

# Mays Leads Giants To Second, Chicago

CHICAGO (UP) — Willie Mays had eight home runs in his credit in six games today and the hot San Francisco Giants were back in second place as they moved into Chicago for a series with the Cubs.

Mike McCormick stopped Stan Musial cold Thursday and also halted a St. Louis Cardinals winning streak at seven straight while beating the Red Birds, 4-2, for his third win of the season. He has no defeats.

# Bums Hope LA Recession At Final Turn

ST. LOUIS (UP) — The Los Angeles Dodgers, hopeful that Thursday's 4-2 victory over the Chicago Cubs meant the end of their own private recession, send ace Johnny Podres to the mound tonight against the St. Louis Cardinals.

Thursday's 11-inning decision marked the end of a six-game losing streak for the Dodgers, and the first triumph of their swing through the East and Midwest. But the Los Angeles club still floundered in last place, one game back of seventh-place Philadelphia and 1-2 behind St. Louis.

Podres (4-1) is matched today with Sam San Jose (2-3), whom he bested with comparative ease when the two hurlers started against one another a few weeks back in the Coliseum. In fact, if it wasn't for Podres, the Dodgers would be considerably worse off than they are now.

The classy left-hander lost only one decision, a 2-2 setback at San Francisco that could have gone the other way with more timely hitting.

Manager Walt Alton was particularly happy with the work of Clem Labine, the relief ace who started Thursday and pitched 10 innings for the winners. "The important thing is that Labine was pitching the way he used to pitch," said Alton.

Other problems still had Alton concerned, and neither star outfielder Duke Snider, whose pinch-hug figured in the two-run outburst in Thursday's win, or Carl Furillo would be ready to play today.

"I won't start either of them," said Alton. "Even if Duke plays he can't go more than four or five games before he has to sit out awhile. And Furillo is hurt more than he is."

A walk to Snider started things off in the 11th inning. Joe Pignatano, running for Snider, and Jim Gilliam both were safe when an attempt was made to cut off the front runner on a sacrifice. Pee-wee Reese was safe with a hit when pitcher Herschel Freeman failed to field his bunt. Pignatano scored on Norm Larker's infield hopper and Gilliam tallied on Furillo's outfield fly.

Labine permitted only five hits in eight innings, but the Cubs tied the game at 2-2 in the ninth when Ernie Banks singled home Jim Bolger.

The Dodger runs in the second came when Don Zimmer singled and John Roseboro and Gilliam hit successive doubles off Cub starter Dick Drott.

The Oregon Ducks continued their victorious rampage in the Northern Division baseball race Thursday by clobbering Idaho 11-0 while the Washington Huskies took a 10-4 beating from second-place Oregon State.

Southpaw Don Lane struck out 11 Vandals and gave up three walks as the Webfoots showered Idaho with 19 hits.

Oregon scored five tallies in the first frame off Clark Anderson, added one each in the second and fourth and four more in the ninth inning.

A four-run homer by Bob Bereman in the second inning got OSC underway. Ray Lund blanked the Huskies with one hit until the ninth inning when he gave up three walks and two singles as Washington scored all its runs.

OSC scored four in the second, one in the sixth, three in the seventh and two more in the eighth innings.

Oregon now leads the race with a 7-1 record while Oregon State is tied with Washington State College with six wins and four losses. The Huskies now are in fourth place with a 3-6 record while Idaho is on the bottom with 5-8.

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# IOC Eyes Olympic Cutbacks

TOKYO (UP) — The International Olympic Committee started a move today to make the Olympic Games tougher for individual athletes to enter.

Avery Brundage, chairman of the IOC, announced after Thursday's session that a cutback was in the works which already had affected gymnastics, and possibly would involve track, field and swimming.

The number of persons entering gymnastics was cut from eight to five per team. Brundage said that the International Amateur Swimming Federation was studying a proposal for cutting down its number of entrants also while the International Amateur Athletic Federation was considering doing the same thing in track.

Brundage said that four of the five entrants in gymnastics would score.

The IAAF's decision on track and field would be made in Stockholm this summer. Brundage said.

"When interest in the Olympic Games is constantly growing, we must place a limit somewhere on the number of entries," Brundage said. "Building an Olympic village, for instance, to house 10,000 athletes would be prohibitive."

The track and field proposal calls for a nation entering only one man in each event, plus two more if they met certain standards.

The same swimming events would be held with a possible addition of a 400-meter relay for men and women.

# Minors Host Few Old Pros

**NEW YORK (UP)** — Ageless Satchel Paige, although crowding 52, still is pitching for Miami in the International League but a survey indicates today that the minors no longer provide an easy "retirement" for the washed up major league star.

The principal reason is that there now are only 24 minor leagues, about half as many as in the pre-TV era, with a resultant scarcity of jobs. Another is the flood of good young players produced by colleges and various junior development programs.

Thus the struggling minors, with a high percentage of players being groomed for parent clubs, would rather have "comers" of possible sales value than "goners" with little to offer but a dimming box office name.

But the lure is strong and those on the way out keep trying. A couple of dozen of the old heroes are still giving it a competitive try far from the bit top. Paige's teammates include Bubba Church and Micky Grasso.

Others in the International League, still hopeful of a shot in the big time, include Buffalo's Steve Nagy, Ray Noble and big Luke Easter. Havana's Sandy Consuegra; little Sandy Amoros at Montreal; Bob Kuzava, a one-time World Series hero with the Yankees, at Rochester, and Ebbas St. Claire and Sam Jethroe at Toronto.

Eddie Basinski, once with the Dodgers, goes at it still in Seattle; Spider Jorgensen at Vancouver, Max Surkont at Phoenix.
