Central Point.

The following weekend will see the Pels on their way to Grants Pass where they will vie in the district competition. The district test will serve to qualify individual runners and field event men for the right to enter the state trials which will be held two weeks hence at Corvallis.

Coach Len Surles' crew heads for the Comets fresh from a double-win last week at Bend where they disposed of the Lava Bears, the Redmond Panthers and the Prineville Cowboys in a quadrangular meet. Their second win was at the expense of the Great Falls, Montana, Bisons whom the Pels defeated in a "telegraph" meet.

Heading the vastly improved KU spikers in their test at Crater will be speedster Bob Drace, who currently is close to a state mark in the low hurdles. Drace will also perform in the high hurdles, the high jump and with the relay team.

The balance of the Pel roster will include Rich Humphrey, Ray Jones, Tom Ankeny, Ron House, Ron Olivera, Jan Cox, Bill Santo, Don Isensee, Jim Sevede, Don Story, Gordie Sellars, Don Leary, Ken Coffman, and Bob Lewis, to name a few.

Klamath Falls has registered six KU-Crater meet records in past competition that still stand: Scott Hancock clocked a 10.6 mark in the 100 in 1955, Tom Ferrell posted records in both the 220 and 440, also in the 1955; Hancock accounted for the best time in the low hurdles, Martin Causey holds the shotput mark and Roy Ropp's 153-11 javelin toss which also was established in 1955, will go on the block.

Last Sunday was the first scheduled day for Northern Cal League members, but rain forced postponement of all the games including the Kubs-Scott Valley fracas at Gem Stadium.

Manager Irv Whitt is expected to have big Charlie Bogle on the mound Sunday to face Weed. Several college ball players will be arriving for the Sunday afternoon lineup.
