Maury Clark Cited Pioneer Of Foreign Car Invasion

Maury Clark, who is known as the pioneer of the influx of small foreign cars in the Klamath Basin, began business in 1953 as a one man operation with a service station as his headquarters.

Clark's shop is completely equipped to handle all types of service work on his product, a situation that is made sure of by representatives from Germany, where the car is manufactured, in periodic visits.

Boasting a program that has helped him to sell more than 350 cars during his short tenure, Maury states "I firmly believe that our shop is the only one in town that has a flat-rate manual that calls for only one hour and thirty-five minutes in which to completely change an engine. Mind you I am speaking only of the Volkswagen."

Letters from obviously well-satisfied users of the small German makes attest to the fact that claims of dealers are well substantiated.

One of Clark's best arguments, saleswise, is the economical use of the Volkswagen buses that are now in use on the Klamath streets. "As Klamath grows, and we know it will, so shall we," promises Clark.

Red Orbs Faulty Says General

PORTLAND, Maine (AP) — Soviet inter-continental ballistic missiles are still probably without the necessary guidance systems and re-entry nose cones to make them effective weapons of war, Army Secretary Wilber M. Brucker said yesterday.

Brucker's comments were made at a news conference and a Chamber of Commerce dinner speech. The Soviet Union placed its third satellite in orbit earlier in the day.

The secretary said the United States will have the Soviet Union ringed by operational intermediate range missiles by December.

"We must remember that a 1,500-mile range missile of ours on Russia's borders is equivalent to a 5,000-mile ICBM in the possession of the U.S.S.R. or China and directed at us," he said.

Captain Peter Townsend Calls On Margaret Again

LONDON (AP)—It wasn't mentioned in the royal court circular today but that man called on Princess Margaret again for tea.

Group Capt. Peter Townsend told a reporter he expected to see the princess again before he leaves England again sometime next week.

A spokesman for Buckingham Palace said his visit yesterday to Clarence House, where the princess lives with Queen Mother Elizabeth, was a "private visit—that's all I can say."

It was Townsend's second call at Clarence House since he returned from his world tour. He had tea with Margaret and the Queen Mother March 26, another "private visit" lasting three hours.

That one kicked up a mighty fuss in the papers and in court circles because Queen Elizabeth II was out of the country, on a state visit to the Netherlands.

Palace sources shrugged off the latest meeting, depicting the princess and the handsome World War II ace as just good friends. The newspapers seemed resigned to no shock. The Daily Mail suggested the two had also met on Monday at a secret rendezvous for tea.

Whether the queen mother was at home when Townsend called yesterday wasn't known publicly. The Daily Mail said she wasn't.

Margaret had spent the day visiting a new children's hospital. She returned home to find Townsend waiting. He stayed for two hours and a half.

Later Margaret, her mother and her sister went to a reception for visiting President Gronchi of Italy.

"Margaret smiled all evening," said one of the guests. "She didn't seem to have a care in the world."
