Tests Given KU Students

Mr. Paul Angstead, Klamath Union High School's assistant principal, supervised the annual clerical aptitude tests given to students anticipating their enrollment in business subjects during the coming academic year. Testing and conference room 212 B was used for these examinations, which were given to the students during their typing, shorthand and general business classes Friday, May 2.

Mr. Angstead disclosed that the objective of these tests was to ascertain whether the pupils taking them were academically prepared to include business courses such as shorthand, stenography, bookkeeping and business machines in their next year's curriculum.

The examination indicated the student's ability to choose rapidly and correctly, listed numbers or names, which were placed in two columns headed "A" and "B." In column "A" a group of numbers, a person's name or a business establishment was given and, those persons taking the test were instructed to indicate if columns "A" and "B" were identical in content by placing a check mark in the space provided between the two columns.

Those students who planned to enroll in shorthand or stenography courses next fall, remained after the accuracy test and were given a spelling examination and further information on the two courses.

Mississippians Special Guests

Special guests at the last national school assembly, which was held Wednesday, April 30, in Pelican Court, were the Mississippians, a famous American jubilee male quartet.

These singers make up one of the best known jubilee quartets of the entire country. Probably no other group of singers gives a more authentic interpretation of Negro spirituals, camp meeting shouts or popular plantation melodies.

This unusual quartet is under the personal direction of Mr. Thom as J. Pruitt of Berkeley, California. Mr. Pruitt is a graduate of the famous Negro School at Piney Woods, Mississippi. He is a master in the field of music and readings. His dramatic selections of his own race are a high spot of the program.

An informative talk at the beginning of the program explains the nature of the Negro folk music. Several years of radio experience over Western stations and the National Broadcasting System of San Francisco have made them well known and widely popular.
