

Tech Thinclads Win, Marks Fall

ASHLAND — Oregon Tech's defending Oregon Collegiate Conference track champions warmed up for next weekend's conference meet here Friday afternoon by rapping Southern Oregon College 74-57 behind the efforts of five new meet records.

Jerry Fasten, Tech basketball and track star, paced the way to the OTI victory by sweeping to new records in the shotput and discus. Fasten heaved the shot 46 feet, 2 inches and then came

Puckett Shatters 'B' Marks

SPRINGFIELD — Jim Puckett set two dazzling records to open the Oregon Class B high school track meet here Friday. The finals began Saturday.

The little red-haired senior from Cove flashed over the 100-yard dash course in a spectacular 19.7, one-half second faster than the former record.

Puckett then turned in a blazing time of 22.1 in the 200-yard dash. That time shaved six-tenths of a second off the former mark.

Puckett's performances were highlight of the preliminaries Friday and made Cove, a small Eastern Oregon school, a strong contender for the team title.

Based on Friday's performance, as well as earlier times, two other Eastern Oregon teams also are favorites for the team championship.

Ope is Wallowa, the defending champion, which got a pair of fine times by Frank Marsh in the prelims.

Marsh scampered over one heat of the low hurdles in 21.1, and a heat of the highs in another winning time of 16.1.

The other heats of the two events were won by Creighton Kooch of Enterprise, the other top finalist aspirant.

Kooch had a slower time of 21.9 in the low hurdles, but eclipsed Marsh's high hurdle time with a 21.9 performance.

Record held by Jerry Augie John Landy by two-tenths of a second. But there was suspicion that the International Athletic Association Federation might cast a skeptical eye at Elliott's performance because of the pace-setting job done by an unheralded Texas runner, Drew Dunlap.

Dunlap, not even listed on the official program, jogged into the lead at this start and stayed there until just after the half-mile point when he suddenly stepped out of the race.

Track experts said they were astounded that officials should even think of submitting Elliott's time for consideration.

But Referee Larry Moustou implied that's what will be done. And Percy Cerutti, Elliott's coach, said firmly that his 20-year-old student's record should be

sanctioned.

Elliott himself said he'd like to see England's Derek Ibbotson recognized as the world record holder. Ibbotson ran a 3:57.2 last year but the time has not been recognized—although it still could be—because of pace.

Elliott, a 146-pounder was right on Dunlap's heels when the Texan finished a half mile in 2:00.5. The Aussie was clocked at 2:00.3 at the end of the third lap.

Another Australian, Merv Licoln, ran second, but he was well behind Elliott with a time of 4:01. This was the fourth time in his brief career that Elliott had run the mile in less than four minutes. He has never lost a mile race.

His time Friday night was the fastest ever recorded on American soil. The recognized U.S. record is 3:58.9 set by Australian Jim Bailey while attending the University of Oregon.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UP) — Who's going to win the "500"? That's a question that has been on everyone's mind not only here at the Indianapolis motor speedway, but throughout the sports world.

Since taking over my duties as Tony Hulman's director of racing, I've been deluged with questions as to whom I thought would win. That's pretty tough to answer. All of these boys are close friends of mine and since I'm not racing, I'd like to see all of them win.

But forced to make a choice, I'll pick Jimmy Bryan, the USAC national driving champion, in the Belong car that carried me to victory last year, and believe me, I had the best seat in the house for that race.

SAH IS TOP MECHANIC

Car owner George Sah is one of the top mechanics in the business. His car is in fine shape and Jimmy appears eager and ready to go.

In second place I'll pick determined Jim Rathmann in a car owned by Lindsey Hopkins. Rathmann is a fine driver and great competitor and he gave me fits before that "500" was over.

For third place I pick Pat O'Connor in a car owned by Chapman Root. Pat is another fine driver and has the added advantage of experience on this track through his many miles of test driving. Having done a similar job for the tire people, I know what that experience means.

In fourth place—and that is as far as I'm going to stick my neck out concerning the finish—I'll take Paul Russo in the powerful Novi owned by Lew Welch. It must be admitted the Novi is the fastest machine here at the track and Paul has had a world of experience driving here.

ELISIAN IS DARK HORSE

For darkhorse possibilities I select two, Jimmy Reece and Ed Elisian of the John Zink team. These cars have been turning in the best practice laps.

This great 500-mile race is a test of machines and men and just as important as the driver is the role the mechanic plays. In his hands lies the tremendous task of putting the car together, of making sure everything is in top working condition for the tough grind of 500 miles at high speed.

So in trying to pick a winner, I have considered driver, machine and mechanic. It's only natural that I pick Bryan, the Belong car and Sah. After all, I know what that machine can do and having raced against Bryan, I know his capabilities.

Yet regardless of who wins, we can be sure of this: It was a maximum effort by all members of the team.

But Anderson's prediction fell sort of flat in the wake of another prediction by a southern baseball coach: that colleges eventually would pull full summer baseball schedules of more than 60 games.

Some people thought that the West Coast relays at Fresno last week were sort of flat—but the fact that two men heaved the shot past the 60-foot mark and two others cleared 15 feet in the pole vault should stop that talk. Three years ago the feats would have made screaming headlines around the world.

Add golfers: Evangelist Billy Graham has announced that he expects to participate in the Dorn Sports Institute Invitational tournament set for Grinda, Calif., Country Club May 23. Others who will compete include Bing Crosby, Hoagy Carmichael and John Ratt from the entertainment world; Cal Coach Pete Elliott and Forty Niner Coach Frankie Albert from football; and Lefty O'Doul from baseball.

Seattle expects more than 500,000 to watch the Gold Cup races on Lake Washington on Aug. 10. Not bad for a city of 750,000. Wonder who will be home watching the store?

A magazine (Sports Illustrated) has slated a sports festival for the Stanford shopping center, Palo Alto, on May 22-23-24.

Among those appearing will be Bob Mathias from track and field; Y. A.
