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Civilian Leaders Scheduled To Speak During Annual Aviation Week Banquet

Two civilian leaders in the field of aviation are scheduled to appear on the program for the First Annual Aviation Week Banquet Saturday at 6:30 p.m. at the Willard Hotel.

Scheduled to address the dinner meeting in addition to Brigadier General Curtis R. Low, Commander of the 28th Air Division at Hamilton Air Force Base, are Tom Croson, vice president of West Coast Airlines and Roger Loenig, a past president of the Flying Farmers of Oregon.

Croson, who has visited Klamath Falls on several recent occasions, is in charge of WCA's public relations. His recorded interest in aviation dates to 1911 when his hometown newspaper featured an article about a Tommy Croson who had stood on a fence post, violently flapped his arms, fell off the post and broke an arm. Since that date, aviation has been first a dream, then a hobby, then a duty and now a profession.

The WCA executive is an ardent collector of volumes, prints, articles, maps and artifacts dealing with aviation, including an auto-graphed narration of Amelia Earhart and works of Jules Verne.

Croson learned to fly in 1926, was appointed to the CAA in 1939 and two years later was named coordinator of the Naval Civil Aeronautics War Training Program at North Idaho Teachers College. In 1944 he helped launch Empire Airlines, which merged with West Coast in 1950.

Loenig, a native son of Oregon,

still operates the same farm on which he was born near Haines, Ore. He has been flying for 31 years and is a past state president of the Flying Farmers.

He has served in both the Oregon Senate and House of Representatives, and at present is chairman of the Baker County School District Reorganization Board, a member of the grade and high school boards, the Baker County Chamber of Commerce, Farm Bureau, PTA and is master of his Masonic Lodge.

Emcee for the banquet will be H. O. Juckeland, the Sportsmen Pilots Association appointed chairman of Aviation Week. The week long observance is being held in conjunction with National Armed Forces Day on Saturday, which is under the direction of mayor-appointed chairman Ned Putnam. The weekend activities will feature static displays of Air Force and civilian aircraft and National Guard equipment, open house at Air Force facilities, special events (helicopter and commercial airplane rides, parachute jumping, etc.) on Saturday; a fly-in breakfast and air fair Sunday.

The public is encouraged to attend the activities.

BACK FOR ANOTHER TRY

DENVER, Colo. (AP)—Norm Siebern, star outfielder last year with the Denver Bears of the Class AAA American Assn., thinks he may make the grade the coming baseball season in the New York Yankees outfield. The big slugger led the American Assn. in just about every offensive department last season. Siebern had two previous tries at making the Yankee club.

His big difficulty was that he could not pull the ball sufficiently often to rightfield. "I think I concentrated a little too much on pulling the last Yankee shot I had, and I wound up hitting .204," Siebern says. "I'm going to try not to do that again. I'm not going to be so concerned about pulling that I forget to hit the ball. I've always had good success as a hitter by hitting the ball where it's pitched — outside pitches to left field, inside pitches to right. I know all about the short porch in rightfield at Yankee Stadium. And medical reports indicate my injured shoulder and knee are as good as new again. I want that Yankee outfield job."
